Departure of Mr. J C Payne: Farewell Sermon At Pentwyn Fochriw has just lost one of her most prominent tonwnsmen in the person of Mr. J. C. Payne, who is leaving in order to prepare for ordination, and has taken an appointment offered by the Rev. Canon Lewis, at St Mark's Church, Gelli, Ystrad Rhondda. Mr. Payne has for over 20 years been engaged as engineman at the local colliery of Messrs Guest, Keen and Nettlefolds, and during the whole of this time has actively associated himself with every social function in Fochriw, but his efforts were more particularly identified in connection with church work. His interest in this direction matured early, and he was a voluntary lay-reader in the parish of Pontlottyn for 14 years, officiating at Tirphil, Pentwyn, Troedrhiwfuwch, Newtown and Pantywaun. Six years ago he was appointed licensed lay reader to St Andrew's Church, Pentwyn, and the energy and devotion which he applied to his work raised the Church to its present flourishing state with a crowded congregation. Amongst other duties which he discharged, were those of Chaplain to Cwlwm-y-Brodoriaeth, R.A.O.B., and secretary of the Soldier's and Sailors Association. During the last 10 years, he has represented the "Merthyr Express" at Fochriw, and his contributions to these columns have been much appreciated. We regret the loss of his valuable services in this capacity. Mr. Payne has taken a bold step with commendable courage, and one that involves very considerable personal sacrifices, in order to follow more closely the work he loves. They were not aided by the patriotic enthusiasm which characterised the Pontlottyn concerts. This is not to be wondered at, for, if report be true, there are more "slackers" in Fochriw than in any other village in the parish of Pontlottyn, yea, in the civil parish of the Gellygaer. Methinks that twelve months in khaki would tend to civilise not a few who are over-endowed with animals spirits." Similar remarks were also passed at a recent Gellygaer Council meeting by the Rev. Canon T. J. Jones, and of Mr. W. Hammond, Tirphil, about the 'slackers' at Fochriw.

Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Jones, Brook-row, celebrated their golden wedding on Golden Wedding Thursday last week. Mr. Jones was born at Aberaeron, and is 81 years old, whilst Mrs. Jones, a native of Dowlais, is 74. Mr. Jones left Cardiganshire in 1855 and worked for over half a century under the Dowlais Company. The couple rank with the oldest inhabitants of Fochriw, where they have lived for 46 years. There are ten children, nine of whom are still living. These include Councillor John Jones, Bargoed, and Messrs. D. L. Jones, Evan Jones, and Walter Jones, active members of the Miners' Federation in the Dowlais district. Mr. Walter Jones is secretary of the Fochriw Workmen's Library. There are 35 grandchildren. Mr. Jones, who has been a lifelong Liberal, has a store of interesting reminiscences. At the age of seven years, he drove a tram of horses, and whilst 17, he, and a band of others, walked from Aberaeron to Shrewsbury for harvesting, the journey taking two days. At the time there was but one steam engine in Wales that he had heard of, and whilst on the march to Shrewsbury, hearing the passing of an engine, he ran to a railway bridge in the hope of seeing it. Reaching the bridge, he peeped over, only to be temporarily blinded by smoke and steam. Notwithstanding the fact that the engine only travelled six miles an hour, it had gone too far for him to see it by the time his sight was restored. He also remembers the old mail coach, and its disaster near Trecastle. He says that there was a time when starch dared not be used by the poor, and also a time when tea was a luxury, to be used only when persons above the ordinary visited. He remembers the construction of the Rhymney Railway and the Brecon and Merthyr Railway through the Fochriw valley. To celebrate the event, supper was taken at No. 2, Dynevor-street, the home of one of his daughters, Mrs. T. Evans. All the children and grandchildren were gathered together. The old couple were the recipients of many handsome presents.

<u>Fatal Accident At Fochriw</u> On Thursday week, a fatal accident happened at Messrs. Guest, Keen and Nettlefolds, Ltd, No. 2 Pit, Fochriw, to a man named Michael McCarthy, aged 26, living at 221, Lower High Street, Dowlais. Mr. R. J. Rees, coroner, conducted an inquiry into the circumstances at the Dowlais Inn, on Monday afternoon. Mr. Tudor Davies, M.E., colliery agent of the company; Councillor John Davies J.P., miners' agent; and Mr. Jenkins, H.M.I., were present. Evidence of

identification was given by Pat Daley, who said deceased was a native of Cork. John Allen, banksman at No. 2 Pit, said McCarthy often worked as a banksman, though he was employed as a labourer underground. The accident happened about 1:30p.m. when they were winding stones and mortar. He could not see the man, but he signalled to the engine driver to stop, and he slackened down steadily. The man was fastened down by the fangs of the carriage, and he was squeezed terribly. The fangs were within two inches of their place. Daniel Singleton, who was working on the same side as the deceased, said he saw the cage and a load of stones and mortar. He also saw the tram lowered and catch on McCarthy. Jenkins Pugh, winding engineman, said he had a signal to ease the carriage at the fangs which he did very carefully. Mr Tudor Davies showed a plan of the pit and the bed plate. The coroner, in summing up, said he could not help thinking that the deceased had lost his head and there was no blame to be attached to the men working with him. A verdict of "Accidental Death" was returned.
