New Headmaster: Fochriw Boy's Brilliant Career The large circle of friends of Captain Evan H. Williams, headmaster of All Saints School, Child's Hill, London, and the son of Mr. and Mrs. Mordecai Williams, School House, Fochriw, has been recently appointed by the Hendon Education Committee to the headship of the Goldbeater's Boys' School on the Watling Estate. Captain Edwards commenced his teaching career in 1898 as assistant master in the Fochriw Board School, under the late headmaster, Mr. William Owen

Morgan, and he left for London in 1901. He moved from Holy Trinity School, Canning Town, to St. Luke's School, Millwall, and later proceeded to the London County Council's British School at Millwall, where he gained valuable teaching experience, and obtain the "five points" for extra qualifications, which raised him to the status of a first class assistant. He afterwards gained an A.C.P. Diploma of the College of Preceptors and the Associateship Diploma of the National College of Music. In November 1905, he moved to Mill Hill, and in 1909 he was appointed headmaster of All Saint's School, Child's Hill. In 1914, he sat for the Theory and Practice of Education for the A.C.P. Diploma of the College of Preceptors, and was successful. On June 5th, 1915, he joined the 2/3 London Yeomanry as a private, and was transferred to the Inns of Court Officers Training Corps, where he was made a cadet corporal. Later, he was gazetted to the 2/1 Shropshire Yeomanry, rising to the rank of Captain. After his military service, Captain Williams took a great interest in the new methods of teaching, and gave lectures on individual methods at the 1923 City of London vacation course.
