Fire at Pentwyn: Miraculous Escape of the Family An alarming outbreak of fire occurred early on Good Friday morning at the White Horse Inn, Pentwyn. The inmates had a very narrow escape. The household consisted of Mr. & Mrs. Price, two children, and a servant girl, all of whom were in bed. The outbreak was discovered about three o'clock, Mr. and Mrs. Price waking up the same time to find a house filled with smoke. Mr. Price immediately alarmed the next door neighbours by tapping on the wall. Scores of neighbours quickly gathered. A messenger, Mr. Ernest Jones, was dispatched for the Fochriw Fire Brigade, which was on the scene within 20 minutes of the call, under the command of Lieutenant W. J. Payne. Police Sergeant Williams accompanied them. Luckily the fire had been practically put out by the neighbours, scores of whom assisted in carrying water. Great praise is due to the neighbours, all of whom worked like heroes. A word of praise should be given to the fire brigade for acting so promptly. To get out of bed, pull the fire cart and hoses up the steep hill - about three-quarters of a mile in length, in such a short time is a remarkable feat. Luckily there was a good supply of water, otherwise the consequences would have been much more serious. The house is the property of the Taff Vale Brewery Company.

Mr. Price made two attempts to escape by way of the staircase, but failed owing to the flames having spread there. He retreated into the bedroom, and with the boy in his arms rushed to the front bedroom window, and dropped the boy into the arms of Mr. William Mantle. Afterwards, he jumped from the bedroom window to the pavement below. He then rushed round to the back, and assisted by Mr. Mantle, climbed up and got in through the window. He found the little girl, just seven years of age, and made his way through the smoke and fire and dropped her into Mr. Mantle's arms. He then jumped from the window into the back yard. He

received injuries to the hand. The servant girl made her escape from the same window by jumping out. She escaped with a few bruises on her legs. This was remarkable as she was barefoot, and had only her night attire on. It was a 16 ft drop to the ground. She then scaled a six-foot wall to arouse Mr. Mantle, who was by that time up. Mrs. Price made her escape by way of the staircase. She covered her head with some clothing. Great praise is due to Mr. Price, who by his presence of mind, promptitude and pluck, undoubtedly saved the lives of both children. Space will not admit to mention the names of those who assisted in various ways, some of whom showed daring courage. Mr. and Mrs. Price wish to thank all their neighbours, the fire brigade, and P.S. He departed from the old fashioned school, and led the younger poets of his day into new fields of thought. It is true that he composed many songs to the beauties of nature, but to him these were only secondary things. He sought a richer field than that of nature in the soul of man, and that great soul was always in touch with the spiritual and eternal. He studied man, and sang to the vastness of his living soul. In this sense he was a psychological poet. The speaker gave a very interesting account of his poetical works, and dealt very fully with Islwyn's masterpiece, "The Storm." Some parts of this poem, said Mr. Roderick, dealt with the natural storm, but he sang more particularly to the storm of sin and suffering in the soul of man. Suddenly, he rejoiced to see the light of the Sun of Righteousness clearing away the clouds and filling the soul with joy and peace. Islwyn died when he was 47 years of age, but his name will remain evergreen in the history of Wales. It was an excellent paper, and everyone thoroughly enjoyed it. <u>Death of a Hitcher at Fochriw</u> An inquest was held by the coroner, Mr. R. J. Rees, on Sunday morning at the Clarence Hotel, Dowlais, on George Conway, 28 years of age, who was killed early on Wednesday morning at No. 2 Pit, Fochriw. Deceased was a married man, and left a wife and two children. John Tucker, a hitcher in the same Pit as the deceased, said that he, the deceased, and others, were working nearby each other. The accident to Conway happened about 2:30a.m. but witness did not see the accident. He had just put up a tram of coal, and did not see anything fall, nor anyone else. Conway was found in the sump, and was

not dead when found. He had a wound at the back of his head: he was alive when taken up the pit to the lamp room, where he died. Bartholomew Meade said he was working not far off, but did not see Conway struck, nor did he hear a noise. The last thing put in the cage was a tram of coal, pushed on by Conway. He did not hear anything fall. They had not seen anything that would account for his being struck. John Maloney, assistant repairer, said he did not know how Conway was hit, nor what with, neither did he see a piece of wood out of its place. Mr. J. H. Jones, colliery manager, showed a plan of that part of the pit, shaft, etc. He said that a diligent search was made at the bottom of the pit, the sump, and also in the shaft, and nothing was found displaced. The pit was 435 yards deep. Coal must have fallen on Conway when he was looking down into the sump. He could not think of anything else. A verdict was returned by the jury "that Conway met his death while working at the bottom of No. 2 Pit, Fochriw, by being hit on the back of the head, but there was no evidence to show what it was."
