Nazareth Calvinistic Methodist The members of this chapel celebrated Christmas Day by hymn singing for the children in the afternoon and the service of praise for adults in the evening. Mr. William Morris was the conductor of this singing at both meetings. Miss Katie Jones-Davies and Mr. W. A. Davies were the accompanists. Mr. J. M. Jones presided in the afternoon. The Fochriw Brass Band met the train, and the village was gaily decorated with bunting, but Corporal Everett did not arrive until the later train that evening. Corporal Everett is an old soldier, having served through the South African war with the Essex Regiment. He also served through the East African Expedition. He joined the Welsh Guards just after its formation, and was made Corporal. He fought through the battle of Loos up to Hill 70, with the Welsh Guards, and had retired to a reserve trench for a short rest. Corporal Everett and four others occupied a cellar, but they were no sooner settled than a highly explosive shell burst, completely demolishing the building, and burying the five men. Corporal Everett was the only man to be extricated alive, though he was suffering severe injuries to arm, ribs and other body parts, and was unconscious for some time afterwards. He has had to undergo five operations at Boulogne and Oxford hospitals. His many friends wish him a speedy recovery.

A Fochriw Tragedy: Snowbound On The Mountain The blizzard on Monday night, had a terribly tragic sequel in the adventures of a party of young Fochriw people, and the death of Willie Grimmett, only son of Mr. and Mrs. Grimmett, Pentwyn. On Monday afternoon, a party of young people walked over the mountain to Pontlottyn to visit a picture show. By the time for their return journey, the storm was blowing with great fury, and while some of the party elected to remain at Pontlottyn overnight, others set out to make the five mile walk over the mountain. Darkness had come on quickly, but the party faced the blizzard in the confidence that they were sufficiently familiar with the road to make their way through. Of the party's fearful experiences, there are, so far, only such a disjointed account as the exhausted survivors can give. No news was received of the young people all night, and after nearly 12 hours, the first of the party was found by a search party crawling on their hands and knees from a disused quarry, where they had found partial shelter. This was at 7:30am on Tuesday morning. Search parties scoured the mountains throughout the morning, the distracted mothers themselves making brave efforts to join in the search, but they were unable to get further than the foot of the mountain. The snows had drifted to unheard-of depths, and the fate of the whole party was for some time in doubt. In the absence of telephone, or other communication with Pontlottyn, hours of anxiety were spent at Fochriw, where it was not

known who of the party had set out on their return. The search parties worked through the night heroically, time and again falling back in face of the cruel blizzard. Police Sergeant H. Williams, and Police Constable Perrett, headed the renewal of the search at daybreak, while the storm still raged. The mountain was thoroughly scoured, but it was not till 7.30 that the first discovery was made. Then, Stanley Williams, 8, Plantation-terrace, Fochriw, was recovered from an old quarry. He was able to give little information concerning his companions, but the searchers set out again, and came upon a sixteen year old girl, half buried in a snowdrift. She was conveyed to a dwelling house, and upon recovering consciousness asked for her little brother. Soon the rescuers came upon a brother and sister, almost buried in heaps of snow. The position of the rescuers was fraught with great peril, but brother and sister were eventually dug out, in an unconscious state, and taken to the Rising Sun Inn, where Nurse Mercer was in attendance. The lad, aged 13, died later. His sister, aged 20, clearly made devoted and heroic efforts during the night to succour her brother and to keep warmth in his body, until weakness overcame her. There still remained a lad, Bob Carter, of Pleasant View, to be accounted for. The rescuers probed the snow with long poles for several hours. At length, some County School boys came across a boot protruding from a heavy drift. Carter was completely buried, but was still breathing when dug out. He recovered after being conveyed home. The night's experiences of this little party created a tremendous sensation, and fine tributes are paid to the courage of the rescuers, who themselves braved considerable peril in their search. The father of the dead lad, Willie Grimmett, is in the Army, training at Rhyl.

Williams, vicar. The cortege wended its way to Pentwyn Churchyard with the staff and scholars of Penybank School, of which the deceased was a pupil, leading the singing of "Guide Me O Thou Great Redeemer." At the Church, the service was very impressive, the vicar officiating. Mr. D. Greening read the lesson, and the hymns "Thy Will be Done," "Nearer My God to Thee," and "Lead Kindly Light," being sung with much feeling. The chief mourners were: Mr. and Mrs. Grimmett, parents; Nellie, Fanny and Louisa, sisters.

An inquest was held at the Rising Sun Inn, on Monday, on William Arthur Inquest Grimmett, the boy who perished on Pontlottyn mountain on the morning of Tuesday, 28th March, after being exposed to the full rigours of the snow storm throughout the previous night. Mr. R. J. Rhys, coroner, presided. Elen Grimmett, aged 21, sister of the deceased, explained that her father, Charles Russell Grimmett, was a private in the 20th Welsh Regiment. On Monday night, 27th March, she said she and seven others proceeded to Pontlottyn and went to a picture palace. They left the cinema about 10 o'clock and proceeded up the mountain by the new road. When they reached the ash tip on top of the mountain, they found they had lost their way. Coroner: In which direction did you go? I could not say where we were. Coroner: Did you lose consciousness yourself? I could not say exactly. Who found you? I could not say. Was your brother with you? Yes sir, he was with me all night. Coroner: It is a mercy that you were alive. It was the roughest night I can remember, I am glad you got through it. You all might have perished. David Stanley Williams, aged 18, said he met the party homeward bound on the mountain path. Having gone a little distance, he fell into a quarry. He shouted to the party to keep back. He remained in the quarry all night, but eventually got out when help arrived. William James Whitby said he was one of the rescue party which set out on Tuesday. He found the Grimmetts on the top of a disused quarry which was right away off the Fochriw road. The eldest girl was semi-conscious, but the other two had gone off. Two of the Grimmetts were taken to the Rising Sun. Coroner: The boy was conscious then? Yes. Were they under this snow? No, not covered. They were in a crouching position. Coroner: How many people were missing from Fochriw altogether that morning? Police Sergeant Williams replied, There were nine in all. There were eight in the group, and another beyond the schools.

Fochriw Wedding Mishap: Dangerous and Foolish Custom A serious mishap, which might have had fatal consequences, befell a wedding party at Fochriw on Saturday. The old custom of placing a rope across the road - which in this case was being carried beyond a joke - to hold up the wedding party until they satisfied the waylayers with coppers, was responsible for an unfortunate occurrence. It was a motor wedding and there were two cars. The contracting parties were Mr. Thomas Walters, an engine driver at the Groesfaen Colliery, living at Newroad, Deri, and Miss Eunice Jones, daughter of Mr. John Jones, overman, Fochriw. The party left the bride's house at Fochriw for Cefn Hengoed Baptist Chapel, where the ceremony was to take place. The first car was occupied by the Rev. Isaiah Williams, Baptist minister, Fochriw, and Rev. Rowland Williams, Baptist minister, Deri, Mr. Ben Thomas, uncle of the bride, Mr. John Walters, brother of the bridegroom, together with the driver, Mr. Edgar Watkins, Bargoed. The car was travelling along at a nice pace when, near the station, it came to grief, the whole party thrown into a state of confusion. It appears that a wire rope had been fastened to the walls on either side of the street, and near an awful corner. It spanned the road at the height of some five to six feet, and caught the glass screen in front of the car. The rope did not give way in the impact, with the result that the screen was smashed to bits. The driver, and the gentleman who sat with him, were badly cut to by the glass, while the three other occupants, including the two ministers who sat in the rear, sustained injuries to the face by coming in contact with the rope. The injured parties were taken to the Schoolhouse, where their injuries were attended to. Eventually, they reached Hengoed where the marriage duly took place.

New School At Fochriw: Opened By Councillor John Jones Councillor John Jones, Bargoed, opened a new school for boys and girls at Fochriw, on Monday. There was a large gathering, and Mr. Jones was presented with a gold key by the contractors, Messrs Hamilton and Millard, of Caerphilly, as a memento of the occasion. The school is pleasantly situated on the mountain top, and has accommodation for 260 scholars, and is on up-to-date lines, the design of which was by the county architect, Mr. D. Pugh Jones. The contract price was £4,402 which is about £16-18-7 per child. The heating engineers were Messrs. J. C. Hill and Sons, Bridgend. Mr. F. E. Huish was the clerk of works. Councillor Sydney Jones presided at a meeting which followed the opening ceremony. He said it was for him an important event in the history of Fochriw, and he congratulated the headmaster, Mr. J. D. Jones, who had laboured under great difficulties in the old school. It was gratifying, he said, that the people of Fochriw were possessed of the opportunity of having education under such healthy conditions. Councillor J. Jones said that as a native of Fochriw it giving him greater pleasure to meet with the reception they had kindly accorded him. He was himself a product of the old School Board system, now obsolete. He remembered the opening of the old school under the Education Board in 1870, and the excitement caused by the event. He remembered also the zeal of those days to get prizes, and those occasions had been a stimulus in later life. Fochriw bore an excellent character in the matter of education, and regular attendance accounted no doubt for the success which had been attained by boys and girls from Fochriw. They had been most successful at the Pengam and Hengoed County Schools. He had heard people say "He is only from Fochriw," but it was a place very dear to him. From that place, some of the finest men in the country had come. There was one in Australia, holding a high position under the government as controller of mines, and some were headmasters of various intermediate schools, from Pantywaun down to Ystrad Mynach. There was a mining engineer at Fochriw with whom he was at school, and in Yorkshire and Lancashire he had met men from Fochriw who were holding high positions. The topic had been suggested to him by Mr. M. Lewis, Bargoed, on the definition of a school. His definition would be that a school was a nursery for the young people of the nation. He wished the school a successful career, and the memory of that occasion would be with him throughout life. Rev. D. Leyshon Evans said that the building of school was long overdue. Some five years ago he was amongst a party that visited the old school, and decided that a new school should be built, but unfortunately there were delays due to lack of money. Alderman W. Williams said he was glad that Fochriw appreciated the educational facility given to it. This was proved by the number who went to the county schools. Just now, education was suffering as it was impossible to staff the schools as they would like, owing to the shortage of teachers due to them serving in the war. He hoped the present crisis would soon be over, but prospects were not favourable. After the war, I hope a period of attention to education will follow. This was the 58th schools erected in the eastern part of the county from designs by Mr. Pugh Jones, and every one of them had been within the contract price. Councillor J. H. Charles delivered an address, and Councillor J. Jones presented a certificate of merit from the County Education Committee to Elizabeth Ann Angel, for having attended school for eight years without losing a day. Councillor Ben Hughes, Mr. J. D. Jones, Rev. Isaac Roderick, Rev. J. R. Salmon, Councillor W. J. Giles, Councillor John Edwards, and Rev. R. Jones, Abertysswg, also spoke.

Richards, J.P.. Present: Councillor Jenkins Edwards, Councillor Edmund Jones, Councillor W. J. Giles, and later, Mr. E. Richards, when he took the chair; Mr. Rowland Thomas, military representative, and Mr. C. J. Samuel, clerk, and Mr. Goshen Evans, assistant military representative.

J.B.B. (41), auctioneer, of B., produced his birth certificate, showing that he had passed his 41st year. Applicant said that if he had to go to the Army, his business would have to close. Granted six months exemption.
