£15 Fine For Milk Offence John Slimmon, a farmer, of Fochriw, pleaded not guilty to selling milk deficient in butter fat on 6th July. Police Sergeant William Hamilton said he purchased a pint of milk from Slimmon, who said he obtained the milk from James Jones, Tynewydd Farm, Brecon, and that the milk arrived by rail each morning. The analyst's certificate showed that the sample of milk submitted was deficient in milk fat to the extent of not less than 20 per cent. Police Superintendent G. Griffiths said that he met the train on July 8th at Fochriw station on which the milk for Slimmon arrived from Brecon. He took a sample of the milk, and the analyst's certificate showed that it was genuine milk. Slimmon said he emptied the milk from one can to another and should have emptied it back again, but it was a very wet day. The Stipendiary: The analyst's certificate of the milk of the producer casts a certain suspicion around your head that it was adulterated. Slimmon: I would not attempt to tamper with it.
