11 November, 1864 Opening of the Vochriw Schoolroom as a Place of Public Worship The Chancel attached to the schoolroom at Vochriw in the parish of Gelligaer, was opened for public worship on All Saints Day at 3 o'clock when litany was sung in Welsh by the Rev. J. Rosser, curate of Rhymney, and the sermon was preached by the Rev. Rees Price, rector of Llanvirinach. The chancel, which was occupied by the choir, is separated from the schoolroom and will be closed during weekdays by low doors and a curtain. It is very suitably fitted up with an altar table etc. raised on steps, and the floor is tastefully inlaid with tessellated pavement. The seats are temporary, it being proposed to place stalls as soon as a sufficiency of funds can be collected. A very large congregation was gathered together, and a great many of the clergy from the immediate neighbourhood was present, amongst whom we noticed the Rev. J. Griffiths, rector of Merthyr; Davies & Rowlands, Dowlais; Green, Pentrebach; Thomas, Lewis and Dr. Jones, Pontlottyn; Rogers, Rhymney; and Rev. G.C.F. Harries, Rector of Gellygaer, to whose writing exertions the erection of the building is due. 14 October 1865 Vochriw Independent Chapel A tea party was held her on Monday last, and received very good support. Several local ministers addressed the assembly. The proceeds of the evening are intended for the erection of a new Independent Chapel for this increasing neighbourhood.

21 October, 1865 <u>Vochriw Thanksgiving Service</u> The Rev. H. Lewis, Pontlottyn intoned and the Rev. Rowlands, Merthyr, preached the sermon. A collection was made for the National Society. Harvest Services took place at Pantywaun on the 12th inst. Rev. L. Price, Cyfarthfa, preached.

25 August, 1866 <u>The Vochriw: Tea Party</u> The children attending the Day and Sunday Schools at Vochriw were regaled with a good tea on Monday last by the Rector of Gellygaer. The usual games were resorted to after tea. The following ladies and gentlemen assisted with the day's arrangements: The Misses Johnson, Miss Loranie, Miss Watson, Miss Griffith etc. The Revs. G.C.F. Harris, D. Morgan, and Townley Esq.

"15 September, 1866 <u>Burial Ground at Fochriw</u> On Thursday last, 13 September, the Lord Bishop of the diocese consecrated the burying ground belonging to the Church at Vochriw. Several of the local clergy were present. A drenching rain was pouring down throughout the ceremony.

12 January 1867 <u>Ecclesiastical Appointment</u> The Rev. D. Morgan, late curate-in-charge of Vochrhiw, has now entered upon his duties as curate of Pontlottyn.

19 October, 1867 Pantywaun School Chapel On Monday evening last, a thanksgiving service for the harvest was held at the School Chapel, Pantywaun, when the Rev. F. Hughes, vicar of Aberavon, read the service in a most impressive manner, and the Rev. W. Evans, incumbent of Rhymney, preached, as usual, a most appropriate sermon on the Parable of the Tares. Every seat was occupied by an apparently very thoughtful and devout congregation who listened with eager attention to the soul-stirring remarks of the eloquent and truly practical preacher. The humns selected were very appropriate for the occasion. The congregational singing was most hearty, as also were the responses in the service, which prove how well the services are appreciated by the people. We are glad to learn that a good collection for the Llandaff Diocesan Church Extension Society was made after the sermon.

19 August 1871 <u>School Treat</u> On Thursday last, a treat was given to the pupils of the Vochriw National School by Rev. T. Theophilus and his congregation.

16 September 1871 <u>Vochriw</u> An entertainment will be held at the National School Room on Monday evening next. The Rev. T. Theophilus, the much respected curate, is about to leave the village, and this will be a farewell concert.

23 September 1871 Presentation to Rev. T. Theophilus On Tuesday week, a very interesting meeting was held at the National School, Vochriw, for the purpose of presenting a testimonial of respect to Rev. T. Theophilus, who has been but a short time curate in charge of the place, and who is about leaving for a similar capacity at Blackwood. The chair was taken by the Rev. J. Hughes, vicar of Pontlottyn. He called upon Mr. Harris to speak. The substance of his address was the great respect and love of which the reverend gentleman was held by the inhabitants of Vochriw generally. Mr. Turner, surgeon of Pontlottyn, next presented Mr. Theophilus with a purse containing £11. Mrs. Turner presented the tea and coffee service, after which Mr. William Rees of Vcohriw, presented Mrs. Theophilus with a pair of silver

candlesticks. Each present was accompanied by a short address, highly eulogistic to the reverend gentleman and his excellent lady. In reply, the Rev. T. Theophilus said: "I can assure you that the numerous kindnesses that I have received since the day of my coming amongst you to the very day I leave, are quite sufficient to leave in my mind a lasting recollection of the inhabitants of Vochriw. That memory would, however, have perished with myself, but these handsome presents of yours will, when you and I have been laid down under the green sod, serve to recall to the mind of someone or other to whom they will have been left, the existence in times gone by of a valuable affection on the part of the inhabitants of Vochriw towards a very humble member of the Church of England. It is gratifying for me to learn from you tonight that the non-conformist ministers of the neighbourhood, including their members, have cheerfully subscribed towards this substantial token of regard. Please accept my heartfelt thanks for this handsome token of your affection, and I only hope you will not measure the depth of my gratitude by my feeling words. My wife wishes me to express her thanks to you for having thought her humble service in connection with the harmonium and choir. It must have been very gratifying to Mr. Hames, choir master, as well as every member of the choir, that so emminent a musician as "Eos Llechyd" should have made such an honourable mention of the Vochriw choir in connection with the late church testimonial at Llandaff. The reverend gentleman resumed his seat amidst hearty applause. The proceedings were enlivened at intervals by some very excellent song given by Mrs. Harris and Mr. T. Hoskins. A vote of thanks to the chairman, and the singing of the National Anthem brought the proceedings to a close. The articles presented were supplied by Mr. J.D. Williams, jeweller, Merthyr. After the meeting, Mr. Theophilus and a few friends partook of an excellent supper provided by Mr. David Morgan, Rising Sun Inn, Vochriw.

16 August 1873 Laying Of Memorial Stones For The Primitive Methodist Chapel At Fochriw The ceremony of laying the memorial stones for the new Prinitive Methodist Chapel at Fochriw took place on Monday 11th August. Seven years ago, the Primitives began English speaking services at this place and have continued to do so in a small inconvenient dwelling room. Because of increasing demand for houses, they moved into the open air. Because of the coming winter, the Rev. J. Dinnick has entered into responsibilities of over £165 so as to accommodate over 100 persons. The building will be neat and substantial. It was commenced in faith because there were only eight regular members, working people, who had paid towards the undertaking £6.3s. The services of Monday were as follows: Mrs. W. L. Daniel of Merthyr laid the first memorial stone with her name inscribed upon it and placed thereon a cheque for £5 for herself and friends. Then eight purses were laid on the stone - Mrs. Norman £2-2-6, Mrs. Peadon £2, Mr. & Mrs. Brice £2-2-6, Mr. Worman £1-10-0, Simeon Worman £1-3-0, James Brice £1, James & Ann Glanville £1-16-0. The Rev. Dinnick placed on stones contributions from: G. T. Clark Esq. £5; Mrs. Williams, Vaynor £3; Mrs. Phillips, Fochriw £2-10-0; Mr. J. Davies £2-2-6; D. E. Williams Esq., Hirwain £2-2-0; T. Williams Esq., Goitre £1; Mr. J. D. Williams, jeweller £1-1-0; Mr. Morgan the Rising Sun, £1; Mr. Jones, Caeglas, £1 and several sums under one pound. The Rev. J. P. Bellingham, author of "Entemology & Christianity" spoke ably on the day we live in. He gave an exposition of the rise and progress of the Connexion. The Rev. J. Dinnick presented Mrs Daniel and Mrs. Thomas with two bound histories of the Connexion. The Rev. D. Jones, B.A., Merthyr, spoke in Welsh and English, and Rev. J. Griffith spoke in Welsh. Then 150 friends took tea. Mrs. Morgan Thomas laid the other memorial stone with her name on it and gave a sovereign to the chapel funds with a promise of more at the opening. The services were brought to a close and the total amount promised and given amounts to £50-7-7. The workmen engaged on the building were supplied with cake and tea on Tuesday morning.

4 July 1874 <u>Farewell Meeting</u> The Rev. J. Dinnick who has been in charge of the Primitive Methodist Mission in Merthyr and district for the past three years is leaving for Dover. A special service will take place in the Temperance Hall on Sunday and there will be a farewell meeting on Monday.

"Merthyr Express" 12 December 1874

<u>Anniversary</u> On Sunday and Monday last, the anniversary services connected with the Nazareth Congregational Chapel of this place were held, when most impressive and eloquent sermons were delivered for the occasion by the Revs. D. Thomas, Llangynidr; W. G. Williams,

Rhymney; J. E. Griffiths, Vochriw; and T. Rees, D.D., Swansea. The Revs. J. R. Davies, New Tredegar; R. Herbert (C.M.); J. P. Williams, Baptist, Pontlottyn; D. S. Evans and W. Griffiths, Rhymney; and Mr. J. John, Sirhowy, were also present, and took part in the introductory services. At the conclusion of each service, liberal collections were made towards the liquidation of the chapel debt, the handsome sum of upwards of £60 having been realised on this occasion. We are gratified to learn that the church and congregation assembled in this chapel under the ministry of the Rev. J. R. Williams, are at present in a progressive and satisfactory condition; and strenuous efforts are constantly being made to remove the burthen of debt now remaining on the chapel.

"Merthyr Express" 19 December 1874

<u>Carmel Chapel</u> On Sunday last anniversary services were held in the chapel, when the Rev. D. H. Rees of Bathania, Dowlais, preached eloquent and powerful sermons. All the services were very numerously attended, and liberal collections towards the chapel funds were made at the conclusion. The Rev. J. E. Griffiths, minister, and other reverend gentlemen were present, and took part in the introductory portion of the meetings.

"Merthyr Express" 12 June 1875

<u>An Open-Air Baptism at Pontlottyn</u> Last Sunday afternoon, the Rev. A. Tovey, English Baptist Minister, baptised two persons in the River Rhymney.

"Merthyr Express" 17 July 1875

<u>Demonstration of the Non-Conformist Sunday Schools of Rhymney & Pontlottyn</u> Since eight years ago, when the Rector of Gelligaer misrepresented the state of education in the parish, these schools have united in a general procession. A total of 1,985 scholars were in the procession which was one mile long.

"Merthyr Express" 8 January 1876

On Monday, December 27th, the Primitive Methodists held a Vochriw - Christmas Tree Christmas tree, tea, and concert in aid of the chapel fund. The Vochriw society and other friends worked hard and contributed to their substance to make the effort a success. When the tree was laden, it presented a pretty and attractive appearance. Friends in the neighbourhood kindly rendered help, and some at a distance were not unmindful in that respect. And although we cannot mention every one's name, we would not forget Mrs. Roden, who subscribed 15s.; Mr. Deacon, 10s.6d.; a friend in Somerset, 5s.; and others 2s.6d. each, and other smaller donations. A public tea was prepared in the afternoon, and over 100 persons partook of the good things provided. The concert was held in the evening, and the chapel was literally crammed, and many said "We never saw it in this fashion before." The Rev. H. Jones presided, and a very lengthy programme was gone through, consisting of songs, solos, choruses, readings and recitations. The audience showed their appreciation and delight of the performance by their frequent bursts of applause. The usual votes of thanks were given, and the meeting terminated about half past nine with the Doxology and Benediction. By the proceedings of the day the chapel will realise ± 10 for the reduction of the chapel debt, and we hereby tender our thanks to all who assisted.

"Merthyr Express" 11 August 1877

<u>Presentation at Carmel Congregational Chapel</u> The Rev. J. E. Griffiths is leaving for the English Congregational Church at Blaenavon after 7 years of great labour and service. A presentation of an illuminated address and a purse was made by Mr. T. Jones. Many ministers from surrounding districts were present.

"Merthyr Express" 28 December 1878

<u>Fochrhiw: Testimonial</u> On Monday evening a meeting was held in Carmel Congregational Chapel to present the minister, the Rev. W. Tibbot, with numerous volumes of books worth between £12 and £13. Mr. Thos. Jones presided. The ministers present were Revs. J. R. Williams, Pontlottyn; R. O. Jones, Nelson; and J. Jones, Deri. Also present were Messrs. J. Lewis, Brynrhe; D. Evans, Aberdare; and J. Evans (Ioan Gwent). After remarks from the chairman, the children's choir sang, under the leadership of Mr. H. M. Williams. The meeting was then addressed by Messrs. Williams, testimonial treasurer; D. Evans; Rev. J. Jones; Mr. J. Lewis; and Mr. W. Harris, testimonial secretary , who also gave statements of accounts. The books were presented by Misses Hannah Evans and Elizabeth Harris. After an address on the contents of the books given by Rev. J. R. Williams, Mr. J. Evans (Ioan Gwent) made a few remarks and read some verses he had composed for the occasion. Thanks were accorded to everyone that gave anything to the testimonial fund, and especially to the ladies that collected the money. The meeting terminated with prayer by the Rev. J. R. Williams.

"Merthyr Express" 15 November 1879

In Memoriam: The Rev Gilbert C.F. Harries, Rector of Gelligaer We have this week the painful duty of chronicling the decease of one of the most prominent figures in the clergy of this part of the diocese of Llandaff, in the person of the Rev. G. C. F. Harries, M.A., Rector of Gelligaer, and Canon of Llandaff. He was 51 years old at the time of his death. He was ordained deacon in 1851, and was appointed Rector of Gelligaer in 1862. The Marquis of Bute is the patron of this living, which is represented to be worth £669 a year by the tithe rent charge, yielding a net income of £485 with house and glebe. Mr. Harries was appointed to Gelligaer when many complaints were heard on all sides of the indifference of the previous holders of the living to the spiritual wants of the parish, although they were careful enough in its emoluments. The parish was undergoing a gradual but sensible transition from one of pure agriculture to a mixed condition of agriculture and mining, leading to an increase of population which settled in clusters around the various seats of mining industry. The ancient parish church was in a ruinous plight, so he commenced with the work of restoring the nave and chancel which were carried to completion a few years ago. Concurrently, churches and school churches - buildings which partook of the double character of being places of worship on Sunday and seats of education in the week, were opened at all the chief centres of population in the parish - Pontlottyn, Newton, Pantywain, Vochriw, Deri, Bargoed, and Cwmfelin. In this great work he obtained valuable assistance from wealthy friends, notably Mr. G. T. Clark, but the labour and the responsibility and anxiety all fell upon him - the fag ends of debts incurred here and there having at the last to be expunged out of his own private resources. Until the advent of the School Boards he conducted the National Schools without any very serious loss; but when the time came which threw these voluntary schools into competition with schools backed by all the resources of the parish, it was too arduous a task, an one after another he relinquished the charges into the hands of the School Board He was at one time a member of the Gelligaer School Board, but for the past four or five years withdrew from participation of the affairs of the parish on this Board - though he continued his connection with the Gelligaer Educational Charity, in the reformation of which, under the recent Act of Parliament, he took a deep interest. He was a fine example of the aggressive, combative, clergyman burning with zeal for the church whose faith he had vowed to disseminate It was impossible to do this and not stir up hostile feelings from some quarters, for in striking out right and left for the church to which he belonged it did sometimes happen that the zeal of the Rector stightly overstepped his direction; but errors of judgement are always overlooked, and certin it is that in the parish of Gelligaer, today, there are more deep and sincere mourners over the loss which the parish has sustained than the dissenters, with whom he has held hot argument so frequently, for they one and all recognised in him a clergyman faithful to his call and zealous for his Master's work, though far from infallible in the ways by which he sought to promote it. Mr. Harries was a widower. He married a daughter of the late David Evans, Esq., of the Brecon Old Bank, Merthyr, by whom he had numerous family, and who died some half dozen years ago.

<u>Centenary Of The Sunday School Movement</u> At Pontlottyn on Monday last, the Centenary of the Sunday School movement was celebrated by the Chapels and Church.

"Merthyr Express" 4 September 1880

On Thursday last, the 24th, the Church gave her annual Sunday school Sunday School Treat treat. The children with their teachers assembled in the mission church between two and three o'clock. A short service was said by the vicar of the parish, during which service the choir and children sang two hymns, accompanied on the piano by Miss Effie Kenty Jones. Service over, a procession was formed, headed by the clergy, and followed by the Bargoed Brass Band, and then the children, two deep, took up the rear. After having traversed some part of the neighbourhood, the procession returned to the schoolroom, when each child was satisfied with "te a bara brith." After the juvenile feast was over, the youngsters were dismissed to their juvenile games. Now commences the "tea fight" in earnest as 120 adults partook of the cup that does not inebriate; even my lady friends were satisfied with the cake. Mr. and Mrs. G. Phillips should be proud of having obtained such celebrity. Great praise is due to the ladies presiding at the tea table, namely, Mrs. and Miss Evans, Mrs. and Miss Pryse, Misses Morgan, Thomas and Breillat, and Mrs. James and Mrs. Bradley acquitted themselve remarkably well in the "brewing department;" and James, E. Lewis, Payne and Radley discharged their "cutting duties" most satisfactorily. The following clergymen were present: The Revs. T. Theophilus, vicar of the parish; J. L. Meredith, rector of Gelligaer; H. Harris and D. J. Jones, Rhymney; E. Evans, Deri; T. L. Davies and W. Jones Evans, Pontlottyn. There were also present the Misses E. & C. Theophilus, and Master Georgie, Mrs Jones Evans, and Miss Effie Kent Jones. After the "fight" was over, hundreds, including tea drinkers and sight seers, adjourned to the Marquis of Bute's park (the mountain side) to indulge in various games, some in dancing to the time of sweet music, discoursed by the Bargoed Brass Band, others in racing and jumping, and the other class in "Kissing in the ring." About eight o'clock the band struck up the finale, and then marched

home, and then little by little pleasure seekers began to disappear, till at nine o'clock stillness reigned on the mountainside.

"Merthyr Express" 11 September 1880

<u>Fochriw Sunday School Treat</u> Be good enough to put me right with my friends. The following were left out from my report of the treat: Miss M. Jane Harris who assisted Miss Morgan on No.3 table; also Messrs. Greening and Benjamin Williams. The former is the zealous, faithful and active superintendent of the Sunday School; the latter the secretary of the tea party committee, and was most indefatigable in his exertions to solicit subscriptions etc.. I must not forget Sergeant Phillips's name, who had the superintendence of the "fires" and "boiling" departments. I regret these names were missing from last week's report. CARACTACUS. "Merthyr Express" 25 September 1880

<u>The Mission Church at Vochriw</u> The mission church is progressing; the congregation as well as the number of communicants is steadily increasing. At the request of the respected vicar of the parish, a "parochial committee" has been appointed to look after the "temporalities" of the chuch, and to assist the clergy in their manifold duties.

"Merthyr Express" 9 October 1880

<u>Gelligaer Parish</u> The minutes of the Gelligaer Parochial Committee recommended acceptance of the tender of Mr. Jacob Williams of Pontlottyn for the construction of 15 feet of culvert for $\pounds 3$, and also that the plan of Mr. Thomas Jones, for a stable at Vochriw, be passed. Mr. L. D. Rees moved, and Mr. J. Jenkins seconded, the adoption of these minutes.

"Merthyr Express" 16 July 1881

<u>Church of England Sunday Schools</u> The St. Tyfaelog Sunday Schools had their great demonstration on Monday. It being "pay" Monday, an immense number congregated together and formed into a procession. The clergy headed the rank: Rev. T. Theophilus, vicar of Pontlottyn; Rev. T. L. Davies, curate; Rev. Canon Evans, vicar of Rhymney; Rev. E. Thomas & Rev. W. Jones, curates; Rev. W. Jones-Evans, Vochriw; Rev. J. Bowen Jones, Bargoed; Rev. S. Pryse, New Tredegar; Rev. E. Evans, Deri; Rev. Arthur Jones, St. Mary's Cardiff, Rev. W. James, curate. Following them came the Pontlottyn Brass Band and the children. After parading the streets they had tea and cake at the St. Tyfaelog Board Schools. The total strength of the muster was estimated to be about 480. Flags and banners added considerably to the gay appearance of the procession.

"Merthyr Express" 13 August 1881

Vochriw Church School The Church gave its Sunday School a treat on Thursday last. There was a large crowd, natives and aliens, to witness it. At 2.30 p.m. the vicar of the parish said a short service. No sooner was this over than the children and adults were formed into a procession, headed by the clergy and the brass band from Deri and Bargoed. After making the circle of the "city," young and old returned to the schoolroom, where ample provision was made for them. The feeding over, the ticket purchasers were allowed an innings. They partook of tea and cake from four different tables, which were served by Mrs. Richards, Mrs Morgan, Miss Kent Jones and Miss Jones-Evans, who were assisted by a staff of waitresses which was numerous and attentive. There was a grand display of flowers at each table, but not was so exquisite as that presented by Miss Harris. The greatest part of the large concourse subsequently adjourned to the Vochriw "park," which is an extensive one, some to dance to the sweet music of the band, others to amuse themselves with "kiss in the ring." We noticed, also, that the Vochriw Cricket Club were disporting itself, on the green sward close by. The clergy present, fewer than usual, owing to the Rhymney treat being on the same day, were Revs. T. Theophilus, vicar, J. L. Meredith, rector of Gelligaer, T. Williams, Dowlais, E. Evans, Deri, and W. Jones-Evans, curate of Vcohriw. The room was tastefully decorated by Miss Kent Jones and others.

"Merthyr Express" 1 October 1881

At 2.30 p.m. the Rev. T. Theophilus arrived, and at once proceeded to read a short service. The choir under the leadership of Mr. J. Harris did its part well, with Miss Kent Jones presiding at the harmonium. The unpropitious state of the weather prevented the usual procession. Now the onslaught on the "bara brith," etc. commenced - upwards of 100 "grinding mills" were at work - the fires were blazing - the water was boiling - the women converting it to tea - the waitresses were conveying it - and the children were eating and drinking. Isaac Cool, to address them. The rev. gentleman said that three months ago they met there under a dark cloud, and that great efforts had been made in the past to establish an English cause at Vochriw, but somehow or other every attempt had failed. But he was now pleased to tell them that the dark cloud had been removed. His labours had been, upon the whole, very successful under the circumstances. He had baptised nine, and received a few by letter. The church was now well-formed, and had selected three excellent deacons, namely, Messrs. James Morgan, Charles Jones and John Davies. After the morning service, the various ministers and students who had come to witness the ordination lunched together at Pentwyn in the dining hall of Mr. Llewellyn Davies, who is becoming an adept at providing lunch for large numbers in a satisfactory manner.

<u>Entertainment</u> On Tuesday evening last, the usual fortnightly entertainment was given by the Baptist friends at Zoar Hall, Pontlottyn. On this occasion, the Fochriw friends, in return for services rendered them some time back, came over and carried out a very successful programme. Their pastor Rev. D. Evans presided. Nest came a recitation entitled, "Washing Day," by Miss Eleanor Ellis, after which Messrs. Thomas Evans and Dan Evans gave a duet, "The Tonic Solfa lesson." Mr. James Davies recited in splendid manner "Y Gweddelod a'r lleuad," and a duet, "Home, sweet home," by Misses Mary and Ada Jones was very wekk rendered. "The tower of Babel," by Mr. Ellis and friends, elicited mudh

applause, while the duet by Dewi Buallt and Miss Thomas was also loudly encored, in response to which Miss Thomas sang "Paham mae Dai mor hyr yn dod?" A recitation by Me. For nearly three years, she diligently and ably presided at the harmonium, and her willing help in other directions could always be relied upon. Rev. J. M. Phillips and Mrs. Greening spoke. The miscellaneous part of the proceedings caused great satisfaction, and our hearty thanks are due to the many friends who so kindly and successfully contributed to the harmony of the evening. The chair was occupied by Rev. J. M. Williams, curate. Miss Harris accompanied the singers.

Soprano solo, "The Skylark," Miss E. Ballard; chorus, the choir; soprano solo, "The flower girl," Miss E. Thomas in full character; chorus, the choir; soprano solo, "The Clarion." Miss Jessie J. Angel (exceedingly well rendered); chorus, the choir. This concluded the first part. The second part began with a chorus from the choir, followed by a semi-chorus, "O, ye Maidens," Misses M. J. The chapel was crowded with friends from Pontlottyn, Bedlinog, Brithdir etc.. Mr. Bevan, coal agent, presided.

<u>Presentation</u> On Tuesday the 17th., the parishioners of the district of Fochriw met at Pentwyn Mission Church to present the Rev. J. Morgan Williams, their late curate, with an address and a writing-case as a token of the regard in which he was held by them. The church was crowded to excess, and the demeanour of everyone present indicated that the rev. gentleman had endeared himself to them, and that his departure to his new sphere at St. Bride's Minor, will be much regretted The address (which was most tastefully got up by Messrs. Farrant and Frost, Merthyr) was presented on behalf of the church members by Mrs. Phillips of Pentwyn, who hoped that there would be a bright future in store for Mr. Williams. He had been successful at Fochriw as the address testifies, and she hoped he would still continue to succeed and to labour, not for temporal things, but for that "eternal crown which fadeth not." The writing case was presented by Mrs. Lewis on behalf of the Welsh congregation in the most suitable terms. Mr. Williams responded. Other speakers were: Messrs. D. Phillips, D. Greening, Josiah Richards, and the Rev. D. L. Rees. During the evening, a capital programme was gone through, but the chief feature of the music of the evening was the able manner in which the Fochriw Brass Band acquitted itself. Bazaar at Vochriw On Wednesday and Thursday last, a grand bazaar was held at the Board Schools, Fochriw, in connection with Carmel Congregational Church. Every nook and corner of the building was put to some useful purpose. All the rooms were tastefully decorated with flags of different kinds and with pretty festoons in profusion. On the outside, from different points of the building, Union Jacks were waving in the breeze, and festoons stretched across the streets made Fochriw unusually gay. The bazaar proper was in the principal room: three large stalls of very pretty articles of all description. In addition there was a sweet stall, a toy stall, a fortune-telling booth, a lucky sack, and a table holding two electric batteries. Another room contained an exhibition kindly loaned by the Baptist Church at Fochriw for two days. In a third room was Professor Blavatsky, the phrenologist, a character very humorously sustained for the two days by Mr. Evan Evans. The two remaining rooms were for refreshments. The bazaar was liberally patronised by the residents of the locality for considerable distances around. By the end of the second day, every article had been exchanged for its value in money. The ham in the refreshment room was in great demand, and no wonder. It had been cooked to perfection by an old hand, Mrs. Davies, Brook-row. Mrs. H. W. Martin opened the bazaar, and was presented with a pretty terra cotta vase, made at Watcombe Potteries, inscribed "A Momento of Fochriw Bazaar opened by Mrs. H. W. Martin, June 29th 1892." During the first afternoon, the Fochriw Brass Band was in attendance outside, under the leadership of Mr. W. S. L. Berry of Merthyr. Inside, the Fochriw Glee Club, under Mr. B. Angell, rendered good service. The accompanist for the day was Miss Kent Jones of Deri. An admirable programme of entertainment was gone through, in which the following took part: Fochriw Brass Band, Fochriw Glee Club, Miss Ettie Kent Jones, Miss Davies, Mr. W. L. Berry, Mr. B. Angell and Mr. D. Jenkins. On Thursday, the bazaar was opened by Rev. J. Jones, who was also presented with a beautiful terra cotta vase by Dr. Davies. The musical programme for the afternoon included the same parties as appeared on the first day, with Miss Pugh, Miss S. A. Davies, and Mr. T. Francis, the accompanist being Miss M. J. Harries of Fochriw. Mr. James Davies also gave a recitation. The musical attraction of the afternoon was the performance of "The Japanese fan" by a party of little girls, trained by Miss Harris, assisted by Miss Mantle, Penybank School. They were all dressed in white, and carried Japanese fans in their hands. During the two days, about one thousand people visited the bazaar, which was a thorough success, far beyond expectation. The weather was glorious and contributed to the success. Great credit is due to Mrs. Davies, Ivor House and a committee of ladies for the way the whole affair was managed, and a host of willing hands who assisted them. The proceeds will at least reach £100 after paying expenses.

A fellow student of the pastor elect, in the person of Mr. J. Adams, opened the meeting by reading a portion of Scripture and offering prayer. The chair was taken hy the Rev. J. Evans, Abermeurig, Cardiganshire, who said he had known Mr. Morgan from boyhood. He felt sure that the new pastor would prove a hard-working and conscientious man, who would do his utmost to push on the good cause. Mr. Evan Morgan then spoke, promising to advance the cause amongst them. The following then spoke: Mr. David Morgan, New Tredegar; Rev. David Davies, Hermon, Dowlais; Mr. Thomas Jones, Dowlais; Rev. G. Davies, Deri; Mr. J. Adams; Rev. J. Thomas, Brynhyfryd, Rhymney; Mr. Evan George. Appropriate hymns were sung, and the proceedings were closed in prayer.

A novelty which greatly added to the attraction of the afternoon was a course of military manoeuvres which were gone through by Corpl. John Francis and his band of raw recruits.

Angell, Miss Sarah Ann Davies, Miss Lilian Williams, Miss Addie Phillips, Mr. John Evans and Mr. W. J. Angell. The Rev. D. Evans, of Nile, America, formally thanked Mrs. Phillips for her gift on behalf of the church, which she appropriately acknowledged. Mr. Rhys Thomas read an excellent paper on "The holiness of the vessels dedicated to divine service." Mr. H. W. Williams superintended the proceedings generally, while Miss M. A. Thomas and Miss Philpott efficiently acted as accompanists. The following ladies presided at the tables, and assisted materially in various ways: Mrs. James Davies and Miss Davies (Pentwyn), Mrs. C. M. Jones, Mrs. Mordecai Williams, Miss Bevan, Miss Thomas, Miss Jones and others. A mist enjoyable evening was spent.

Miss Margaretta Philpott accompanied to the satisfaction of all. Fochriw winners were: solo, "Y plentyn afradlon," divided between W. J. Angell, Fochriw, and J. Elias, Pantywain; solo girls under 10, "Enw'r Arglwydd Iesu," Blodwen Angell; alto solo, "Ple mae y naw," Blodwen Angell; hymn tune over 50, "Nebo," John M. Davies, Pentwyn; recitation under 14, "Hen Gymro fy ngwlad," Catherine Lewis. The feature of the eisteddfod was then arrived at, namely, the competition for female choirs, the test piece being "Bugeillio'r gwenith gwyn." Three choirs sang: Brook Minstrels (Miss Thomas), Pentwyn (Miss Pugh), and the Morlais Glee Party, Dowlais (Mrs Attwood). The declaration was given in favour of the Dowlais party. <u>Fochriw Curate and Constitutional Club: Institutions Denounced from the Pulpit</u> The Rev. John A. Rees, curate-in-charge of Fochriw, in the course of his sermon at Fochriw Church on Sunday evening, dealt with the question of the establishment of clubs in the mining districts. A large congregation had assembled in anticipation, it having become known that the reverend gentleman, who has initiated a crusade against the Fochriw Constitutional Club, intended to speak on the subject in the course of his address. Basing his remarks on Mark chap.10, v. 29, the reverend gentleman pointed out the duties of the truly God-fearing man and follower of Christ. Continuing, he said attempts were being made to introduce clubs into every hamlet throughout the parish of Pontlottyn, and the constituency generally. Institutions of this kind were never meant for small colliery districts, and those who thought they helped forward the Conservative cause by their establishment, were making a very serious mistake. Sensible men would either abstain from working for, or would vote against any candidate who, through his satellite, established and supported such institutions. A glance at the list of members showed that the best men, and the most respectable men of the district, were conspicuous by their absence. Respectable men looked askance at such clubs, the demoralising character of them being always apparent. Members of clubs had been seen pummelling one another in the streets and creating a commotion. The Fochriw Club only contained a drinking bar, and no books and periodicals, and only a couple of papers were provided, and scarcely any attempt had been made since its establishment to provide members with any mental or elevating recreation. It is true that care was taken for man's sporting proclivities, for a few childish games of the same character as the ring game and cards were provided. Surprise visits by the police might also prove instructive. He was told that the existence of these clubs depended almost entirely upon the quantity of drink consumed. If the success of Conservatism in the mining districts had to depend upon institutions of this kind, it was high time that the party was swept out of existence into Chamberlain's fiscal whirlpool. He appealed to the Conservative party in East Glamorgan to stay their hand, and at once undo the injury it had already caused. Failing that, they had no alternative but to appeal to the District Council to condemn the house as uninhabitable, for its sanitary arrangements were far from being satisfactory. Pontlottyn proper, it was to be hoped, would never see the establishment in their midst of such an institution. They might pray that the good lady of Maesyrhyddid, the owner of the estate, would give the political agents no quarter, and would see that no house on her property was utilised by any political party for club purposes. He appealed to those who were communicants and Church-goers to abstain from entering such places.

A gallery around the building is provided for, and Sunday School accommodation in the basement. The premises will be lit by acetylene gas. The contractor is Mr. W. Watts, Dowlais, and the architects are Messrs. James and Morgan, Cardiff. At the ceremony, the Rev. L. P. Davies, pastor, presided. Stones were laid by Mr. M. Roberts-Jones, Cardiff, the solicitor to the Rhymney Valley Miners' Association; Rev. J. R. Jones, Tabernacle, Pontypridd, on behalf of Mrs. Hopkin Morgan; Miss Bevan, Dowlais; and Miss Watts, Dowlais. Amongst others who took part in the proceedings were the Revs. Llew Morris, Pengam; L. John, Troedrhiwfuwch, Jas. Jones, Fochriw; R. Jones, G. R. Jones, Pontlottyn; D. B. David, Tredegar; H. Thomas, Deri; Messrs. T. Bevan, Dowlais, former manager of the Fochriw Colliery, and T. Evans, the secretary of the church. The collections for day amounted to over £100. A handsome silver trowel was presented by the architects and contractor to each person laying a stone. The visitors were entertained by Dr. Eleazer Davies, and Mr. J. H. Jones, the resident manager of the Fochriw Pits.

A Bible was also presented to Mr. William Lewis, who has acted as Sunday School Superintendent for nine years. The presentations were made by Mrs. Rees, wife of the Rev. J. A. Rees, the popular curate. On

Christmas Day, and on the following Sunday, the Church Choir rendered a service of song entitled "Christmas Chimes," the baton being wielded by Mr. John Hood, choirmaster.

The interior of the halls were beautifully decorated, and bore testimony to the arduous tasks of the secretary, Miss M. A. Lewis, and the treasurer, Miss M. A. Ballard, who were supported by a band of lady workers. The stalls were splendidly and tastefully decorated, and brisk sales were conducted throughout by the following ladies and gentlemen. The stalls, which were six in number, were as follows: Drapery Stall - Mrs. Davies and Mrs. Lewis; Drapery Stall - Mrs. Cole and Mrs. J. Thomas; Fancy Stall - Miss E. Evans and Miss A. G. Williams; Confectionery Stall - Mrs. A. Jones and Miss A. Phillips; Toy Stall - Miss G. Wright and Miss S. A. Evans; Drink Stall -Miss E. Morgan and Mr. J. Llewellyn. A band of ready and enthusiastic workers assisted at the Bran Tubs, etc. During the sales, pretty performances depicting National Welsh, Japanese, and Chinese costumes were given by the children, conducted by Miss E. Jones, schoolmistress, Deri. These were very good and much appreciated by the crowded audiences. Singing competitions and other interesting and laughable competitions were indulged in throughout both days. The able accompanist was as Mr. D. J. Thomas. The whole proceeds go towards augmenting the building funds of the new chapel. On both days previous to commencing, the principal streets were paraded by a procession headed by the Town Band. J. Edwards, Merthyr, and T. Teifi Davies, Trevecca. Powerful sermons were delivered to large and appreciative congregations. On Monday afternoon, Rev. J. Roderick, the late pastor of Salem, Tredegar, was installed as minister of the Church at Nazareth. Representatives of the monthly meetings of Monmouthshire and East Glamorgan attended. Rev. T. G. Edwards presided. Rev. James Jones (Cong) introduced the meeting with prayer. The history of the "call" was given by Mr. G. Pugh and Councillor J. Jones, and then the new pastor briefly gave the particulars of his acceptance. Mr. T. L. Davies, Tredegar, on behalf of the Monmouthshire Monthly Meeting, spoke very highly of Mr. Roderick's capabilities and the esteem in which he was held by his brethren across the border. Rev. Roderick is a popular preacher and an enthusiastic temperance worker. As a poet, he has already won fame at Eisteddfodau, being an expert "englynwr" and lyric poet. "Merthyr Express" 24 June 1905 <u>Confirmation</u> On Monday, 19 persons from Fochriw were confirmed at Rhymney Church by the Bishop of Llandaff. Most of these were grown-up persons, and are the fruits of the revival which has been strongly felt by all denominations in the village.

Davies, the respected pastor of the Baptist Church. This was not the first time for Mr. David to occupy the pulpit at Fochriw, he having preached here just before he left for America.

Sunday School Treat The Fochriw Church held their annual tea party on Thursday. A procession was formed at 3 o'clock at the Church, headed by the Rev. J. A. Rees, curate, the Rev. T. Rees, vicar, and the Rev. Mr. Stanley (Church Army missioner). The procession, about 220 strong, was headed by the Deri Brass Band, and wended its way through the streets. The band, under the leadership of Mr. William Powell, Fochriw, played select marches. Tea was taken in the Church, the tray holders being Mrs. J. H. Jones, Mrs. J. Richards, Miss Annie Rees and Miss Minnie Morgan, assisted by Miss A. Summers, Miss S. E. Williams, Miss J. Prosser, Mrs. William Wilton, Mrs. R. Thomas, Miss Emily Morgan, and Miss M. M. Jones. The band played several selections outside the Church before they adjourned to the mountain, where they played dance music, etc. The helpers at the tea were: Mrs. Jas. Davies, Mrs. Wm. Gabriel (Bargoed) was the adjudicator. Some of the compositions were of high merit, and the prize was awarded to one who sent in under the nom de guerre of 'Stainer."

<u>Presentation at Noddfa Chapel</u> On Tuesday se'nnight, a presentation meeting was held at the above Chapel, the Rev. L. P. Davies, minister, in the chair. The object of the meeting was to acknowledge the services of Miss Lilian Williams, who has been organist at the chapel for many years, and has served the church most faithfully. Mr. Thomas Evans, the precentor, made the presentation. Sergeant Williams spoke on behalf of the Church; Mr. Samuel Evans for the choir; and Mr. D. J. Thomas for the Sunday school. The present given Miss Williams was a chaste gold chain and pendant. Miss Williams acknowledged the gift with some well-chosen words. The following contributed to the entertainment: Miss Phyllis May Williams, Mr. Sydney Phillips and friend, Mrs. Thomas, Miss Edith A. Williams and Miss Mary Davies, Messrs. R. The seventh annual united singing festival was held at Carmel Chapel on Cymanfa Ganu Christmas Day. Mr John Jones, A.C., Fochriw, conducted. At the morning meeting, the Rev. Isaac Roderick presided, and the following programme was gone from: "Milwyr Dirwest," "Y Nefol Gor," "Ymdaith y Cristion," " Calon Lan," "Hedwn pe cawn," "Fugail Da," "Swn yr Ieuaino Glywir," "Old Winchester," and "Clodforwn Enw'r Iesu." The Rev. L. P. Davies presided over the afternoon session, which was opened by the Rev. R. D. Jenkins reading a portion of Scripture and offering prayer. The following tunes were then sung: "Hereford," "Berlin," "Henryd," "Penygraig," "Llanllyfni," "Bethesda," "Noddfa," "St. Bees," and "Dies Irae." The anthems "Gorphwysfa'r Saint" (D. Jenkins) and "Efe a Ddaw" (T. Price) were also rendered. The evening meeting was presided over by Rev. James Jones. The meeting was introduced by Miss M. Davies who recited a Psalm, and followed in prayer by the Rev. L P Davies. The following tunes were then proceeded with: "Tabor," "Rockingham," "Alexander," "Gwynfe," "Pisgah," "Stainer," (prize tune of last year's festival composed by Mr. Thomas Walters) "Arabia," "Gorphwysfa," "Beverley," and "Llandinam." The singing throughout the day reached a very high standard and praise is due to the conductor and choristers for the very effective rendering of the anthems. Addresses were delivered by the presidents, and also Messrs. T. Evans, E. Evans, and D. Davies (Llanbradach), who eulogised the manner in which the three denominations had operated during last few years to elevate the standard of congregational singing, and urged the churches to endeavour during the coming years to maintain the splendid results attained at this year's festival. The accompanists were Miss L. Williams and Messrs. Rod Jones and T. Walters. The prize for the best tune on the words "Dwy aden colomen pe cawn," was awarded to Mr. Thomas Walters, the organist of Carmel.

<u>Death of Reverend James Jones, Fochriw</u> It is with deep regret that we have to announce the death of the Reverend James Jones, Congregational minister, Fochriw, which took place on Thursday morning, after a brief illness, at his residence, Bryngolen, Fochriw. He was a native of Llangeler, Carmarthenshire, where he was born in the year 1865. His early years were spent at his home village and he was invited by the Congregational Church to enter the ministry. This he decided to do, being then only 15 years of age. He was educated at Llandysul Grammar School, and the Presbyterian College, Carmarthen. At the completion of his college career, he accepted the unanimous invitation of the members of Carmel Congregational Church, Fochriw, to become their pastor, and he was ordained to the full work of the ministry at Fochriw in November 1885.

He was a very edifying preacher, a successful minister, and a popular pastor. His death will be deeply felt by the members of the Church and the neighbourhood generally. In the year 1903,

he was appointed chairman of the North Glamorgan Congregational Union, which office he filled to the satisfaction of all. Upon vacating the chair, he delivered an impressive and instructive address on "The Christian and his Work," for which he was heartily thanked.

His Church work always received his first attention, and his leisure time he devoted in the interest of education. By all he was recognised as a keen educationist, and an able and well read thinker, who always proved himself equal to any task set him. He was a member of the late Gelligaer School Board, and for the last three years he was chairman of the Gelligaer Group of Managers.

One sad feature of his death is the fact that only three weeks ago, he was married to Miss Edith Cole, Fochriw (a certificated teacher), and had only returned the day previous to his death from Bournemouth, where the honeymoon had been spent.

The sad news of his death has cast a gloom over the whole neighbourhood, for he was generally well known and universally beloved by all with whom he came into contact, for his Christian spirit and devout life. He had not been in the best of health for about three months. Great sympathy is felt for Mrs. Jones in her sad affliction, and also for his aged father and three brothers who are left to mourn their loss.

<u>The Late Rev. James Jones: Memorial Service</u> On Monday evening, a memorial service was held at Carmel Chapel. The taking of the body by an early train on Tuesday morning via Merthyr to Llangeler, rendered it impossible for a large circle of friends to be present at the funeral. A memorial service was therefore arranged for Monday night. The chapel was filled to overflowing at an early hour. The Rev. J. R. Salmon, Pontlottyn, presided, and amongst the congregation were numerous minister friends of the deceased, as well as head teachers from the Gelligaer group of schools, and also, the widow and all members of the family.

There was a short service in the house, before the funeral left by special train for Merthyr at 8.30a.m., and afterwards to Llandysul at 9.55a.m.. The burial was at Saron, Llangeler. Hundreds of people from Fochriw went with the funeral train to Merthyr. About 40 Fochriw people went to Llangeler, among them Mr. John Evans and Mr. Evan Evans, deacons of Carmel, and Dr. Eleazer Davies and Mr. Rhys Jenkins.

<u>New Church and Institute at Fochriw: Foundation Stone Laid by Lord Tredegar</u> Church work in Fochriw has in late years progressed so rapidly under the care of the Rev. J. A. Rees, curatein-charge, that a new and capacious building has been commenced, the foundation stone of which was laid on Wednesday afternoon by Viscount Tredegar. The proceedings created a stir along the valley, and the Darran and Fochriw Stations were prettily decorated. His Lordship was greatly impressed by the heartiness of the greeting. As the train by which Viscount Tredegar travelled approached Darran station, a number of detonators exploded. Throughout the quiet village there was a liberal supply of bunting. At Fochriw itself, the excitement was intense.

The building, which has done service for the neighbourhood for many years, is situated right away on the mountain top at Pentwyn - a cold, bleak, unsheltered spot, and a march there on a winter's day is not easily forgotten. The building had fallen into a dilapidated state, and a new edifice was very desirable. Through the persistence of the Rev. Rees, upwards of £1,000 was collected as the nucleus of the fund for the erection of a new Church and Institute. He, too, obtained a site, free of charge, from Lord Bute, on the side of the main road leading to Pentwyn, and within easy access from Fochriw.

Lord Tredegar's Arrival His Lordship was met at the railway station by the clergy of the district: Rev. T. Jesse Jones, Rector of Gelligaer, who represented the Bishop; Rev. T. Theophilus, R.D., Tredegar; Rev. T. Rees, vicar of Pontlottyn; Rev. J. Llewellyn, vicar of Beaufort; Rev. D. Mathias, vicar of Caldicot; Rev. J. J. L. Thomas, vicar of Aberpergwm; Rev. G. E. T. Theophilus, Tredegar; Rev. J. A. Rees, curate of Fochriw; Rev. B. Glover, curate of Pontlottyn; Rev. Isaac Williams, curate of Rhymney; Rev. R. Morgan, curate of Brithdir. Outside the station, the "K" Company of the South Wales Borderers Volunteers lined up, under the command of Capt. W. R. Jackson, assisted by Lieut. Edwards and Sergt. Lott. His Lordship

inspected the company, and expressed to the captain his pleasure at seeing such a fine and smart lot of men.

A procession was then formed, headed by the Fochriw Band, under the conductorship of Mr. W. Powell. They were followed by a posse of police, in command of Inspector Canton, Dowlais, and Sergt. Gammon, Pontlottyn. The Church Lads' Brigade from Pontlottyn, under Capt. Vernall, came next, and then the Fochriw Ambulance Corps, headed by Dr. Eleazer Davies and Capt. W. J. Ballard, the Church Choir in surpluses, and of the Volunteers, who acted as a guard of honour. His Lordship, who was accompanied by Mrs. Forrestier Walker, Mrs. Col. Lindsay, and other ladies, then made their way to the site through a large crowd. Amongst the members of the general public present were: Col. M. Lindsay, Ystrad Mynach; Rev. J. Roderick, Fochriw; County Councillor D. W. Evans; Councillors J. Edwards, J. Llewellyn, L. Evans; Dr. E. Davies; Dr. J. Jones, Pontlottyn; Messrs. H. S. Martin, Dowlais; M. H. Sims, Deri; E. Evans, Fochriw; J. H. Jones, manager; J. E. Jones, Tirphil; and W. D. Phillips, Pontlottyn.

<u>Description of the Building</u> The Church, which has been dedicated to St. Mary the Virgin, will have seating accommodation in the main building for 300 persons. There will be a baptistry, choir chancel, transept, sacresty, and an organ chamber. The entrance is from the main road leading from Fochriw to Pentwyn. In the basement, there will be a Vestry or Institute, capable of seating 300, with an entrance on the north side. There will also be a cloakroom etc. The building will be heated throughout by hot air chambers. The walls will be lined with terra cotta. The total cost will be about £1,610. The contractors are Messrs. Williams & Sons, New Tredegar, and the plans were prepared by Mr. R. E. Douglas, Hoyland, London.

<u>The Stone-Laying</u> On reaching the site of the church, the Rev. J. A. Rees, gave out the hymns and offered prayer, and the Rector of Gelligaer, as the representative of the Bishop, and the Rev. T. Teophilus took part. Prior to the actual laying of the stone, his Lordship, Col. Lindsay, Mrs. Walker, Mrs. Lindsay, and others, signed a deed of dedication. His Lordship then laid the foundation stone and said that it was very gratifying to him to be present to take part in a service in that locality. There was no valley in which a place of worship was more needed. They lived in a place in which there were few amusements, and they were isolated as it were, from a district in which they could find amusements. He hoped that the Church would be a temple for God. (Cheers)

The Rev T. Rees said his Lordship had done a great deal for the advancement of the Christian faith, and he hoped that this would not be the least amongst the good things he had done. It was seldom that they saw his Lordship on the Glamorganshire side of the Rhymney River.

The Rector of Gelligaer also welcomed Lord Tredegar, and the Rev. Theophilus referred to the time when he first visited Fochriw, 37 years of ago, when he walked across the hill from New Tredegar. Then, the service at the Pentwyn Church was all in Welsh, and the Church provided the only elementary school in the district. He congratulated the Church people upon having a site which was more accessible to all the greater population. He was also glad to see that they were providing an institute. He also referred to the starting of a Church at Pontlottyn in a room adjoining a public house, and also at Troedrhiwfuwch.

<u>The Luncheon</u> Subsequently, the party marched back to the Council Schools, where an excellent luncheon was provided by Mr. Morgan of the Rising Sun, under the supervision of Mrs. W. D. Phillips, Mrs. Thomas (junr), and others. Reverend T. Rees, vicar of Pontlottyn, presided over the subsequent meeting. At the outset, the secretary, Mr. E. Griffiths, station master, read a financial statement showing that they had received by appeals £11, and by collections that day £34 2s. 5d. The building was to cost £1,610, so there was a deficiency of £567. The chairman proposed the toast of "The King," which was heartily drunk. Dr. Eleazer Davies proposed the toast of "The spiritual and temporal forces," and observed that the site witnessed at Fochriw that day would be remembered for a long time. Rev. Theophilus responded on behalf of the spiritual forces, and spoke of the energy and perseverance of will of the Rev. J. A. Rees in the district, which was a credit to him, and an honour to the vicar. (hear, hear) Rev. J. Roderick, in replying on behalf of the non-conformists, said that although they were of a different sect, they were aiming at the same goal, and they all looked to God as the finisher of their faith. The different sections worked in unison at Fochriw, but still there was

room for improvement (hear, hear). Capt. Jackson responded briefly on behalf of the temporal forces.

Lord Tredegar and Poorly Paid Clergy Rev. J. A. Rees next proposed the health of Viscount Tredegar. He said his Lordship had, at tremendous sacrifices, graciously condescended to leave the beautiful surroundings of Tredegar Park to visit the mountainous heights of Fochriw. Their guest was regarded as Wales' champion bazaar opener. His Lordship's experience that day was by no means a new one, and he would now be regarded as the champion ecclesiastical foundation stonelayer. His presence had a most beneficial effect at gatherings of that nature. Any movement for the advancement of the Church or the alleviation of suffering always had the support of his Lordship. His kindness and love brought sunshine and happiness to many a home. He was truly one of Wales's noblest sons (applause).

In responding, Lord Tredegar said he had the greatest sympathy with all denominations. The clergy and ministers were hard-working men, and were poorly paid. He hoped that the church at Fochriw when completed would be filled, and that the real and true gospel would be preached there.

Speeches were delivered by the Reverend Isaac Roderick, minister, Councillor John Jones, and Captain Jones, Fochriw, all congratulating the Sewing Guild upon its great success during its first season of work. Thanks were also given to Mrs. M. J. Roderick, president; Mrs. S. A. Jones, secretary, and Mrs. H. Roberts, treasurer of the guild. The latter part of the day was spent very enjoyably at Aberglais Pleasure Ground.

7 March 1908 <u>Soiree</u> On Monday night, a soiree was held in connection with the Mutual Improvement Society of Noddfa Baptist Chapel. There was a large number present. The tables were presided over and assistance rendered by the following ladies: Mrs. C. M. Jones, Aelybryn; Mrs. M. Williams and Mrs. (P.S.) Williams, Dynevor-street; Mrs. (Capt.) Edwards, Pleasant View, Miss Mary Evans, Miss Jones, Miss U. Jones, and Miss J. Thomas. Mr. James Williams, Brynawel, also lent assistance, and the caterer was Mr. G. Phillips. A well-arranged programme of music, etc., followed. P.S. Willams presided. An address was given by Mr. John Williams; a recitation by Mr. David James Thomas; and songs by Messrs. John Edwards and Thomas Evans. The accompaniments were played by Mr. D. J. Thomas. A vote of thanks to the chairman brought an enjoyable evening to a close.

Rees, curate-in-charge, presided over an appreciative audience. 14 March 1908 <u>Baptist Chapel</u> The Rev. R. S. Rogers, pastor of the Welsh Baptist Chapel, Pontlottyn, occupied the pulpit of the Baptist chapel on Sunday last, and preached impressive sermons to appreciative congregations.

14 March 1908 <u>St David's Celebration</u> The pastor of Nazareth Chapel, the Rev. Isaac Roderick, gave an address to the members of the Band of Hope last week on St. David, the Welsh patron of the Fifth Century. Very vivid sketches of the saint's character were related to the children, which were very interesting and instructive to all, and created a very deep impression on the minds of the children. An excellent programme of recitations and songs was given by members of the Band of Hope.

Cwmwysg, spoke of their great loss at the departure of Mr. Jones. The Rev. Isaac Roderick, minister of Nazareth, extended a hearty welcome on behalf of the inhabitants of Fochriw.

There were 1,784 candidates from East Glamorgan sitting this examination. The majority of the Fochriw candidates passed in the first Division, and one of them secured the eighth position on the list. They were trained by the Rev. Isaac Roderick.

10 July 1909 <u>Treat</u> On Thursday week, the children of Carmel, Nazareth and Noddfa Sunday Schools had their annual treat. The children of Carmel marched down to the Council School, where they were joined by the children of Nazareth Sunday school. They then proceeded, headed by the Fochriw Brass Band, to Noddfa Baptist Chapel, where they were joined by the children of that school. The scholars, who now numbered 600, then paraded the streets of the villages of Fochriw and Pentwyn, the band playing lively march tunes en route. After the parade, the children returned to the vestries of their respective churches for tea. The tables were tastefully decorated, and there were many willing helpers. The children were then presented with toys, fruit, etc, after which they went to the mountain, where various games were played. The Band played lively music, and dancing was indulged in by a large number.

11 March 1911 <u>St. David's Day Festival: Noddfa</u> On St. David's Night, a large number attended the Vestry, and after partaking of the good things provided, Mr. D. Thomas and Mr. J. Williams had a heated debate on 'Should Women have the Vote?' This was followed by an address on 'The Inpriority of Women.' Recitations and solos were rendered by Misses Enid & E. A. Evans, Phillys Williams, Mr. John Evans and Mr. Tom Evans. The entertainment was conducted entirely in Welsh, several being fined for a breach of the law - 'Dim Saesneg,' while others were mute, fearing the imposed fine of 1d. per word. Miss M. Morgan assisted at the piano.

11 March 1911 <u>St. David's Festival: Carmel</u> A large number of members and friends met at Carmel on St. David's Night. Dr. Eleazer Davies took the chair. The programme was contributed to by the following: solo, 'Gwlad y Debyn,' Miss Ceredwen Thomas; Ladies' Choir, conductress Miss Elizabeth Jones - 'Gagomant I Gymru;' solo, 'Sirch Hiudol,' Miss Nelly Roberts (Anglesea); paper on 'Ben Bowen fel Gwladgarwr,' by Mr. George Thomas, words composed by Rev. D. Hughes's brother; Mixed Choir, conducted by Mr. D. John Thomas - 'Anywh-yw-Cymru;' penillion singing - Mr. D. J. Thomas and Miss E. Jones; paper on the late Mr. Tom Ellis by Mrs. Edith Cole Jones; sketch entitled 'Rhys Lewis,' the following taking part: Miss Rachel Walters, Mr. James Williams, Mr. Arthur Ballard, Mrs. Howell Thomas, Mr. Tom Jones, Miss Mariah Rees, Mr. James Jones, Mr. D. Lewis, Miss A. G. Williams, Mr. Samuel Lewis. The accompanists were Mr. Thomas Walters and Miss Hannah Evans.

11 March 1911 <u>Pentwyn</u> 'Heredity' was the subject of a paper read at Pentwyn Church on St. David's Night by Mr. J. C. Payne. A good number attended.

18 March 1911 <u>Half-Yearly Meetings</u> On Sunday last, the pulpit of Noddfa was occupied by Rev. W. Morris, Treorchy, and his sermons were evangelic, edifying and most inspiring.

18 March 1911 <u>Noddfa</u> Last Wednesday evening, a lecture was delivered under the auspices of the Noddfa Young People's meeting by Mrs. E. Glyn Price, Gelli, on 'Brenin Pulpudau y Bud.' Mrs. Price is well known throughout the principality as a lecturer and elocutionist.

25 March 1911 <u>Pentwyn</u> An excellent paper was read at Pentwyn Church by Mr. Albert Evans, Penydarren, on 'Are the Clergy Underpaid?' There was a large attendance, and the paper was greatly appreciated.

8 April, 1911 <u>Noddfa: Lecture</u> A large number were present at Noddfa Vestry on Wednesday evening week, to listen to an excellent lecture delivered by the Rev. D. P. Evans, Merthyr Vale. The subject of the lecture was, 'The Message of the Church of the First Century to the Church of the Present Day." The subject was dealt with in a very able manner by the reverend gentleman, and was much appreciated by all present. The chair was occupied by the Rev. M. S. Young. The usual votes of thanks brought an enjoyable evening to a close.

8 April, 1911 <u>Noddfa Bazaar</u> The result of the bazaar and sale of work held some time ago in aid of Noddfa Church was given on Sunday night. The handsome sum of £157 was realised. Credit is due to all who worked hard and unceasingly for the success of the effort. Over £800

has been cleared off the debt on the building in a little over six years, which speaks well for the zeal of the members, who number only 100.

There was great joy amongst the members on Sunday night when the pastor, the Rev. M. S. young, stated that he had decided to remain with them. About three weeks ago, Rev. Young received an unanimous call from the members of Tonyfelin Baptist Church, Caerphilly, to become their pastor, which he declined to accept. It should be stated that in refusing the call to Caerphilly, and remaining at Fochriw, the reverend gentleman has made a great financial sacrifice. He is greatly loved by all.

15 April, 1911 <u>The Graveyard</u> Large numbers visited the graveyard during the day (Palm Sunday). A good number of the graves were nicely decorated with beautiful flowers.

15 April, 1911 <u>Pentwyn Church</u> On Sunday afternoon, a memorial service in memory of the departed was held at this Church. The service, which was very impressive, was taken by the of the vicar of the parish, the Rev. Thomas Rees, who preached an inspiring sermon, taking his text from Genesis 23. v. 9. The lesson, which was I Thessalonians 4. v. 13 to the end, was read by Mr. J. C. Payne, lay reader. Appropriate hymns were sung. Mr. Brown presided at the organ. There were a large number present.

22 April, 1911 Nazareth C M. The members and the children of this Church celebrated Good Friday with a social tea and a competitive meeting, with subjects generally bearing on the Crucifixion. The following served at the tables: Misses Martha Davies, Lizzie Davies, Elizabeth Ann Parry, Mary Jane Davies, Beatrice Jones, Mrs. Elias Davies, Mrs. Captain Jones, Mrs. J. D Jones, Mrs. I Roderick, and Mrs. J Jones. After the tea, Mr. J. D. Jones presided at the very successful competitive meetings. The adjudicators were: music - Mr. W. J. Angell; literature - Rev. I. Roderick. The awards were as follows: essay - 'Pren y groes' - William Jones; recitation - 'Griddfanau'r ardd' - 1. Doris Davies, 2. Edith Parry; duet - 'A friend in the Homeland' - Martha Davis and Lizzie Davies; quartette - 'Y bwthyn ar y bryn' - R. Ellis Davies, John Davies, Annie Maude Jones, and Martha Davies; solo for children - 'Nazareth' - Hilda Davies; dialogue - 'Y goleuni a'r tywyllwch' - Edith Parry and Doris Davies; solo - 'Dagrau'r Iesu' - Mrs. Blodwen Davies; solo - "He was depressed" - Lizzie Davies; solo - 'Henryd' -Martha Davies; essay - 'Parham yr wyf yn Fethodist' - William Jones; a letter from a pupil to his master - Mary Jane Jones; trio - 'Bydd canu yn y nefoedd' - William Morris, John Davies, R Ellis Davies; children's chorus - 'Awn y Bethania' - Nazareth children; speech by Councillor John Jones. The following worked very energetically for the success of the meeting: Messrs. Roderick Jones, secretary; Edward Parry treasurer; William Jones, chairman.

22 April, 1911 Pentwyn Church On Easter Sunday evening, the members of the Fochriw Division of the Dowlais Corps of the St. John Ambulance attended Pentwyn Church, under the command of Supt. W. J. Ballard. They were accompanied by their honorary surgeon, Dr. Eleazer Davies. The brigade presented a smart appearance in their ambulance dress. The pulpit was occupied by Mr. J.C. Payne, lay reader, who first preached a resurrection sermon, St Luke, 24, 34 - 'The Lord is risen indeed.' He afterwards delivered an address on the parable of the Good Samaritan, taking his text from St. Luke 10, v. 37. In the course of his address he stated that the members of the St John Ambulance were doing to their injured and wounded brethren, what the Good Samaritan did to the wounded man on the road between Jerusalem and Jericho -'rendering first day.' They should consider men of every nation as their brothers; and when they fell treat them as neighbours. All sprang from one stock: for God 'hath made of one blood all nations of men.' When they saw a man, they saw a brother, and should treat him with kindness. He urged them to imitate God in pity and compassion. Every one of them would do, he felt sure, risk life and limb in order to alleviate wounded and suffering humanity. The accounts were presented by the Mr. J. C. Payne, lay reader, and adopted. The vicar thanked one and all for their good work in the Church. The following side'smen were elected: Vicar's – Messrs. Frank Attwell, Morgan Parry, and Thomas Jones. Peoples' – Messrs. Albert Tyler, Ernest Jones and Evan Watkins. A hearty vote of thanks was accorded to the vicar.

29 April, 1911 <u>St. Mary's Church</u> The annual meeting in connection with this Church was held in the Institute, on Friday evening last, and was presided over by the Rev. T. Rees, Vicar. The building and ordinary collection accounts were presented by Mr. J. C. Payne, and were adopted. The vicar thanked the Rev. R Jones, curate-in-charge, for his work in the Church, and expressed his sorrow at his impending departure from the parish. He also thanked all those who worked in and for the Church. Rev. Jones is leaving for Merthyr shortly. The following sidesmen were elected: Vicar's – Messrs. William Davies, William Sibley and Samuel Way: People's – Messrs. Josiah Richards, Charles Payne, and William Payne.

29 April, 1911 <u>Presentation</u> A very interesting meeting was held at Carmel vestry on Sunday last, when Mr. W. J. Angell was presented with a silver-mounted ebony baton. The Committee connected with the performances of 'Aladdin' decided to make him a little presentation for his excellent work among the children. The presentation was made by Mrs. E. C. Jones, who made reference to Mr. Angell's many good points, genial manner, and his popularity with the little ones. Mr. J. Evans, superintendent, and Mrs. David Lewis, also spoke. Songs and choruses were rendered by the children. The secretarial duties were carried out by Mr. Thomas Lewis and Mr. D. M. Davies acted as treasurer.

3 June 1911 <u>Nazareth C. M.</u> The half yearly meetings were held on Sunday and Monday last. The preacher was the Rev. J. Wilson Roberts, Ynyshir, who preached four powerful and instructive sermons to large congregations. Substantial collections were made for the support of the Church. The singing was conducted by Mr. William Morris, and Mr. Roderick Jones presided at the organ.

10 June 1911 Pentwyn Church: Presentation to Mr. J. C. Payne Mr. John Mantle, being the oldest member of Pentwyn Church, was chosen to present Mr. Payne with a gold watch, albert and pendant, the inscription on the watch being as follows: "Presented to Mr. J. C. Payne by the Pentwyn Church people and his many friends in appreciation of his voluntary services as layreader, June 1st, 1911." In the unavoidable absence of Mr. Mantle through serious illness, the presentation was made by his daughter, Mrs. Lewis. In Mr. Mantle's address, which was read out by Mrs. Lewis, Mr. Mantle said: "It is a great and particular pleasure as a member of Pentwyn Church to have the honour conferred upon me of performing this little duty. Mr. Joseph Payne is a firm friend of mine, in personal and Christian ways. I must say that I have known him from his childhood, a period of about 30 years. As a scholar in the Sunday School, he has filled almost every branch of work, from a scholar up to a superintendent. His ministerial career commenced about 10 years ago, when he preached his first sermon at Pentwyn Church. It gave me great joy when I learnt that he had chosen the work of the Master. As a lay reader, he uses his great religious opportunities with zeal, discretion and self devotion. He is unwearied in his efforts, and is the centre of much active Christian work. He is an excellent and eloquent preacher. He works so hard amongst the people of Pentwyn. He is a splendid visitor of the sick, and not an empty handed visitor, whether his own flock or not. He is full of vigour and loves his own flock as his own Master. May the blessings of the supreme hour be poured upon Mr. Payne to guide and strengthen him to continue the noble work which he has commenced." Mrs. Attwell then presented Mr. Payne with a purse. She said, "The saying is, 'A prophet is not respected in his own country.' In many cases this is true. In Mr. Payne, who was born and bred in Fochriw, we have the grand exception. He is more that respected: he is loved by one and all. I have great pleasure, on behalf of the members of Pentwyn Church, and his many friends, in presenting Mr. Payne with this purse, and sincere hopes that God will spare him for many years to come to labour in his vineyard, and that he will crown his humble efforts with success." Mr. Payne responded saying, "On occasions like this one feels how feeble words are to express one's great feelings. You can easily understand with what emotion I look upon these your

splendid gifts, in recognition of spiritual work done in your midst. It is a joy to me to have kept the light of Christianity burning, however feebly, in Pentwyn Church. Our dear old church, situated at the top of the hill, since it sends its shadows over the dust of so many of our friends who have departed this life in the Christian faith, is a place of sacred memories. Such a place should occupy a central place in the affections of surrounding Christians. I feel deeply thankful to God, who has enabled me to advance his kingdom in this parish for so many years. I have been a lay reader for over ten years, and have been in charge of Pentwyn Church since December 1909, and during the whole time I have met with nothing but kindness and sympathy, at the hands of my flock, and my Nonconformist friends. I shall go away from this kindly and generous assembly conscious that God has blessed my humble spiritual efforts here, and if God spares me, to labour in His vineyard for another 20 or 30 years. I shall still, more than ever, need your help and co-operation, your sympathy and your prayers." E. Williams, Lydia Thomas, Mrs. Price, Mrs. M. Davies and others. The attendance was good, and the arrangements admirably carried out. Several of the Siloh (Penybank) Sunday school scholars were present.

1 July 1911 <u>Nazareth</u> The Sunday school turned out in strong numbers. After the procession, they returned to their chapel, where tea was provided. The chapel was decorated very tastefully for the occasion. The following ladies served at tables: Mrs. S. A. Jones, Mrs. Maggie Davis, Mrs. J. Jones, Mrs. Elias Davies, Mrs. H. Roberts, Mrs. Edgar, Mrs. I. Roderick, Mrs. Martha Parry, Mrs. Jennie Jones, Miss Mary Laurence, Miss Beatrice Jones, Miss Gwennie Rees. Assistance was rendered by Messrs. Peter Jones, Edward Parry, J. M. Jones, William Morris, William Jones, Griffith Pugh, Janes Lawrence, J. D. Jones, Rev. Isaac Roderick. After tea, Councillor J. Jones, on behalf of the school, presented all the children with coronation mugs, which were of a very pretty design.

1 July 1911 <u>Carmel</u> After the procession, Camel children went to the chapel vestry, where a rich spread had been provided. The tables were tastefully decorated, and were loaded with good things, to which the children did ample justice. The tables were presided over, and assistance of rendered, by the following: Mrs. D. The children were presented with coronation mugs.

1 July 1911 Pentwyn The children of Pentwyn Sunday school and Penybank Day school met together at 1:30 p.m. at Pentwyn Church, where an appropriate service was conducted by the Mr. J. C. Payne, lay reader, who also delivered a suitable address. The National anthem was sung, as well as appropriate hymns. A procession was formed, and it then paraded the village of Pentwyn, the children singing en route 'Onward, Christian Soldiers.' On their return march, a circle was formed outside the Church and the National Anthem sung once again. All then returned to the vestry, where tea was taken. The room was gaily decorated, Mr. F. Attwell and Mrs. Lewis being responsible. The tables were daintily laid out, and were filled with everything that was pleasant to the eye. The day was brought to a close by an entertainment, an excellent programme being arranged. The following contributed: address - Mr. Payne; recitation - 'Little Bessie' - Miss Blodwen Watkins; recitation - 'Going to Church' - Master W. T. Williams; song 'Come and have a drink with me' - Mr. Bert Tyler; recitation - 'Man the Lifeboat' - Mrs. W. Gwynne; solo - 'The Lord is mindful of His own' - Mrs. Lewis; selections on the mouth organ -Mr. F. Attwell; solo - 'Don't get married on a Friday" - Mr. Ernest Jones; solo - 'A flower from Mother's grave" - Mr. T. Morgan; address - Mr. John Pugh; solo- 'Father, Pray for me tonight" - Miss M. Tyler. A keen competition then took place for adults, the test piece being the first verse of 'Jesu, Lover of my Soul.' The first prize was secured by Mrs. Morgan, and the second divided between Mrs. Lewis and Miss Mary Tyler. A similar competition for children under 14 years of age was held, the test piece being the first verse of 'Loving Shepherd of Thy sheep.' The first prize was divided between Miss Blodwen Williams and Miss Mary Lewis. The entertainment was presided over by Mrs. M. F. Morgan. Mr. William Lewis, superintendent of the Sunday school, worked hard and unceasingly, from the very first, to bring the tea to a successful issue. Sweets were given to all the scholars.

22 July 1911 <u>Pentwyn Church</u> The Pentwyn Church Sunday School tea took place on Investiture Day. The scholars met in Church at 1:30 for a short service. After this, the scholars formed a procession, and headed by the Pontlottyn Brass Band, under the conductorship of Mr. William Mantle, paraded the streets of the villages of Fochriw and Pentwyn, the band playing appropriate music en route. The procession was large, and was also a very pretty sight with all the children in their nice dresses. After the procession, tea was taken, the tables being laid out to perfection. After tea, an excellent programme of sports was held.

29 July 1911 <u>Presentation</u> At Carmel vestry on Monday evening, Mrs. Elizabeth Lewis of Clydach Vale was presented with a marble clock by her Fochriw friends, on the occasion of her marriage and departure from Fochriw. Mrs. Lewis has taken a very active part in the public life of Fochriw and surrounding area, especially as a public singer of a high order. She will be greatly missed. Rev. D. Hughes Jones, Rev. R. D. Jenkins, and Mr. James Williams, spoke highly of her ability and willingness at all times to serve all good causes in the district. Mrs. Lewis very suitably thanked her friends for this token of respect towards her.

12 August 1911 <u>St Mary's</u> The annual tea in connection with St. Mary's Sunday School was held at the Institute on Tuesday last. The day was delightfully fine. The children met in Church. A short service was conducted by the Rev. A. E. Snow. After the service, a procession was formed, and, headed by the Fochriw Brass Band, the streets of the villages of Pentwyn and Fochriw were paraded. The band played appropriate music under its conductor Mr. William Powell. The procession was marshalled by the Vicar, Rev. Snow, Mr. Charles Payne, Mr. Williams, and Mr. William Davis. Later, tea was provided in the Institute. After tea, there were sports in the field near the Church, which was lent by Mr. Robert Slimmon, Fochriw Farm. The events included foot races, marathon races, tug-of-war, etc. The officials were Messrs. William Davis, (Manager), T. Williams, (Mechanic), T. Harris, Morgan Jones, and A. E. Evans. Messrs. Morgan Parry and Arthur Coggan also worked well, and collected a good sum towards the sports. Sweets were given to the scholars and helpers.

23 September 1911 <u>Anniversary</u> The anniversary services in connection with Noddfa Baptist Chapel were held on Saturday evening, Sunday and Monday, when excellent and

inspiring sermons were preached by Professor M. B. Owen, Carmarthen, and Rev. R. Jones, Tabarnacle, Merthyr. All the services were well-attended.

23 September 1911 <u>Pentwyn Church</u> A service was held at Pentwyn Church on Sunday evening in memory of the late Mr. Prosser, landlord of the Penybank hotel, and also of Emily, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Tyler, Pentwyn. The service was conducted by Mr. J. C. Payne, lay reader, who also preached the sermon, taking his text from Psalm 90, v. 9: "We spend our years as a tale that is told." Appropriate hymns were sung by the choir conducted by the Mr. John Wood. Mr. Brown presided at the organ and played the "Dead March in Saul," the congregation standing. The Church was filled.

23 September 1911 <u>Carmel</u> On Sunday evening, a memorial service in commemoration of the late Thomas Jenkins, Dynevor-street, was held at the chapel. The pastor, the Rev. D. Hughes Jones, officiated. High tribute was paid the deceased as a faithful and conscientious Christian. At the close of the sermon, the "Dead March in Saul" was played by the organist, Mr. Thomas Walters.

7 October 1911 <u>Harvest Festival</u> Harvest Thanksgiving services were held at Nazareth chapel on Thursday week, and were well attended.

7 October 1911 <u>St. Mary's Church</u> Dedication Festival Services were held on Friday, Saturday, Sunday, and Wednesday. The preachers were as follows: Friday - the Rev. J. Davies, Deri; Sunday - the Rev. F. Rowlands, Tredegar; Wednesday - the Rev. W. K. Urquhart, Dowlais. Holy Communion was celebrated at 8a.m. on Saturday and Sunday. The Services were very well attended, and the sermons were most inspiring. Master Octavius Richards was at the organ, and Mr. John Williams conducted the singing.

7 October 1911 <u>Concert</u> A successful concert was held at St. Mary's Institute on Monday, the proceeds going towards paying off the debt on the building. The Rev. T. Rees, vicar, presided, and delivered an appropriate address. The programme was as follows: pianoforte solo – Mr. Jones, Pontlottyn; duet – Messrs. Shankland and Morris, Fochriw, "Bydd bur I Cymru Fad;" solo – Mrs. Probert, Pontlottyn, "Holy City," encore, "Bells of Aberdovey;" violin solo - Miss L. Isaacs, "Song without words," also encored; solo, Mr. C. Shankland, "Merch y Cadben;" solo, "Dream of Paradise," Miss Hughes, Pontlottyn; duet, Mr. C. Sahknand and Mr. Wm. The chair was occupied by Mr. William Jones, who gave a short address, after which an inspiring paper was read by the Rev. Isaac Roderick on "Islwyn," the greatest Welsh poet of the 19th century. He introduced the subject by describing the district of Ynysddu and Mynyddislwyn in the lower part of the Sirhowy Valley, where Islwyn at one time lived. He pointed out the influence of this environment on the poets mind. Islwyn started a new era in Welsh poetry. He departed from the old fashioned school, and led the younger poets of his day into new fields of thought. It is true that he composed many songs to the beauties of nature, but to him these were only secondary things. He sought a richer field than that of nature in the soul of man, and that great soul was always in touch with the spiritual and eternal. He studied man, and sang to the vastness of his living soul. In this sense he was a psychological poet. The speaker gave a very interesting account of his poetical works, and dealt very fully with Islwyn's masterpiece, "The Storm." Some parts of this poem, said Mr. Roderick, dealt with the natural storm, but he sang more particularly to the storm of sin and suffering in the soul of man. Suddenly, he rejoiced to see the light of the Sun of Righteousness clearing away the clouds and filling the soul with joy and peace. Islwyn died when he was 47 years of age, but his name will remain evergreen in the history of Wales. It was an excellent paper, and everyone thoroughly enjoyed it. A competitive meeting followed, in which the following children won prizes: Misses Doris Davies, Edith Parry, Maggie Davis, Mary Jane Jones, Katie Jones Davies. Mr. William Morris sang a solo, and Mr. Roderick Jones presided at the organ.

16 December 1911 <u>Carmel</u> The fortnightly meeting of the Carmel Literary and Debating Society was held at the Vestry on Wednesday evening, and was presided over by the Rev. D. H. Jones. An excellent paper was read by Mrs. Dr. Davies on "Modern Civilisation and its effects on dress: is it defensible?" The reader dealt chiefly with furs - the cruelty attached to the trapping and slaughtering, and, the suffering of the poor animals, in order to satisfy the craving of ladies for personal adornment. The catching of the seal was described in the most pathetic manner. The cruel mode of trapping the beaver and ermine were also explained. The reader

maintained that a better method of destroying fur-producing animals should be adopted, that death should be instantaneous, whereas at present, skins were often stripped off when the animal was still alive. Until this was done, ladies, especially when attending places of worship, should refrain from wearing furs, as this brutality was quite contradictory to the teaching of the God of love. A splendid discussion followed, in which the following took part: Mr. Thomas Lewis, Miss Bronwen Ballard, and the Rev. R. D. Jenkins, all speakers agreeing with what had been said by Mrs. Davies, and also adding that killing animals for eating purposes was also brutal. Miss Ballard also alluded to the thoughtlesness in connection with the destruction of birds for adornment, but as a defence declared that it was done for want of thought. Mrs. Davis replied and explained that God intended the lower animals to serve man; what she objected to was the manner of doing the work. Animals for eating purposes were slaughtered in a scientific manner, sanctioned by government; but this was not the case with the fur-producing animals. They were tortured and allowed to suffer in a way painful to Christians.

The Misses Margaret and Martha Thomas gave a splendid rendering of "What shall it profit a man if he gained the world and loose his own soul?" The accompaniments were played by Mr. Henry Thomas. A paper was then read by Mr. Thomas Lewis entitled, "The Church and the Home." It was an excellent and very edifying paper. The close relationship of the two was clearly shown and the influence of each on the child. He dealt exhaustively with the "Family Altar," and expressed a wish that the good old custom should once more be restored to the homes of Wales. The reader, who took an optimistic view of the matter, firmly believed that the time was coming when religion would take the first place in the heart, in the home, and in society. He deplored the fact that such was not the case at present. All things were discussed in our homes before religious matters. The Bible, which should be conspicuous on the kitchen table and read daily, was merely an ornament kept in parlours and receiving an occasional dusting. A laughable sketch from Mr. Watkin and sons, 'An awkward servant,' brought roars of laughter.

9 March 1912 <u>St. David's Day: Noddfa</u> A pleasant time was spent at Noddfa Vestry on St. David's Day evening. A tea spread was provided, and a larger number than usual attended. The tea was provided by the Misses Maggie and Janet Jones. After tea, a lecture was given by Croesgochiad Griffiths, Cardiff, on the late Rev. D. Phillips, Croesgoch, who for 46 years ministered as pastor of the church at Croesgoch. Rev. M. S. Young presided.

St. David's Day: Carmel St. David's Day was celebrated by the Carmel 9 March 1912 Literary and Debating Society, in the form of a social tea and entertainment, which also ended their winter session. In the absence of Dr. Davies, Rev. D. Hughes Jones took the chair. The opening solo was given by Mr. T. Walters. 'Dewi Sant' solos were then sung by Miss Mag. Thomas, Miss C. Thomas, Mrs. Lewis, Clydach Vale, Mr. James Jones, and pennillion singing by Mr. D. J. Thomas. The choir, under Mr. T. Walters then sang some Welsh airs - 'Deryn Du Pigfelin,' 'Dyffryn Llanberris,' 'Hob-y-deri Dando,' 'Y Gwenith Gwyn.' A pianoforte duet was then given by Mr. Harry Hughes and Miss Olwen Hughes. Food was then taken, an excellent spread being provided. About 200 attended. A portion of the drama 'Rhys Lewis,' by Daniel Owen was also performed, the following taking part: Messrs. Sam Lewis, Howell Thomas, David Lewis, James Jones, Thos. Walters, Misses A. G. Williams, Rachel Walters, M. Rees. The performance was very efficient, causing roars of laughter on many occasions. There was a special service at the Church at 3 p.m., when an appropriate address was delivered by Rev. T. Rees, vicar. Rev. Glover and Mr. J. C. Payne also took part. The singing was conducted by Mr. John Wood, and Mr. H. Brown presided at the organ.

20 April 1912 <u>St. Mary's Church</u> The annual vestry meeting was held at St. Mary's Institute on Tuesday evening. Rev. T. Rees, vicar, presided and was supported by Rev. Williams, curate. The vicar announced that he would soon be leaving the parish, having accepted a living in Denbighshire. Mr. William Davies presented the Treasurer's report, and a healthy balance was shown. The following were elected sidesmen: Vicar's - Messrs. Charles Payne, Josiah Richards and W. J. Payne; People's - Messrs. William Davies, William Sibley and William Curtis. Mr. J. Ballard, M. Parry and E. Jones. Mr. Payne thanked all for their services during the past year. He said that Mr. Wood and Mr. H. Brown would again fulfill the duties of choirmaster and organist respectively. The Vicar said that it was a pleasure once more to be at Pentwyn. It was like a happy family gathering at a family outing. He thanked Mr. Payne for his voluntary services. He referred to the loss sustained by the death of Mr. Robert Davies, Mr. Randall (Churchwarden), and Mr. John Mantle - all very valuable workers for the Church. A hearty vote of thanks was accorded to Viscount Tredegar for the gift of an acetylene lighting plant.

20 April 1912 North Glamorgan Baptists at Fochriw The quarterly meetings of the North Glamorgan Baptist Association were held at Fochriw on Monday and Tuesday. On Monday evening, the preachers were the Rev. Daniel Davies, Penrhiwceiber, and Rev. R. Derfel Roberts, Hirwain. Mr. Roberts preached the temperance sermon of the Association. On Tuesday morning, the conference was held under the presidency of Mr. James Evans, Ynysybwl. At the afternoon service, Rev. J. Grawys Jones, Trecynon, preached on 'The Essentials of a Sacred Life.' At the evening sermon, Rev. H. P. Jenkins, Aberaman, preached. A good spread was provided at the Vestry . The catering was in the hands of Mr. Thomas Llewellyn, grocer, whilst Mrs. Llewellyn and the ladies from Carmel attended at the tables.

27 April 1912 <u>'Titanic' Memorial Service</u> A memorial service for those who lost their lives on the Titanic was held at Noddfa Baptist Chapel on Sunday evening. Rev. M. S. Young preached a touching sermon from Isiah 24, v.14: 'They shall lift up their voice; they shall sing for the Majesty of the Lord. They shall cry aloud from the sea.' 'Nearer my God to Thee' was sung with much feeling. The Dead March was also played. Miss Hilda Phillips was at the organ, and the violinists were Miss Irene Brown and Mr. Sydney Phillips.

27 April 1912 <u>Pentwyn Church</u> A memorial service was held on Sunday evening, in memory of Mr. John Mantle, and Margaret Ann, the infant daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Parry, Pentwyn. The Church was well filled. Mr. J. C. Payne took as his text 'Therefore be ye also ready,' (Matthew 24, v.44). He bade all present remember the text, and asked all to remember the grieving relatives in their prayers.

Thomas; and the cutters were Mrs. Thomas, Mrs. Evans, Mrs. Williams, and Mrs. Davies. Messrs. Richard Davies, John Jones and Evan Jones also rendered assistance.

29 June 1912 <u>Tea and Sports</u> The annual tea and sports in connection with Pentwyn Church Sunday School was held on Thursday last. A short service was held in the church prior to the parade, Rev. Glover, Rev. Williams, and Mr. J. C. Payne, licensed lay reader, taking part. Then the children paraded the streets of Fochriw and Pentwyn, headed by the Pontlottyn Silver Band under the conductorship of Mr. Wm. North. The parade over, the scholars and some hundreds more, partook of a hearty meal. During the afternoon, an excellent programme of sports took place. The secretarial duties were carried out by Mr. H. Seaborne, and Mr. Morgan Parry acted as treasurer.

6 July 1912 <u>Sunday School Treats</u> The Carmel, Noddfa and Nazareth Sunday School Treats took place on Monday last. The weather was very favourable. The scholars met at their chapels before the parade. The Carmel scholars marched to the Station gate. Here they were joined by the Nazareth scholars. Proceeding on their march, they were joined on the top of Aelybryn by the Noddfa scholars. They then paraded the streets of Fochriw and Pentwyn, singing appropriate hymn tunes en route. The parade over, the scholars returned to their chapels, a sumptuous spread having been prepared at each. After tea, the scholars resorted to the mountain for games.

3 August 1912 <u>Tea Party</u> The annual treat in connection with St. Mary's Sunday School, took place on Thursday afternoon. A short service was held in the Church, Rev. Glover addressing parents, teachers and scholars. The procession through Fochriw and Pentwyn was headed by the Pontlottyn Silver Band under Mr. Wm. Mantle. An excellent tea followed.

7 September 1912 <u>Concert</u> A concert took place at the Constitutional Club on Monday last, during which Mr. Jarman delivered a long and appropriate speech. Mr. C. Shankland presided.

7 September 1912 <u>Noddfa</u> On Sunday evening, Rev. B. Pennar Evans, late of Aberdeen, preached in English to a large congregation.

7 September 1912 Departures to America On Thursday morning, a large circle of friends congregated to wish Rev. and Mrs. M. S. Young God-speed on their sudden departure to America. The news has created much excitement in the village. Rev. Young received a sudden call to preach in various chapels in the Welsh Colony in Pennsylvania. The neighbourhood is very enthusiastic in wishing Rev. and Mrs. Young a prosperous voyage and a speedy return to the village where they are both held in the highest esteem.

14 September 1912 <u>Noddfa</u> The annual preaching meetings were held on Sunday and Monday last. The pulpit was occupied by Rev. W. R. Lewis, Aberdare.

5 October 1912 <u>Pentwyn Church</u> On Sunday evening last, Mr. J. C. Payne (lay reader), preached a sermon in memory of Mrs. John Prosser, Deri, taking as his text Matt. 24, 42. The Church was filled. Mr. H. Brown was at the organ and Mr. John Wood conducted the singing.

5 October 1912 Presentation A meeting was held at Nazareth on Thursday evening last to present Mr. and Mrs. Roderick Jones with a handsome marble timepiece on the occasion of their marriage. Mr. Jones has been organist at the Chapel for many years, and the timepiece was given by members of the chapel as a small token of respect for his faithful and valuable services. Roberts, Mrs. Captain Jones, Mrs. T. Pugh, Mrs. E. Jones. Valuable assistance was rendered by Mrs. J. D. Jones, Mrs. I. Roderick, Mrs. R. Jones, Miss Edith Parry, Miss Annie Maud Jones, Mr. Wm. Jones, Mr. Edward Parry, Mr. Wm. Morris, Mr. Thomas Pugh. After tea, a concert was held, Mr. J. D. Jones presiding. Mr. Griffith Jones made a speech and presented the clock. Rev. I. Touching references were made to the deceased, who had been a faithful member and caretaker of the chapel for a number of years, until she became blind. Mr. Thomas Walters played the 'Dead March' in Saul. Mr. David Davies (Pencerdd Morganwg) conducted the singing.

12 October 1912 <u>Pentwyn Church</u> Harvest Thanksgiving services were held at Pentwyn Church on Wednesday and Sunday, the Church having been beautifully decorated by the flock. On Wednesday, Rev. G. Williams, Vicar, preached, and on Sunday, Mr. J. C. Payne, lay reader was the preacher. An anthem, 'Great is the Lord,' was rendered on both days. The Church was crowded at all services.

12 October 1912 <u>Entertainment</u> The first in the winter series of popular entertainments was held on Monday at Pentwyn Church school room, Mr. J. C. Payne presiding. Solos were rendered by Miss Blodwen Watkins, Mr. Albert Tyler, Master T. R. Lewis and Miss Mary Tyler, after which the harvest offerings were disposed of. The fruit was sent to the sick and aged of the district, and also to Merthyr Infirmary. Mr. Tom Jones was unanimously elected to act as entertainment secretary during the season.

12 October 1912 <u>St. Mary's Church</u> The harvest festival was held at St. Mary's on Sunday, Monday and Tuesday. On Sunday, the Vicar celebrated Holy Communion at 8 a.m. At 11 a.m., the Rev. R. E. Williams officiated, and preached an excellent sermon. The Vicar officiated at the 6 p.m. service. On Monday, a sermon in Welsh was given Rev. D. E. Jacob, Vicar of Bedlinog, and on Tuesday, Rev. J. Davies, Rhymney, preached in English. At the Sunday and Tuesday services, an anthem was excellently sung by the choir. Also, the Magnificat and Nunc Dimmitus were sung to music composer by the choirmaster Mr. J. Williams.

12 October 1912 Personal: Rev. M. S. Young The many friends of the Rev. M. S. Young will be pleased to hear of his very successful tour in the States. The following is taken from 'The Druid,' the Welsh-American paper: "Nesquehoning Notes: Chance to hear a good preacher at Nesquehoning this evening. The Rev. Moses Young and his wife of South Wales, who arrived in New York on Saturday for a tour of the Baptist Churches of America, are at Nesquehoning, the guests of Rev. and Mrs. Clifford Joshua. Rev. Young preached at Slatington on Sunday to large congregations, and met with a great reception from the many Welsh people of that town. Rev. Young will preach in the First Baptist Church, Nesquehoning, this evening at 7.30 p.m. There will also be great singing, and all are invited. Rev. Young preaches in both languages. Slatington P. A. - Rev. M. S. young, pastor of the Baptist Church at Fochriw, South Wales, supplied the pulpit at the Baptist Church, the last two Sundays. Rev. Young is a young man, a fine orator, and an excellent preacher. The next two Sundays, he will be at St. Clair and Mahoney City, and the following two Sundays in Plymouth, and in Slatington, once more, on Sunday, October 20th. Mr. and Mrs. R. G. Over 900 singers came from the following churches: Hermon, Libanus, Caeharris, Bedlinog, Fochriw, Deri. Mr. J. D. Jones, Fochriw, catechised the children in the afternoon, and Mr. J. T. Jones, Dowlais, in the evening.

17 May 1913 <u>Presentation: Social Evening at St. Andrew's Pentwyn</u> On Thursday week, a large number assembled at St. Andrew's Schoolroom, when Mr. and Mrs. Tom Jones, Glenview, were recipients of some lovely presents on the occasion of their leaving Pentwyn for Lancashire. Thanks are due to all who worked so ably in the unavoidable absence of Mr. Payne through illness.

25 July 1914 Outing On Saturday, about 70 members of St. Andrews Church journeyed to Weston, leaving Fochriw station by special train at 7.30 a.m., the boat leaving Newport at 9.15 and arriving in Weston at 10.50. 1 August 1914 <u>St. Mary's Annual Tea</u> The annual tea and sports was held at the Institute on Thursday. A short service was held in the church prior to the tea, the curate-in-charge, Rev. R. A. Williams, officiating. The lessons were read by Mr. J. Richards, and Mr. O. Richards was at

the organ. The tables were tastefully laid out, and were presided over by the following: Mrs. Curtis, Miss V. Curtis and Miss Nan Prosser; Mrs. Angell, Mrs G. Way and Miss Angell; Mrs. R. Evans, Mrs. M. A. Dummett and Miss A. M. Sibley; Mrs. Chaffey and Mrs. Perrott. Assistance was rendered by the following: Mrs. F. Way, Mrs. Jones, Miss R. Davies, Mrs. Davies, Mrs. J. White, Mrs. Wm. Arthur Coggan and George Evans. Addresses were given by Miss Jones and Mr. Payne, and recitations by Masters Edward Evans, Willie Jones and T. O. Jones. Miss Ivy Tyler gave a solo. The evening was brought to a close with prayer.

2 January 1915 Christmas at The Fochriw Churches : St Andrew's Church at Pentwyn The annual Christmas tree and prize distribution to the Sunday school scholars took place on Thursday evening, when a large number of teachers, scholars, and parents were present. Mr. J. C. Payne, licensed lay reader in-charge, presided, and opened the proceedings with an interesting address, after which a short concert of a sacred character was held as follows: organ solo - Mr. H. They spoke encouraging words to the children. An interesting programme was contributed to by several members, and an enjoyable evening was spent.

16 January 1915 <u>Magic Lantern</u> A lecture was given in the vestry of Noddfa Baptist chapel on Tuesday evening, on "The Life of David" by the Rev. E. Williams, pastor. He gave an excellent account of David's life, which proved edifying and inspiring. The lecture was illustrated by lantern pictures, which were much enjoyed by the large number present. The lantern was manipulated by Mr. J Evans.

6 February 1915 Departure of Mr. J C Payne: Farewell Sermon At Pentwyn Fochriw has just lost one of her most prominent tonwnsmen in the person of Mr. J. C. Payne, who is leaving in order to prepare for ordination, and has taken an appointment offered by the Rev. Canon Lewis, at St Mark's Church, Gelli, Ystrad Rhondda. Mr. Payne has for over 20 years been engaged as engineman at the local colliery of Messrs Guest, Keen and Nettlefolds, and during the whole of this time has actively associated himself with every social function in Fochriw, but his efforts were more particularly identified in connection with church work. His interest in this direction matured early, and he was a voluntary lay-reader in the parish of Pontlottyn for 14 years, officiating at Tirphil, Pentwyn, Troedrhiwfuwch, Newtown and Pantywaun. Six years ago he was appointed licensed lay reader to St Andrew's Church, Pentwyn, and the energy and devotion which he applied to his work raised the Church to its present flourishing state with a crowded congregation. Amongst other duties which he discharged, were those of Chaplain to Cwlwm-y-Brodoriaeth, R.A.O.B., and secretary of the Soldier's and Sailors Association. During the last 10 years, he has represented the "Merthyr Express" at Fochriw, and his contributions to these columns have been much appreciated. We regret the loss of his valuable services in this capacity. Mr. Payne has taken a bold step with commendable courage, and one that involves very considerable personal sacrifices, in order to follow more closely the work he loves. The choice, however, will bring its own reward in the ultimate realisation of his ambition. 6 March 1915 <u>Noddfa Chapel</u> A social was held at Noddfa Baptist Chapel to celebrate St David's Day. The provisions were given by the ladies of the Church, and the young men were also very liberal with their contributions. The tables were waited on by the following: Mrs. J. Evans, Mrs. J. Thomas, Mrs. J. Pugh, Mrs. John Rees, Mrs. D. Davies, Mrs. J. Williams, Miss Beatrice Jones, Miss Hannah Evans, Miss Maggie Evans. A shooting range was prepared in a corner of the room. The young people nick-named the target "The Kaiser." A considerable sum of money was raised by this means. Miss Hilda Phillips accompanied the concert on the piano. Solos were rendered by the Mr. David Thomas and Mrs. J. Williams. Prizes were awarded for the following: stump speech – Mr. S. Williams; translating a piece into Welsh – Mr. David Thomas. Three minute speeches were delivered by many, all of whom paid a fine of one penny for every English word spoken. The toll was very heavy on some. A sketch, prepared by Mr. David Thomas and Miss Mary Rees was performed. The gathering was kept in a state of continuous laughter throughout the performance. At the end of the evening, Miss Mary Rees sang the Welsh National Anthem, all joining in the chorus.

6 March 1915 <u>Nazareth Chapel</u> The St David's Day Annual Festival was held at the chapel on Monday evening. It was celebrated in the form of a popular banquet and concert. The following ladies served at the tables: Mesdames Martha Parry, Mary Lawrence, M. J. Jones, L. Roberts, L. Parry, M. A. Lawrence, Emily Davies, Mattie Jones, Martha Davies. After the banquet, the following programme was gone through: address by the president, Councillor John Jones; solo - Willie Edgar; recitation - Lizzie Mary Lawrence; overture on the organ - Miss Katie Jones-Davies; drama - the Nazareth Dramatic Society; overture on the organ – Mr. Willie A. Davies; quartette – Mr. Willie Adams-Jones and friends; recitation - Edward Jones; solo -Willie Edgar. The singing of "Hen Wlad fy Nhadau" brought the evening to a close, Miss Mary Richards leading the singing.

13 March 1915 <u>Noddfa Chapel</u> On Sunday last, the half-yearly meetings of the chapel were held. The officiating minister was of the Rev. E. Llwchwr Jones, Bedwas. On Monday night, he delivered a lecture on "Vavassor Powell," the Rev. Esaia Williams, pastor, taking the chair. Rev. D. Huws Jones, Congregational minister, and Rev. Isaac Roderick, Calvinistic Methodist minister, thanked the speaker for his excellent address.

27 March 1915 Lantern Entertainment A series of war and local pictures were shown at Noddfa Baptist Vestry on Tuesday, to a very large number of adults and children. The lantern was managed by Messrs. Seaborne Williams and Johnny R. Walters. The chair was occupied by the Rev. Isaiah Williams, who gave interesting lectures as the pictures were shown. During the intervals the following sang and recited: duet - Phyllis Williams and Elvis Phillips; songs - Mary Dilys Evans, and Phyllis Powell; recitations - Elsa Matthews, Johnny Evans, and Edmund Davies. Miss Hilda Phillips ably presided at the piano. Mr. Thomas B. Edwards also rendered valuable service during the evening. The singing of the National Anthem brought a most enjoyable entertainment to a close.

3 April 1915 <u>Noddfa Chapel</u> A concert was held at the above place last Tuesday. The chair was taken by the Reverend E. Williams. Clifford Davies opened the concert by singing "Only an Armour Bearer." The following contributed to the programme: solos - Mary Dilys Evans, Mrs. J. Williams, Mary Rees; recitations- Misses M. Lewis and Enid Evans; violin solo - Irene Phillips; sketch - "All in a Muddle" - Misses Mary Rees, Hilda Phillips, Irene Phillips, Lily M. Rees, Elvis Phillips, and Messrs. David Thomas, S. Williams, and D Rees; sketch - "John a Mari yn y Ffair" - Miss Mary Rees and Mr. D. Thomas; duet - Elsa Matthews and Joshua Thomas; Phyllis Williams and Enid Evans; trio - Misses E. A. Evans, L. J. Evans, Lizzie Thomas. Miss Hilda Phillips ably presided at the piano. The concert was brought to a close by the singing of "Hen Wlad fy Nhadau."

10 April 1915 Operetta At the council schools on Friday and Saturday, a performances of the operetta "Pearl, the Fisher-maiden," was given by the Carmel Sunday School Choir, conducted by Mr. Thomas Walters, A.L.C.M. The school was crowded for the occasion, the acting and singing being a very high standard, and the dresses making a magnificent display of colours. The chief performers were: Mrs. C. Walters; Mr. J. Jones; Miss M. J. Walters; Mr. M. Cole; Mr. Daniel Jenkins; Mr. H. Thomas; Mr. Ll. Rees; Mr. H. Hughes; Miss F. Williams; Master B. Sibley; Mr. J. E. Davis; Master D. Rowlands. The accompanist was Miss H. Evans, Aelybryn.

22 May 1915 <u>Nazareth Chapel</u> Half yearly meetings of this chapel where held on Sunday and Monday, with large congregations. The preacher was of the Rev. B. Watkins, Ferndale, who preached appropriate sermons. Mr. W. Morris conducted the singing, whilst Miss K. Davies presided at the organ.

5 June 1915 <u>Annual Tea</u> The adults and children of Noddfa Chapel held their annual tea on Wednesday last. The little ones had looked forward to the treat. They all sat down to the good things which had been provided for them. After the tables had been cleared, they all went to the mountain, where they spent a very happy time playing games etc. Praise is due to all the help to make the event such a success.

12 June 1915 <u>Memorial Service</u> A memorial service to the late Mr. John Lewis was held at Carmel chapel on Sunday last. Rev. D. Hughes Jones preached to a very large congregation. The "Dead March" was played by Mr. Thomas Walters, organist, whilst the singing was conducted by the Mr. David Davies.

19 June 1915 <u>Carmel Chapel</u> The annual services of the chapel were held on Sunday and Monday last. The preacher was the Rev. T. E. Nicholas, Llangybi, Cardiganshire. He preached most edifying and inspiring sermons. Mr. David Davies conducted the singing.

26 June 1915 <u>Fochriw "Slackers:" Vicar's Indictment</u> An extraordinary passage appears in the Pontlottyn Church Magazine for this month, from the pen of Rev. G. A. Williams, vicar. It reads as follows: "During the concert held at St. Mary's Church Hall, Fochriw, the performers did their parts right well, when the behaviour of not a few is taken into consideration. They were not aided by the patriotic enthusiasm which characterised the Pontlottyn concerts. This is not to be wondered at, for, if report be true, there are more "slackers" in Fochriw than in any other village in the parish of Pontlottyn, yea, in the civil parish of the Gellygaer. Methinks that twelve months in khaki would tend to civilise not a few who are over-endowed with animals spirits." Similar remarks were also passed at a recent Gellygaer Council meeting by the Rev. Canon T. J. Jones, and of Mr. W. Hammond, Tirphil, about the 'slackers' at Fochriw.

3 July 1915 A Pentwyn Presentation: Mr. J. C. Payne's Record of Service On Thursday evening week, a presentation took place at the Federation Hall, Pentwyn, when Mr. J. C. Payne was made the recipient of a handsome marble clock, subscribed for by the members of the Fochriw branch of the Enginemen, Stokers and Surface Craftmen's Association, and other workmen of the colliery, as a token of their great esteem for him, and to mark the occasion of his leaving Fochriw to take up an appointment offered him by the Reverend Canon Lewis at St Mark's Church, Gelli, Ystrad Rhondda. A good number of members and friends were present, the proceedings being presided over by the Mr. Edward Lewis. The Chairman spoke in glowing terms of Mr. Payne. He had always been a faithful member of the Association, had filled many positions of trust, and had always carried out his duties honestly and straightforwardly. They heard a lot of recruiting for his Majesty's Army in these days, but Mr. Payne was recruiting for the army of the King of Kings. He sincerely hoped that he would continue with this good work and rise to a high position in the Church. A fine programme of songs, recitations and instrumental solos, given by Mr. Payne's colleagues, followed. Mr. Lewis then made the presentation of the clock. Others who spoke were Mr. Alfred Evans, Mr. Fred Wootten, Mr. Harry Hughes, Mr. H. C. Seaborne (the secretary of the branch), and Mr. M. Jones. The singing of the National Anthem brought the evening to a close.

10 July 1915 <u>Chapel Teas</u> The annual tea in connection with the Carmel Congregational Chapel and Nazareth Calvinist Methodist Chapel took place at their respective chapels on Monday last, when a large number of friends and children sat at the tables. After tea, games etc. were played.

17 July 1915 <u>St Andrew's Church, Pentwyn: Presentation to Mr. J. C. Payne</u> On Thursday last week, the annual tea in connection with St Andrew's Church Sunday school Pentwyn, took place when teachers and scholars, about 150 in number, attended. A public meeting was afterwards held, the occasion being a presentation to Mr. J. C. Payne of an illuminated address and suitcase, subscribed for by the Vicar, Pentwyn Church people and friends, in appreciation of his six years ministry at St Andrew's Church, and as a token of the high esteem in which he is held, and to mark the occasion of his leaving. Mr. T. Baldwin, superintendent of the Sunday School, presided, and made the presentation to Mr. Payne. The address was as follows, and included excellent photos of Mr. Payne, and of Pentwyn Church:</u>

"St Andrew's Church, Pentwyn, Fochriw. In presenting to Mr. J.C. Payne this address, together with a suitcase, we the congregation and friends of St. Andrew's Church, desire to express our deep regret that we are losing you after nearly six years work as licensed lay reader in charge of our Church. We ask you to accept, with this small token of esteem, our heartfelt thanks for all that you have done amongst us. Your labour has been earnest, sincere, and thorough in every branch of Church work which has fallen in part or in whole to your care. We rejoice to believe that the result of all your labour has been an increase in the spiritual and moral good of those among whom you have worked, and we trust that in so helping and serving, you yourself have met with divine rewards of grace and encouragement. It is our sincere prayer that our Heavenly Father made graciously continue to bless your work for him in the new sphere of labour to which he has been pleased to call you, and that there, as here, you may be privileged to strengthen the Lords people, and gather fresh trophies to his kingdom. " T. Baldwin, W. J. Jones, A. Coggan, M. Parry, E. Jones, J. Evans, G. Evans, A. Gwynne (sidesman), H Brown (organist), John Wood (choirmaster), Gilbert Williams (vicar). Mr. H. Brown, Mr. W. J. Jones, Mr. T. J. Gwynne, and Mr. J. Williams then spoke, all showering great praise on Mr. Payne for his good work. Mr Payne responded.

17 July 1915 <u>Concert: Noddfa Chapel</u> The Penywern and Dowlais Male Voice Choir, conductor of Mr. Evan Thomas, gave a concert at Noddfa Chapel last Wednesday evening. Many artistes assisted. Master Jenkins Whiting has a splendid voice and sang sweetly. Mr. E. Evans made a very successful debut. Mr. Tudor Davies proved an excellent chairman.

31 July 1915 <u>Noddfa Chapel</u> Mr. James J. Lewis, of Dowlais, rendered the solo "Yr Arglwydd yw fy Mugail" to the congregation on Sunday evening.

31 July 1915 <u>Tea Party</u> A tea party in connection with the Siloh Chapel, Penybank, was held on Monday. The helpers were Mrs. Morris, Mrs. Morgan, Mrs. D. Evans, Mrs. J. Williams, Mrs. Sydney Phillips, Mrs. Thomas Evans, Mrs. Matthews and others. The children were treated to buns and milk, the milk being supplied by Mrs. Evans, Penybank Farm. The party later went to the field adjoining the chapel, kindly lent by Mr. Evans, and played games. Praise is due to Mr. H. Williams for is good organisation of the arrangements. The Sunday School of Siloh is very flourishing at present. Credit is due Rev. I. Williams, Noddfa Chapel, who has charge of Siloh, for the flourishing condition of the Church.

4 September 1915 <u>Fancy Affair At Fochriw</u> On Thursday last, at Fochriw, a Fancy Fair was held under the auspices of Noddfa Baptist chapel. The fair was held at Mr. R. Slimmons' field, the weather being ideal. The procession was large and the different dresses and costumes made an imposing spectacle. The Fochriw Brass Band headed the procession. The band, which comprised most of the old members, had been got together and trained by their respected conductor, Mr. W. J. Powell, who has spared no pains in bringing them to a state of great efficiency. After parading the streets of the village, the procession made its way to the Fair Grounds. The opening ceremony was performed at the entrance to the field by Mrs. Dr. Davies, who delivered a most appropriate speech. After the fair was declared open, the company entered the field. Hundreds of people visited the field during the afternoon. The chief attractions were: sketches, a fish pond, musical chairs, hoop-la, shooting range, hat-trimming for men, nail driving for ladies, fruit stall, flower stall, fancy stall, cigarette and sweet stall. The Band played appropriate music at intervals during the evening. Other musical items were given by Mr. J. J. Lewis and Mr. J. P. Jones. Mr. W. S. Williams and Mr. T. Thomas gave conjuring feats which were very well received. The president was Mrs. George Phillips; the treasurer Mrs.

2 October 1915 <u>Harvest Festival</u> The harvest Festival in connection with St Andrew's Church, Pentwyn, was held on Sunday and Monday. The preacher on Sunday was Mr. D. Greening, Pontlottyn. On Monday evening, the pulpit was occupied by Mr. J. C. Payne, who preached a powerful sermon. The services were well attended. Mr. Harry Hughes presided at the organ.

9 October 1915 <u>Harvest Festival</u> Harvest Festival Services were held at St. Mary's Church, on Sunday and Monday last, the Church being nicely decorated. The preacher on Sunday was the Rev. J. Davies, Pontlottyn, and on Monday of Rev. T. Richards, vicar of Bargoed. Both preached powerful sermons to large congregations. Mr. O. Richards presided at the organ.

16 October 1915 Local Eisteddfod A very successful eisteddfod, under the auspices of the Star of Fochriw Lodge of the I.O.G.T., took place at Carmel Congregational chapel on Thursday last. After the opening speech of the president, the competition started. The following were winners: children's solo - 1. Ceinwen Ballard, 2. Mary J. Cole and Mary Jones; recitation -1. Ceinwen Ballard, 2. Mary Jones; children's solo - Stella Cole; girls' solo - 1, Mary J. Cole; best verses on eisteddfod - Mr. Sam Lewis; recitation - Ceridwen Thomas, Brynteg; best bag divided between Elsie Griffiths and Annie G. Thomas; unpunctuated reading - divided between Myfanwy Cole and May Rowlands; tenor solo - Mr. Thomas Walters; best essay - Mr.William Thomas Jones; soprano solo - Miss Ceridwen Thomas, Martin-street; recitation - Mrs. C. Walters; bass solo - Mr. Moses Williams; best letter - Miss Maggie Griffiths; children's choir -Young Beginners, conductress, Miss Florrie Williams; quartette - the Martin-street quartet. The adjudicators were: music - Mr. Tom Jones, Pontlottyn; recitations - Mr. David Jones, headmaster of Ystrad Mynach School; prize bags - Mrs. E. Cole Jones, headmistress of Fochriw Infants' School; conductor - Brother Moses Williams; president - Brother Charles Payne; treasurer - Brother W. T. Jones; accompanist - Brother J. E Davis; secretary - Brother Thomas Walters.

23 October 1915 <u>Annual Meetings</u> Large congregations assembled at Nazareth Chapel on Saturday, Sunday, and Monday, for the anniversary services. Two well-known preachers delivered eloquent discourses - Rev. J. D. Davies, Llanelli, and Rev. Michael Williams, Cilfynydd. The singing was conducted by the Mr. W. Morris, whilst Miss Katie Davies and Mr. Roderick Jones presided at the organ.

13 November 1915 <u>Special Mission Services</u> Special services where held at St. Mary's Church on Sunday, when Mr. Parnell, Caerphilly, preached to large congregation. Appropriate mission hymns were sung. Mr. O. Richards presided at the organ, while Mr. B. Angell conducted the singing.

4 December 1915 <u>Appointment: the Reverend Rhys D. Jenkins</u> The many friends of Rev. R. D. Jenkins, Fochriw, will be interested to learn that he has received a hearty and unanimous invitation to the pastorate of Goshen Welsh Congregational Church, Rhymney. He is well fitted to fill the position, but he will be greatly missed by his numerous friends in Fochriw and District, where he is held in very high esteem.

18 December 1915 <u>Carmel Chapel</u> The half yearly meetings in connection with the chapel where held on Sunday and Monday, when the pulpit was occupied by the Rev. W. H. Price, Talgarth. The singing was conducted by Mr. David Davies, with Mr. Thomas Walters at the organ.

25 December 1915 The Rev. Rhys D. Jenkins The Rev. Jenkins has accepted the pastorate of Goshen Welsh Congregational Church, Rhymney, and hopes to commence his duties there at the beginning of January. Mr. Jenkins has associated himself with every good movement for the welfare of Fochriw, and the uplifting of his fellowmen.

25 December 1915 <u>Welsh Drama</u> On Thursday and Saturday last, two excellent performances of the Welsh drama "Asgro Lan" by R. G. Berry, were given by the Carmel

Dramatic Society at the Council Schools to large audiences. The acting was all that could be desired, and reflects great credit on the abilities of the members. The scenery and dresses were very effective, and the drama was well received. The following took part: Mr. David Evans, Mrs. M. A. Walters, Mr. Evan Morgan Davies, Mr. Howell Thomas, Mr. Tom Jones, Mr. Harry Hughes, Mr. Moses Williams, Mr. D. Rowlands, Mr. David Lewis, Mr. Tom Jenkins, Mr. Simon Lewis, Mr. Thomas Walters, Mr. T. J. Jones, Mr. James Jones, Mr. Evan Williams. The stage-managers were: Messrs. T. J. Jones and D. Harris. Miss Olwen Hughes presided at the piano on Saturday evening.

1 January, 1916 <u>Singing Festival</u> The annual singing festival was held at Carmel Congregational Chapel on Christmas Day, and was well attended. The singing was conducted by Mr. D. Roberts, Bargoed. The chairman in the morning was the Rev. R. D. Jenkins, in the afternoon, Mr. David Lewis, and in the evening, the Rev. D. Hughes Jones. The various hymns and anthems were nicely rendered by the choir. Solos were rendered by Miss E. A. Angell, Mr. W. J. Davies, Mr. M. A. Walters; quartette – Mr. D. Jenkins and party. The accompanists were Mr. Thomas Walters, Miss Olwen Hughes, Mr. J. E. Davis and Mr. David Thomas.

1 January, 1916 <u>Nazareth Calvinistic Methodist</u> The members of this chapel celebrated Christmas Day by hymn singing for the children in the afternoon and the service of praise for adults in the evening. Mr. William Morris was the conductor of this singing at both meetings. Miss Katie Jones-Davies and Mr. W. A. Davies were the accompanists. Mr. J. M. Jones presided in the afternoon. The children sang appropriate hymns very sweetly. A dialogue was given by C. J. Lawrence and G. Morris, and a recitation by Gwynfor Morris, after which the Rev. Isaac Roderick addressed the meeting. Fruit was distributed to the children at the close. The evening service was well attended. The Rev. Isaac Roderick presided. The tunes were selected from the Pontmorlais Festival Programme, and an enjoyable evening was spent. A quartet was excellently rendered by Messrs. W. Adams-Jones, Willie Edgar, Miss Martha Davies and Miss Hilda Davies, with Miss Maggie Davies at the organ. A solo was rendered by Master Johnny Edgar, after which an interesting address was delivered by Councillor John Jones, on Congregational singing. He advised the young people to arrange every part to sit together at the Sunday services, so that the best Congregational singing might be maintained.

8 January, 1916 <u>Concert</u> A well-attended concert was held at Noddfa Chapel on New Year's Eve. The chair was occupied by the Rev. E. Williams, pastor. The programme was contributed to by the following: Miss Davis and Miss Francis, Rhymney; Mr. Tom Phillips, Dowlais. Many of the songs and recitations were illustrated by a powerful lantern manipulated by Mr. Joshua Evans. Solo, "The Sailor's Grave" – Mr. T. Phillips; solo, "Daddy" - Miss Davies; recitation, "Beautiful Snow" - Miss Francis; solo, "Death Of Nelson" – Mr. T. Phillips; solo, "The Holy City" - Miss Davies. Numerous sets of slides were shown on the lantern, including the story "For The Masters Sake."

22 January, 1916 <u>Social</u> A social and dance was held at St. Mary's on Monday evening, and was well attended. The masters of ceremonies were Messrs. Arthur Woods and W. Jenkins, whilst Mr. Harry Salmon ably assisted at the piano. Miss E J Williams was secretary and Mrs. White was treasurer.

12 February, 1916 <u>Nazareth Chapel</u> A lecture was delivered at the above place on Monday night by the Rev. S. E. Prydderch, Nantymoel, on "Y Teulu." Mr. J. D. Jones, headmaster of Fochriw Council School, presided.

12 February, 1916 Presentation to the Rev. R. D. Jenkins: Successful Ministry at Fochriw On Tuesday evening, a very interesting presentation meeting took place at Carmel Chapel, the occasion being the presentation to the Reverend Rhys D. Jenkins, of a gold watch, chain and pendant, and a set of 20 books, subscribed by the Carmel Church members and friends, as a token of the high esteem in which he is held, and to mark the occasion of his leaving to take up the pastorate of Goshen Welsh Congregational Chapel, Rhymney. The Reverend Jenkins has been one of Fochriw's most prominent ministers for many years, taking a leading part in all causes for the uplifting and the betterment of the place. He has held many important offices in connection with the chapel, having been secretary and deacon. His labour has always been earnest and sincere for the spiritual and moral good of those amongst whom he laboured. For eight years he has been a member of their Gellygaer District Council, overseer for three years, school of manager for five years, and a Welsh teacher at Fochriw and Deri for 10 years, under the Glamorgan Technical Committee. The chairman was the Rev. D. Hughes Jones, who spoke in glowing terms of the excellent qualities of Mr. Jenkins, his kind nature and his ready help in all cases. The presentation was made by one of the oldest members of the chapel, Mrs. Lewis Jones. The watch bore the following inscription: "Presented to the Rev. Rhys. D. Jenkins, (Gwili). The singing was conducted by Mr. Thomas Evans, junior, whilst Miss Phillips presided at the organ. On Monday evening, a lecture was delivered by the Reverend Jenkins, the subject being "Bywyd a Phenillion Telyn." Rev. I Williams, pastor, presided.

1 April 1916 <u>Concert</u> A concert was held at Noddfa Chapel on Thursday evening week, the chapel being lent for the occasion. An excellent programme of music, etc, was given a by Bargoed Orpheus Party, under their conductor Mr. D. Roberts. Solos, duets, quartettes, and choruses were rendered by the party. Miss Adelaide Roberts presided at the piano, and the chair was occupied by the Reverend E. Williams. The proceeds of the concert were towards the St. John Hospital funds.

15 April 1916 <u>Presentation</u> A very interesting presentation meeting took place at Carmel Chapel on Tuesday evening, when Mr. George Phillips, grocer, was made the recipient of an illuminated address and fountain pen on behalf of the members and friends of Carmel Chapel, as a token of their high appreciation of his services as treasurer for the last 18 years, and to mark the occasion of his retirement. The chairman was the Rev. D. Hughes Jones, who spoke very highly of Mr. Phillips' qualities. The address was presented by Mr. William Ballard, one of the oldest deacons, and the fountain pen by Mr. George Sibley. Mr. Phillips acknowledged the gifts in very suitable terms. Speeches were also made by the Rev. R. D. Jenkins, the Rev. E. Williams, the Rev. J. M. Jones, and Mr. T. Lewis. During the evening an excellent programme of music was contributed to by the following: solos – Messrs. David Cole, Howell Thomas, David Cole Jones, Mrs. Hannah Davies and Miss E. M. Sibley. Violin selections were given by Miss Irene Phillips, accompanied by Miss Hilda Phillips. The accompanist was Mr. Thomas Walters.

This deserving society will benefit from between £10 to £15.

Angel, on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, before crowded audiences. The chief characters were ably sustained by Madame H. C. Davies, Mr. Howell Thomas, Mr. T. J. Lewis, Mr. James Jones, Master Henry Evans, Miss Maria Jones, Miss M. Cole, Mr. Henry Hughes, and Miss Doris Davies. The accompanists were Miss H. Evans and Mr. Thomas Walters. Mr. Thomas Jones was the stage manager, and was assisted by Messrs. Howell Thomas and David Harris. Mrs. E. Cole Jones also rendered great help. The Fochriw String Band rendered excellent help; first violin, Miss Irene Phillips, Miss Miriam Thomas, Mr. Harold Williams; second violins, Messrs. D. J. Thomas, Charlie Budd, and Miss Katie Davies; cellist, Mr. Danny Morgan; flautist, Mr. Alf Sullivan; cornet, Mr. Albert Mantle. Great praise is due to all who worked so hard to make it such a success. The secretarial duties were performed by Miss Maria Jones.

13 April 1918 Vestry Meeting The annual Easter vestry in connection with St. Mary's was held in the Church Hall on Wednesday evening, the vicar presiding over a large attendance. In his remarks, the vicar spoke highly of the work done in connection with the Church during the last year and thanked the people for their hearty co-operation. He also thanked the Churchwarden for his untiring labour in connection with the Church: and also, the choirmaster, organist, sidemen, superintendent of the Sunday School, teachers, collectors, caretaker, and all who had laboured so faithfully during the past year. Mr. W. J. Payne, churchwarden, submitted the statements of accounts, and said the past year had been the most successful within his recollection. Since the advent of the new vicar, great things had been accomplished - the roof had been repaired, the organ rebuilt, a new pulpit erected, a new lectern provided, and various other things purchased for the comfort of the congregation and the beautifying of the Church. As churchwarden, he hoped the Vicar's stay amongst them would be a long one. He also thanked the people for their kind co-operation during the past year, and asked them to continue in the good work. He was pleased to say that after all the things that had been added to the Church, they were free of debt and had a good balance in their favour. The offertories had more than trebled. 11 May 1918 "<u>Playmates</u>" St. Mary Hall was crowded on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, for performances of the children's cantata, "Playmates," given by the children of St. Mary's choir, under their conductor Mr. Berkley Angell. The choruses by the children were well rendered. All the characters were excellently represented, the following taking part: Gwenny Rees, Robert Wilton, Percy Gwynne, Ben Davies, Harold Harris, Jackie Williams, Rowena Harris, Adelaide Baldwin, Vera Wilton, Morfydd Williams, Charles Lawrence, George Baldwin. The pianist was Mr. Octavius Richards, and the organist Mr. Willie Hughes. They were assisted by the orchestra: first violin, Messrs. D. J. Thomas, Harold James, Miss Irene Phillips, Miss Miriam Thomas; second violin Mr. Harry Hughes, Miss Katie Jones Davies; cornet, Mr. Albert Mantle; cello, Mr. Daniel Morgan; flute, Mr. Alfred Sullivan. The stage manager was Mr. Charles Payne. The scenery was by Mr. Willie Curtis, who presented them to the Church. The Chairman was the Rev. Francis.

25 May 1918 <u>Nazareth Chapel</u> The annual meeting in connection with the chapel was held on Saturday and Sunday, when edifying sermons were preached to large congregations by the Rev. Teifi Davies, Hirwain. Miss Katie Jones Davies presided at the organ, and Mr. John Davies conducted singing.

25 May 1918 Operetta A very pretty Japanese operetta, "Surprise Land," was performed at St. Mary's Hall on Tuesday, Friday and Saturday evenings by the school children, in aid of the Fochriw Soldiers' and Sailors' Fund. Miss Hilda Phillips was the conductor. All the characters were excellently sustained. The operetta was preceded by numerous action songs. The following took part: Miss Enid Evans, Miss Elvis Phillips, Miss Ivy Curtis, Miss Edith Walters, Miss Delsey Turner, Miss D. Burrows, Master Ben Davies, Master J. Thomas, Master D. J. Davies, Master E. Davies. The accompanist was Miss Hannah Evans. The duties of stage manageress were ably carried out by Miss S. A. Sibley, and the scenic operator was Mr. Charles Payne.

15 June 1918 <u>Carmel Chapel</u> The annual meetings in connection with the chapel were held on Monday last and were well-attended. Rev. D. Eurof Walters, Abertawe, and Rev. Evan Jones, Burry Port, preached very appropriate sermons. On Sunday night the Reverend Walters preached an English sermon. 22 June 1918 <u>The Rev. Moses Young</u> The Reverend Moses Young, secretary of the YMCA, United States, was here on 17 days leave, having been gassed in France.

13 July 1918 <u>Tea Parties</u> The annual tea parties in connection with the various chapels - Carmel, Noddfa and Nazareth - were held on Monday. After tea, games etc. were indulged in.

13 July 1918 <u>Personal</u> The Reverend Moses Solva Young, Baptist minister, Slattington, Pennsylvania, USA, has been appointed religious and social director of all the YMCA camps or huts in South-West England and the whole of South Wales. He has just been to Wales on furlough for about three weeks from the Front, where he has been for the last eight months. On returning to the United States YMCA headquarters in London, he was given the above appointment. Before leaving for the United States, about six years ago, he was pastor of Noddfa Baptist chapel. He is a native of Solva, Pembrokeshire.

20 July 1918 <u>St. Mary's</u> The annual tea party in connection because it St. Mary's was held on Thursday last, all goods being given by church members. The children were afterwards entertained to sports.

14 September 1918 <u>Garden Fete</u> A grand garden fete was held by Noddfa Baptist Church on July 25^{th} in aid of the Prisoners of War Fund, and realised £22. A receipt for the sum has been received by the secretary, Mrs. T. Matthews, Llwynhelig House, from of the "Evening Express" Starving Prisoners of War Fund.

28 September 1918 <u>Half-Yearly Meetings</u> The half yearly meetings in connection with Noddfa chapel were held on Sunday and Monday last. The Rev. W. S. Jones, Llwynypia,

preached very appropriate sermons to large congregations. Miss Hilda Phillips presided at the organ, and Mr. Thomas Evans conducted the singing.

28 September 1918 <u>Harvest Festival</u> The Harvest Festival Services in connection with St. Mary's Church were held on Sunday, Tuesday, and Wednesday last. The Church had been artistically decorated, large quantities of vegetables, flowers, etc, being given. The services on Sunday were conducted by the Vicar. 10 May 1919 St Mary the Virgin: Easter Vestry Meeting: Departure of Rev. John Francis to Kenfig Hill The Rev. John Francis, vicar, presided over the vestry meeting. Mr. W J Payne, churchwarden, presented the accounts, which showed that the financial position had been well supported during the last year, which was really a record. He referred with deep regret to the impending departure of the vicar for Kenfig Hill. During the vicars two-and-a-half years stay in their midst, he had won the esteem, not only of the Church people, but also the members of all the other denominations. The financial statement showed a credit balance of £134 -17-3. The Vicar feelingly acknowledged the tribute which had been paid to him. He congratulated the Church on its excellent work, and particularly testified to the conscientious and efficient manner in which Mr. Payne had acquitted himself as churchwarden. It had been a source of great pain to him to decide to leave, as he and his family had never been happier than at Fochriw, where the voice of kindness and a helping hand, had always marked the conduct of the people towards him and his family. He wished to tender his deepest gratitude to all the officers and members of the Church. Addresses, eulogistic of the Vicar's splendid ministry, were delivered by several members. Mr. W J. Payne was unanimously re-elected People's Warden, and Councillor John Edwards was re-appointed Warden for St Peter's, Deri. The other officers were also re-elected, and the following persons were appointed as sidesman: Messrs. Arthur Evans; C. Payne; W. Walton; G. Way; W. Curtis; W. Hughes; W. Morris; F. Way; G. Baldwin; R. Hughes; J. M. Davies; H. Edgar; C. Ballard; E. Lewis; J. Morris; C. Hollister; W. Thomas; S. Perrott; W Sibley; T Jones. A cheque for £50 was handed to the vicar as an Easter offering.

24 May 1919 <u>Nazareth Chapel</u> The half yearly meetings were held on Sunday and Monday last, when the Rev. W. M. Davies, Abercanaid, preached effective sermons to large congregations. Mr. W. Davies presided at the organ, and Mr. W. Morris conducted singing.

14 June 1919 <u>Carmel Chapel</u> The half yearly meetings in connection with the chapel where held on Sunday and Monday last. The ministers were Rev. R. E. Peregrine, Rhymney, and Rev. J. B. Matthews, Penydarren, who preached powerful sermons. The choir was conducted by Mr. David Davies.

5 July 1919 <u>Sunday School Treat</u> On Tuesday last, the Sunday school scholars and friends of St. Mary's Church held their Sunday school treat at Talybont-on-Usk. Tea was served at the Usk Hotel. Afterwards, the children played games. The party returned home at 7p.m.

12 July 1919 <u>Church Outings</u> On Tuesday last, Carmel, Noddfa and Nazareth held their Sunday school treats at Barry Island. The weather was ideal, and a glorious day was spent.

19 July 1919 <u>The Reverend Samuel Evans</u> The Rev. Samuel Evans, formerly Curate of Penarth, entered on his duties on Sunday as the vicar of Fochriw, Deri and Pantywaun.

9 August 1919 <u>Social</u> A very pleasant social afternoon was held at St. Mary's Hall and Thursday, the occasion being to welcome the Reverend and Mrs. Samuel Evans and family to their new sphere of labour - the charge of Fochriw, Deri and Pantywaun. There were representatives from each Church present, and a right royal welcome was extended. The happy gathering included the late vicar, the Rev. John Francis and Mrs. Francis. The tables were gaily decorated by the good ladies of St. Mary's, and were laden with good things. The new vicar came from Mamhilad, near Pontypool, where he had been since being discharged from the Army, in which he had served from the early part of the war until he was severely gassed in the Battle of the Somme. After being in hospital for 17 weeks, he was discharged. He has already created a very favourable impression among the people. His numerous friends wish him well in his new sphere of labour.

He had made friends, not only in the church, but also on the allotments, and on the football field. Rev. Fowler then presented the books to Mrs. Francis and the children - Masters Mervyn and John, and Miss Lizzie. The Rev. R. D. Jenkins then spoke in glowing terms of Rev. Francis work, wishing him well in his new place. "It was only a change of place: the work is the same," he said. A hearty vote of thanks to the chairman was proposed by Nurse Thomas, and seconded by Mrs. Harris.

The presidents were: morning – Mr. D. J. Thomas; afternoon – Mr. M. Williams; evening – Mr. E. M. Davies.

17 April 1920 St. Mary the Virgin The annual Vestry meeting in connection with St. Mary's was held at the Church Hall on Wednesday evening, the vicar presiding. In his opening remarks, he spoke about the change brought about by the Disestablishment Act, and said it would alter the nature of vestry meetings for the future. Church matters would henceforth be dealt with by the Parochial Council, which would be chosen that evening. Mr. W. J. Payne, churchwarden, before presenting the accounts, gave a very able address on the effects of the Disestablishment Act. He pleaded for closer co-operation in future, and felt convinced that the new Welsh Church would become a greater power than ever. The accounts showed a balance on the right side. After they had been adopted, the vicar paid a magnificent tribute to Mr. Payne for the way he kept the accounts and for his untiring work in connection with the Church. He also paid a high compliment to Mr. Berkley Angell, choirmaster, Mr. Octavius Richards, organist, Mr. Payne, Sunday school superintendent, and also the sidesman, teachers, collectors, and all would worked so hard during the past year. Mr. W. J. Payne was re-elected People's Warden. Councillor John Edwards was appointed vicar's warden, with Mr. B. Angell, choirmaster, Mr. O. Richards, organist, and Mr. Payne, Sunday school superintendent. Sidesman: - Messrs. C. Payne, Richard Evans, Slimmonds, E. Lewis, H. Edgar, W. Wilton, T. Baldwin, W. Hughes, John Morris, W. Sibley. Parochial Council: Messrs. T. Baldwin, Charles Payne, William Wilton, George Henry Slimmons, William Hughes, and Caradoc Ballard. Mr. W. J. Payne, on behalf of the people, then handed the vicar an Easter offering of £54 for which he thanked them all very much. Votes of thanks to the chairman, Church wardens and Mrs. Evans, brought a pleasant evening to a close.

1 May 1920 <u>Confirmation</u> The Lord Bishop of Llandaff will visit St. Mary's Church on Friday, 30th April, at 5p.m. to hold a confirmation service. His Lordship's visit has been looked forward to for a long time. The Vicar, the Reverend Samuel Evans, extends a hearty invitation to all clergy and friends to be present. Tea will be provided for the visitors.

1 May 1920 <u>Carmel Chapel</u> A bachelors' tea and entertainment was held at the above on Tuesday evening. A very large number of people assembled. Tea was served at the vestry and the entertainment was held at Chapel, where the following took part in the programme: piano selection, Mr. Thomas Walters; violin solos, Miss Miriam Thomas and Miss Morgan, Aelybryn; solos, Mr. James John Lewis, Miss Ballard and Miss Cook; duets by Miss Ceinwen Ballard and her sister, and Masters Stanley Lewis and Lewis Angell. Recitations were delivered by Mr. James Williams, Pentwyn, and Mrs. Bronwen Davies. A choir of the church members gave several renderings under the leadership of the Mrs. M. A. Davies. Mr. David Griffiths, junior, sang "Hen Ffon fy Nain" in a very striking manner, and was greatly admired by all the old folks present. Mrs. Bronwen Davies very ably presided at the entertainment, whilst the Reverend D. Jenkins Jones, who has answered the church's call to become their minister in the near future, gave a short and encouraging address. The evening terminated with "Hen Wlad fy Nhadau."

8 May 1920 <u>Confirmation</u> On Friday evening last, the Lord Bishop of Llandaff visited St. Mary's Church and held a confirmation service. The sacred edifice was packed. The United choirs of St. Mary's and St. Peter's, Deri, joined together under the conductorship of Mr. Berkley Angell and Mr. John Owen, and gave fine renderings. The Preface was read by the

Rev. Samuel Evans, Vicar, after which the Bishop gave a very inspiring address on duty. Afterwards, the Bishop confirmed 59 persons. The singing of "Oh! Jesus I have Promised" brought a memorable service to an end, with the Bishop pronouncing the Benediction. Mr. Octavius Richards was at the organ. Also present were the Revs. E. Fowler, Deri, J. C. Payne, Rhondda; Dewi Williams, vicar of Rhymney. Tea was provided in the hall by the good ladies of the Church for all visitors. There is a great deal of work going on now at St. Mary, amongst which is a new heating apparatus, which is being fixed by the Messrs. Musgrave and Co., Belfast, and which has been badly needed for some time. The ladies are also busy getting ready for a bazaar in the near future.

5 June 1920 <u>Carmel Chapel</u> The annual meetings in connection with the chapel were held on Sunday and Monday last, the Rev. E. Keri Evans, Carmarthen, preaching very appropriate sermons to large congregations. Mr. Thomas Walters presided at the organ, whilst Mr. David Davies conducted the singing.

5 June 1920 <u>Nazareth Chapel</u> The annual meetings in connection with the chapel were held on Sunday and Monday last, and were well attended. Rev. B. Watkins, Ferndale, preached very edifying sermons throughout. Mr. W. A. Davies presided at the organ, whilst Mr. William Morris conducted the singing.

26 June 1920 <u>Sergeant Honoured</u> At a recent meeting of the Glamorgan Baptist Association, held at Abercanaid, Police Sergeant H. Williams, Fochriw, was presented with a beautiful illuminated address. Sergeant Williams has rendered faithful service at Penybank for about 20 years. The presentation was made by the Rev. W. C. Thomas, Dowlais, who referred to the excellent work done by the recipient. It was chiefly through the activities of Sergeant Williams that the cause at Penybank was kept open for so many years, and he was also instrumental in raising about £1,000 towards the debt, which is now cleared. His activities at Fochriw have been highly appreciated by the denomination.

10 July 1920 <u>Chapel Teas</u> The annual tea parties in connection with Carmel, Noddfa and Nazareth took place on Monday last. The weather was not very favourable. Carmel Sunday school paraded the streets, headed by the Fochriw Brass Band, the children looking a very pleasing sight in their various dresses. Each Sunday school partook of tea at their various vestries, to which justice was done. After tea sports and games were played.

10 July 1920 Induction to Carmel Chapel: Rev. D. Jenkin Jones The induction service of the Reverend D. Jenkin Jones, formerly pastor of Gendros, Forestfach, Swansea, as pastor of the Church at Carmel, took place on Thursday afternoon. Despite the inclement weather, a large congregation attended. The meeting was presided over by Mr. D. H. Edwards, President of the North Glamorgan Congregational Association. The opening service was conducted by the Rev. Morris of Brynmaw, who read a portion of Scripture, and the Rev. D. R. Williams of Beaufort, who led the prayers. The chairman preferred to numerous letters received from friends of the pastor explaining inability to attend, and referring to the exemplary character and faithfulness of Mr. Jones. Mr. E. M. Davies, secretary of Carmel, gave a brief and interesting account of Carmel's history, and extended a cordial welcome to the new pastor. A significant feature of the meeting was the presence of a large number of Mr. Jones's former members from Swansea, who had come up by charabanc to do honour to their late pastor. Able congratulatory addresses followed from layman and ministers of the different denominations in Fochriw and District, and a special prayer upon the union was offered by the Reverend Jones of Deri. The Rev. D Jenkins Jones, who was visibly affected, briefly thanked those who had attended to do him honour. In the evening, excellent sermons were delivered by the Rev. D. Hughes Jones, a former pastor of Carmel, and the Rev. J. P. Evans of Penygraig, Carmarthen.

10 July 1920 <u>Sale of Work at Fochriw</u> Under the auspices of the Mothers' Guild and Girls' Guild connected with St. Mary's Church, a very highly successful sale of work was held at the Church Hall on Thursday and Friday last. The members of the both Guilds, of which Mrs. Samuel Evans is president and organiser, had worked assiduously in the last winter months in anticipation of the event, and the success which crowned a splendid effort is a tribute to their businesslike and efficient preparations during the past months. The funds of the Church will benefit to the extent of £150. Since the advent of the vicar and his wife to the parish 12 months ago, their untiring efforts for the Church have realised large sums of money, which have been

spent improving the Church. The opening ceremony of the sale, was performed by the Reverend Canon T. J. Jones, R. D., Gellygaer.

10 July 1920 Fochriw Police Sergeant's Splendid Record: P.S. Henry Williams Honoured by Baptist Association The record of Police Sergeant Henry Williams, who has just been presented with an illuminated address by the East Glamorgan Baptist Association in recognition of his long, faithful, and fruitful service to the cause, is somewhat unique. He has served for 38 years in the Glamorgan Police Force, and on being stationed at Fochriw, over 30 years ago, he found the cause at Siloh, in the adjacent village of Penybank, closed, with the burden of £800 debt. Setting to work with exemplary zeal, Sergeant Williams was instrumental in collecting the amount required and in reviving the cause. For 19 years he has kept the Sunday School for some forty or fifty children at Siloh. During the whole period, he has been equally active in the interest of Noddfa Church, Fochriw, where he has been a deacon for about 30 years. For the two chapels, he has been mainly responsible for collecting the magnificent sum of £3,000. The address presented to Sergeant Williams was entirely in Welsh.

17 July 1920 <u>Pulpit</u> The pulpit at St. Mary's Church was occupied on Sunday by the Reverend J. C. Payne. Mr. Angell conducted the singing, with Mr. Richards at the organ.

28 August 1920 <u>Tea Party</u> The annual Sunday school treat in connection with St. Mary's and St. Andrew's Sunday schools, was held on Thursday last. A service for the children was held in St. Mary's at 11a.m., conducted by the Vicar. At 3p.m. the children assembled in S. Mary's Hall, and afterwards formed a procession headed by the Fochriw Brass Band, conducted by Mr. Hanney, and paraded the streets, looking a very pleasing spectacle in their various colours. On returning to the hall, an excellent tea was provided. After tea, sports and games were played at Pentwyn.

2 October 1920 <u>Harvest Festival Services</u> These were held at St. Mary's Church on Sunday, Tuesday, and Wednesday, and at St. Andrew's, Pentwyn, on Monday evening. The churches had been beautifully decorated with flowers, fruit and vegetables. At St. Mary's on Sunday, the vicar preached very edifying sermons, the Church being full. The choir, under the conductorship of Mr. Angell, rendered the anthem "Enter into His Gates with Thanksgiving." Mr. O. Richards was at the organ. At St. Andrew's on Monday, the preacher was the Reverend J. D. Hughes, vicar of Porth. At St. Mary's on Tuesday evening the preacher has the vicar, and on Wednesday evening, the Reverend J. W. James, vicar of Cwmcarn. All preached powerful sermons throughout the festival services.

23 October 1920 <u>Social</u> A very enjoyable social and dance was held at St. Mary's Hall on Friday last and was well attended. Refreshments were provided by members of the Mothers' Union. Mr. Ted Puddle was the master of ceremonies, with Mr. Octavius Richards at the piano.

30 October 1920 <u>Harvest Festival</u> This service was held at St. David's Church, Pantywaun on Thursday evening last. The service was intoned by Mr. W J. Payne. The Reverend Samuel Evans preached a very edifying sermon.

30 October 1920 <u>Social</u> A dance was held at St. Mary's Hall on Friday evening last. The Mother's Union provided the refreshments. The M.C. was Mr. Ted Puddle, and the pianist Mr. O. Richards.

30 October 1920 <u>Mothers' Union</u> On Monday last, the members of the St. Mary's Mothers' Union journeyed to and Newport to attend a large meeting at St. Mark's Schoolroom. Amongst the principal speakers were Mrs. Digby Reed. The arrangements were in the hands of Mrs. Samuel Evans.

6 November 1920 <u>Vicar's Lecture</u> On Tuesday evening, at the Church Hall, the Reverend Samuel Evans read a very interesting and edifying paper are on "The Life of Henry IV."

6 November 1920 <u>Social</u> On Friday last a social and dance are held at St. Mary's Hall. Mr. Puddle was M.C., and Mr. Richards was at the piano.

20 November 1920 <u>St. Mary's Debating and Dramatic Society</u> On Thursday, a very pleasant evening was spent at the Church Hall, the subject for discussion being "Socialism." The chair was occupied by the President, the Reverend Samuel Evans, Vicar. Mr. Albert Lewis took up the affirmative, and Mr. Willie Hughes the negative, both having very interesting papers, which were well received. The vicar and Mr. W. J. Payne took part in the discussion. On being put to the vote the affirmative carried.

27 November 1920 Lecture On Wednesday evening, the members of the St. Mary's Debating Society spent a very pleasant evening in the Church hall. The evening had been set apart to hear an address from Mr .W. J. Payne, who, being a member of the Diocesan Conference, chose as his subject "My Impressions of the Diocesan Conference."

4 December 1920 <u>St. Mary's Hall</u> On Thursday last at the above Hall a fine social in connection with the children of St. Mary's Church was held. Quite a large number of children were present. Many games were played. Mr. Willie Hughes was the pianist.

11 December 1920 <u>Grand Concert</u> A grand concert was held at Carmel Chapel on Thursday last, presided over by the Reverend D. Jenkins Jones. The following contributed: soprano, Mrs. H C Davies; alto, Mrs. Ceridwen Walters; tenor, Mr. James J. Lewis; elocutionist, Mrs Bronwen Davies; accompanist, Mr Thomas Walters.

18 December 1920 <u>Lecture</u> A lecture was given at Carmel Chapel on Tuesday night by the Councillor Morgan Jones who took for his subject "Gaolbird."

25 December 1920 <u>Organ Recital</u> On Thursday evening last at St. Mary Church, a grand organ recital was given by Mr. E. R. Lewis, of the Memorial Hall, Cardiff, assisted by the Miss Jenkins, soprano, and Miss Mabel Welch, contralto, both of Cardiff. The organ, which is a magnificent instrument by the well-known makers, Brackett and Howden, Newcastle, has been entirely rebuilt. It has been removed from the Lady Chapel to the organ chamber, where it now presents a striking appearance. The playing of Mr. Lewis delighted the crowded congregation, and the singing of the artistes was much enjoyed. At a close of the programme, the vicar pronounced the blessing.

1 January 1921 <u>Noddfa Chapel</u> On Christmas Eve, a fine Christmas tree had been decorated and loaded with toys, etc. During the evening, the gifts were distributed to all the children present and an enjoyable time was spent.

1 January 1921 <u>St. Mary's Church</u> Services were held at St. Mary's Church on Christmas Day. They were well attended, the celebrant being Reverend Samuel Evans, the vicar. Mr. Angell conducted this singing and Mr. Richards presided at the organ.

1 January 1921 <u>Christmas Tree</u> At Noddfa on Wednesday last, a Christmas tree in connection with the Maternity and Child Welfare had been organised by Nurse Thomas and

some friends. The tree was well laden with beautiful gifts for the children, close on 200 presents being distributed. The Welfare is well-organised in the place and is conducted in a very efficient manner. Among some of the untiring workers are Dr. J. Stenner Evans, Nurse Thomas, Nurse Rees, Mrs. Samuel Evans, Mrs. John Bevan, Mrs. I. Evans, Mrs. R Hughes, & Mrs. I. Williams.

1 January 1921 <u>Gymanfa Ganu</u> A well attended Gymanfa Ganu was held at Noddfa Chapel on Christmas Day, when the members of the chapel and of Nazareth, joined together under the conductorship of Mr. Thomas Evans, to sing well selected hymns and anthems. The accompanists for the day were Mr. Wyndham Lawrence, Miss Enid Evans, Mr. Willie Angell - Davies, and Miss Hilda Phillips. The presidents were the Reverend Esaiah Williams, Mr. John Jones and Mr. Evan Jones. The singing was of a very high standard.

1 January 1921 <u>Carmel Chapel</u> On Christmas Day, under the conductorship of Mr. Evan Thomas, the well-known conductor of the Penywern Male Voice Party, the members of the Carmel Chapel held their annual singing festival, which was much enjoyed by the large number present. The morning service was opened by the reciting of a Psalm by Miss Mary L. Morgan, and the president for the morning was Mr. D. J. Thomas. The afternoon and evening services were opened by Miss Mary Thomas and Mr. Thomas H. Jones, while the presidents were the Reverend D. J. Jones and Mr. Moses Williams. There was a fine orchestra in attendance under the conductorship of Mr. D. J. Thomas. The accompanists were Mr. Thomas Walters, Mr. Aneurin Thomas and Miss Elsie Griffiths. The following also took part during the day: duet Miss Mary and Miss Jenny Shankland; violin duet, Miss Mary Morgan and Master Windsor Rees; solos, Miss Doris Davies and Miss Lydia Ballard.

8 January 1921 <u>Noddfa Chapel</u> A grand concert was held on Friday last, when the large audience were entertained to a fine musical treat by the renowned gleemen of Troedyrhiw and District, conducted by Mr. Herbert Llewellyn, and assisted by eminent artistes. Mr. John Bevan, M.E., made a very able chairman.

8 January 1921 <u>Carmel Vestry</u> A grand social organised by the members of the Christian Endeavour of Carmel Chapel, took place last Thursday. The vestry had been gaily decorated by the members for the occasion. A large number sat down to the good things provided. After tea, a concert was held, presided over by the Rev. D. J. 8 January 1921 <u>Social</u> A social was held at St. Mary's Hall on Thursday, organised by the Fochriw Discharged Soldiers and Sailors, in aid of the widows and orphans of soldiers that made the supreme sacrifice. Refreshments were provided by some of the members of St. Mary's Mothers' Union under Mrs. Samuel Evans. There were games and dancing. At the close a vote of thanks was accorded the vicar and Church people for their kindness in lending the hall and giving their services so freely. It was proposed by Mr. Thomas H. Jones and seconded by Mr. Kinsey Llewelyn. The M.C. scene for the evening was as Mr. T. Puddle, with Mr. Octavius Richards at the piano, and Master Francis Wilton on the violin. The duties of secretary were carried out by Mr. John Francis.

29 January 1921 Social A social was held at St. Mary's Hall on Friday last in connection with the St. Mary's Sunday school. The hall had been gaily decorated for the occasion and looked a pleasing spectacle. All the refreshments had been given and collected by the Church people. The tables were laid for about 200 children. Afterwards they played games etc. The Vicar, and Mr. W J. Payne, superintendent of the Sunday School, addressed the scholars. Miss Nan Prosser gave a solo. At the close, oranges etc were distributed to all scholars. Mr. O. Richards presided at the piano.

29 January 1921 <u>Sunday School</u> Last Sunday afternoon, the scholars of St. Mary's Sunday School were awarded prizes for faithfulness and good attendance during 1920. The prizes were confined to the first second and third in each class. The school is in a very flourishing state. Mr. Charles Payne addressed the scholars, giving a very lucid account of Sunday school work for 40 years at Pentwyn. He also exhibited a first prize book which he secured at Pentwyn Church 40 years ago. The vicar, and Mr. W. J. Payne, also spoke to the scholars. Afterwards they handed the scholars their prizes.

29 January 1921 Sergt. Henry Williams, Fochriw: the following was the cameo in Monday's "South Wales News" Police Sergeant Henry Williams, of Fochriw, is not only an officer who has won the esteem of colleagues and citizens, but a man who cherishes a remarkable and, doubtless, a unique record of Christian service. For nearly 40 years he has served in the Glamorgan force, but his sterling work in the cause of the Master covers a span of approximately half a century. On taking up duties at Fochriw over 30 years ago, he found at the Baptist chapel at Penybank, an adjacent village, closed, with a debt of £800. Sergeant Williams set to work with heart and will to remove this burden, and through his zeal and energy the debt was wiped off, and the cause revived. For 20 years, with the assistance of his wife and son, he has kept a Sunday School for some 40 or 50 children at Penybank. His activities, however, have not been confined to Penybank. For over 30 years he has been a deacon of the Noddfa chapel, Fochriw, and the total sums collected by him towards the two causes amount to £3,000. In presenting him with an illuminated address as a little acknowledgement of his services, the East Glamorgan Baptist Association, with its membership of over 80,000, confers honour on itself.

5 February 1921 <u>Carmel Chapel</u> A gramophone a recital was given at Carmel Chapel on Tuesday evening. Records of the famous Signor Caruso, the world's best tenor; Galli Curci, Italian soprano; Peter Dawson, Australian baritone; Clara Butt, contralto; Edna Thorton, English contralto; duets and solos by the other famous singers were played. Also, there were violin solos by Miss Elsie Southgate, Miss Edna Burrows, Mr. Latimer Evans, and Miss Doreen Weeks gave a recitation. The meeting was closed by a Welsh Male Voice Party who sang "Hen Wlad fy Nhadau" on the gramophone. Mr. Robert Thomas, South Tunnel, manipulated the gramophone in fine style. The Reverend D. J. Jones presided, and the programme was thoroughly enjoyed.

12 February 1921 <u>Lantern Lecture</u> On Tuesday evening last at Noddfa Chapel Vestry, a very instructive lantern lecture was given to a large audience. A very striking series of pictures was shown, including the "Two Watchers." etc. Reverend Esaiah Williams proved himself a very capable lecturer, whilst Mr. J. Evans manipulated the lantern in fine style.

12 February 1921 <u>Social</u> A social evening was spent at St. Mary's Hall on Tuesday evening (Shrove Tuesday), when a large number were present. There were games and dancing, and refreshments provided by members of the Mothers' Union. Mr. Ted Puddle was MC, with Mr. O. Richards at the piano.

12 February 1921 <u>Christian Endeavour</u> At Trinity Baptist Church, a very enjoyable evening was spent on Wednesday by members connected with the Christian Endeavour. The pastor gave a very true warning to the members, intimating that at present times, it was vital for them to hold to that which was good. More items were rendered by Mrs. Price, Mrs. Rachel Phillips, H. Jones, and Miss Richard, the latter being an old inhabitant who had removed to London, but was now on holiday in the village. Councillor Jenkins presided in his inimitable manner.

26 February 1921 <u>High-Class Concert</u> The people of Fochriw are indebted to the members of the Nazareth Chapel for providing such a high class concert on Tuesday evening at Noddfa Chapel, kindly lent for the occasion. The evening had been eagerly looked forward to by all music lovers, and the chapel was well filled. The chair was taken by Mr. J. Jones, who proved a very able chairman, and opened the concert with some well-chosen remarks. The artistes were Madam Clee-Williams, Treharris, soprano; Miss Mary Dilys Jones, Penarth, contralto; Mr. Harry Lewis, Nelson, tenor; Mr. L. Powell Evans, Cardiff, bass; accompanist, Miss Llywela Lewis, Hengoed. A hearty vote of thanks was accorded the artistes etc. by the Rev. J. Williams, seconded by the Rev. R. D. Jenkins.

5 March 1921 <u>Noddfa Chapel</u> A lantern lecture was given at the above vestry on a Wednesday February 23rd. The sets of slides were entitled "Pig and Pills," "Wet Paint," "Tell-tale Sister," "Agathos," "Christ and Children," "I only take a little Wine." The slides were supplied by City Sale and Exchange, London. The Reverend Esaiah Williams lectured to the children on the contents of the slides. A very interesting and beneficial evening was spent.

On St. David's night, a social was held at Noddfa vestry. The proceeds were in aid of the sewing class conducted by the Sisters of the Church. Tea also served at 6.30. The tables were attended by the following sisters: Mrs. J. Williams and Miss Rachel Harris; Mrs. Jenkin Rug and Miss Maggie Davies; Miss Afonwy Price and Miss Enid Evans; Mrs. T. Matthews and

Mrs. Esaiah Williams. Assistance was also rendered by Mrs. Tom Evans, Mrs. Jane Mathews, Mrs. W. Price, Mrs. Tom Evans and Mr. David Thomas. After the tables were cleared, a concert was held and a number of games played. The proceeds were quite satisfactory.

5 March 1921 <u>St. Mary's</u> Holy Communion was celebrated at St. Mary's Church at 8p.m. on St. David's Day, the celebrant being the Vicar. The special Lenten preacher for Thursday evening at 6:30p.m. and also for Thursday 10th March at 6.30, is the Reverend Dr. Jenner, the Rector of the Llangasty, the well known missioner.

5 March 1921 <u>Gymanfa</u> The members of Noddfa and Nazareth Chapel held a united singing festival at Noddfa Chapel on Sunday afternoon and evening last. The chapel was well filled, and the singing reached a high standard. The conductor for the day was Mr. Thomas Evans, junior, who performed his duties very successfully. Mr. John Jones presided at the afternoon meeting, and Mr. Thomas Evans, senior, at the evening meeting. The accompanists were Miss Hilda Phillips, Mr. W. A. Davies, and Master Wyndham Lawrence.

12 March 1921 <u>Noddfa Chapel</u> A well attended lantern lecture was given at the vestry on Wednesday evening, when a number of interesting and instructive slides were shown, much to the delight of the large number present. The Reverend Esaiah Williams presented slides and Mr. Joshua Evans manipulated the lantern.

12 March 1921 Lenten Service A special Lenten service was held at St. Mary's Church on Thursday evening, the special preacher being the Rev. Dr. Jenner, Rector of Llangasty, who preached a very powerful sermon on the Prodigal Son. The Vicar intoned the service, and Mr. W. J. Payne read the lessons. Mr. Angell conducted singing, and Mr. Richards presided at the organ.

19 March 1921 <u>Noddfa Chapel</u> On Sunday and Monday last, meetings were held at the above Chapel. The preacher was the Rev. H. Ellis, Dowlais, who preached very powerful sermons to large congregations. The singing was conducted by Mr. Thomas Evans, with Miss Hilda Phillips at the organ.

26 March 1921 Palm Sunday Palm Sunday was observed at St. Mary's by a celebration of Holy Communion at eight o'clock, and a service, with distribution of palms, at 11 o'clock. At 2:30p.m. there was a service at St. Andrews. The services were conducted by the vicar. Flowers were laid on the graves of the departed.

26 March 1921 Lent The special Lenten preacher on Wednesday evening at St. Mary's was the Rev. David Davies, vicar of Bedlinog, who delivered a very inspiring sermon. The service was sung by the Vicar, with Mr. Richards at the organ, and Mr. Angel conducting the singing.

2 April 1921 Easter Day This was celebrated at St. Mary's Church with Holy Communion at 6, 7, and 11a.m., and was very well attended, a record number of communicates being present. The Vicar officiated. There was a children's service at 3p.m., addressed by Mr. W. J. Payne, Sunday school superintendent. There was a service at 6:00p.m., the vicar preaching. Mr. Angell conducted singing, and Mr. Richards was at the organ.

16 April 1921 Easter Vestry The annual Easter vestry meeting at St. Mary's was held at the Church Hall on Wednesday evening, the vicar presiding. The Vicar opened with prayer, and expressed delight at seeing such a large number present. Mr. W. J. Payne then presented the statement of accounts, which he said was a record one. An up-to-date heating apparatus had been installed, meeting a long felt want. The organ had been removed from the Lady Chapel and rebuilt in the organ chamber. Several other improvements had also been carried out entailing much expense. Nonetheless, there was a very substantial balance on the right side, thanks to the untiring efforts of Mrs. Samuel Evans and her faithful band of workers in the Mother's Guild. The sale of work had realised about a £156, and the parochial fund had also been well supported. Total receipts for the year had reached £668-7-6, which showed the Church to be in a very flourishing condition. The number of Easter comunicants was a record. The accounts were adopted, and the vicar said that such a satisfactory state should fill them all with confidence for the future. He then thanked all the officers of the Church, individually and by name, for their efforts in the past year, and in particular the Churchwardens, Mr. W. J. Payne at St. Mary's, and Councillor John Edwards at St. Peter's, Deri. He said that they were holding their meeting under the shadow of a dark cloud in the industrial world. Let us pray that it would soon be bright again. Mr. W. J. Payne was unanimously re-elected People's Warden, and the

Vicar of re-elected Councillor John Edwards as Vicar's Warden. The following were elected sidesman: Mr. Charles Payne, Mr. F. Baldwin, Mr. J. Morris, Mr. H. Edgar, Mr. E. Lewis, Mr. Owen Morris, Mr. W. Wilton, Mr. R. Evans, Mr. C. Hollister, Mr. W. J. Curtis, Mr. W. Sibley, Mr. W. Hughes; choirmaster, Mr B. Angell; organist, Mr. O. Richards, superintendent Sunday School, Mr. W. J. Payne; Parochial Church Council: Messrs. B. Angell, C. Payne, H. Edgar, J. Morris, W. Hughes, T. Baldwin, C. Hollister, W. J. Curtis. A vote at thanks to the vicar concluded a very pleasant vestry meeting.

14 May 1921 <u>Concert</u> A well attended concert wound up a very successful year in connection with the Young People's Christian Endeavour Society. The chairman was the Reverend D. Jenkins Jones. Programme: overture, Mr. James Thomas; recitations, Miss Edna Burrows, Miss Doreen Weeks, Miss Eurona Lewis, Mr. Latimer Evans, Mr. Edmund Davies; solos, Miss Lydia Ballard, Miss Doris Davies, Miss Maggie Lewis, Mr. John Morgan; duets, Miss Edna M. Angell and Miss Eiluned Lawrence; Misses Lydia and Ceinwen Ballard; pianoforte solos, Gwladys Shanblac, Miss Annie Ballard and Miss Bessie Ballard; violin solos, Miss Mary Morgan, Master Windsor Rees. The report of the session's work was written by the secretary of the Guild, Miss Annie Maud Jones, and read by the chairman. The session commenced on October 26th, 1920, and the meetings were held at Carmel vestry every Wednesday evening at 7:45p.m. There were over 70 members.

21 May 1921 <u>St. Mary's Church</u> Services were held at St. Mary's on Whitsuntide and were well attended. The Holy Eucharist was celebrated at 7 & 11a.m. by the Vicar. A children's service was held at 3p.m., and evensong and sermon at 6p.m., the vicar preaching.

28 May 1921 <u>Social</u> A very pleasant social evening was spent at St. Mary's Hall on Friday evening last, when the Church people of St. Mary's, including children, spent an enjoyable evening. Tea was provided by the members, and afterwards games were played. Thanks are due to Mrs. Evans and her faithful band of Mothers' Union and Girls Guild, who attended to the children. Mr. Octavius Richards presided at the piano. During the coal crisis, the vicar and the male members of the Church have been very active preparing and painting in and around the Church. A very early visit of the Lord Bishop of Llandaff is anticipated to complete Fochriw and Deri into a separate parish, for which the consent of the Diocesan Conference was given last November.

28 May 1921 <u>Success</u> The numerous friends of the Reverend J. C. Payne will be very pleased to hear that he successfully passed his final examination for the priesthood of the Church in Wales, and was ordained at Llandaff Cathedral on Trinity Sunday by the Lord Bishop. Reverend Payne, until a few years ago, worked as an engine driver at the Fochriw Colliery, devoting his spare time to Church work in the parish. For 14 years he laboured tirelessly as a voluntary lay preacher, having sole charge of St. Andrews, Pentwyn, for five years, where his earnest labours were crowned with success. Having a keen desire to become a priest, he gave up his work at the colliery, which meant a great financial sacrifice, to try and attain his ambition. It is the wish of all his friends that he be spared for many years to carry on the noble work.

11 June 1921 <u>Preaching Services</u> Carmel Congregational Chapel held their annual services on Sunday and Monday last, and good congregations were present. Very powerful sermons were preached by Rev. I. George, Tredegar. Mr. Walters was the organist, and Mr. David Davies conducted singing.

11 June 1921 <u>Concert</u> A very successful concert was given in Penybank Chapel on Wednesday evening, June 1st, by the members of Carmel Young People's Guild, assisted by a few friends, the chair being taken by Miss Jones of Penybank School. The seating capacity of the chapel was severely taxed, and the following programme was received with much applause: overture, Mr. J. A. Thomas; pianoforte solos, Miss Gwladys Shankland and Miss A. M. Sims; violin selections, Miss Mary Morgan and Master Windsor Rees; recitations, Mr. Latimer Evans; dialogue, Miss Rona Lewis and Miss C. Shankland; solo, "The Sweetest Fairy" - Miss Doris Davies; "Fishes and Wishes" - Miss Agnes Cook; " Darlun fy Mam" - Miss Lydia Ballard; "There is a Land" - Miss M. Lewis. Mr. J. Thomas ably accompanied. A short drama entitled "Yr Hen Scwlin" was performed by members of the Guild, directed by Mr. Tommy

Jones. The evening ended in with the singing of "Hen Wlad fy Nhadau," Miss M. Lewis taking the solo.

2 July 1921 <u>St. Mary's Church</u> On Sunday last a special form of service was held, when special prayers were offered by the Vicar, the congregation joining very earnestly, for peace in the industrial world and in Ireland, as well as throughout the world. The whole service was very devotional. Mr. Payne read the lessons, Mr. Angell conducted the singing, and Mr. Richards was at the organ.

2 July 1921 <u>Bible Students' Association</u> At St. Mary's Hall on Tuesday evening, Mr. E. M. Richards delivered a very stirring lecture on the subject "The World has Ended: Millions Now Living Will Never Die." Mr. Richards kept his audience very interested throughout, basing all his arguments on prophecy and words spoken by Jesus Christ. Several hymns were sung with much fervour, the Speaker closing with prayer. On Wednesday evening, the subject was "What of our Dead?"

2 July 1921 <u>Concert</u> A well-attended concert was held at Penybank Baptist Chapel on Thursday evening in aid of the Distress Fund. The chair was very ably filled by Councillor David John Thomas. The entertainment was first class, the artistes bringing forth round after round of applause. The following took part: Madame H. C. Davies, Fochriw; Mr. James John Lewis, Fochriw; Mr. Theophilus Shankland, Fochriw; accompanist, Masters Aneurin Thomas, Fochriw.

9 July 1921 <u>Tea Party</u> The annual Sunday school tea party in connection with Carmel Chapel took place on Monday last in glorious weather. An excellent tea had been prepared, after which there were sports, old and young joining in.

9 July 1921 <u>St. Mary's Church</u> About 30 members of the St. Mary's Branch of the Mothers' Union had a very pleasant day at Llandaff Cathedral on Tuesday for the festival. The branch, under Mrs. Samuel Evans, is in a very flourishing condition, and their services in connection with Church work are very marked. On Tuesday afternoon next, the Lord Bishop of the Diocese will hold a consecration service at St. Mary's to which a hearty invitation is extended to all.

16 July 1921 Consecration Tuesday was a red-letter day in history of Church work at Fochriw, the occasion being the visit of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese to consecrate the Church of St. Mary the Virgin. Excellent preparations had been made for the visit. The Church was well filled long before the service commenced. His Lordship, accompanied by his Registrar, was met at Bargoed Station and driven by motor-car, (generously loaned by Mr. Tudor Davies), to Fochriw. There he was entertained at the Vicarage, after which he was driven to the School House. The procession looked very striking. The procession was preceded by the Rev. Luther Evans, vicar of Blackwood, carrying the Pastoral Staff, followed by the Registrar, the Rev. Samuel Evans, (who will be inducted as first vicar of the new parish on July 30^{th}), Rev. Dewi Williams, vicar of Rhymney, Rev. J. C. Payne, (who will shortly take up duties as curate in the new parish), the Rev. W. Brazell, Pontlottyn, the Churchwardens - Mr. W. J. Payne and Councillor John Edwards, and the surpliced choir. At the entrance to the Church, the petition of consecration was handed to the Bishop by the vicar of Pontlottyn, who afterwards directed the Registrar to read the same, after which the Bishop, clergy, and Churchwardens, proceeded towards the holy table. His Lordship then proceeded to the font, the chancel step, etc. After prayers by the Bishop, the consecration was read by the Registrar and signed by the Bishop. There followed a shortened form of evening prayer led by the Reverend Samuel Evans, the choir singing Psalms 84. The sermon was preached by the Bishop who chose his text from Genesis xxviii, 16 & 17, and gave a very inspiring address. The singing was conducted by Mr. Berkley Angell, with both choirs - Fochriw and Deri - being well represented. Mr. Octavius Richards was at the organ. After the service, Bishop, clergy and visitors were entertained to an excellent spread at the Church Hall. This was prepared by members of the Mothers' Union and Girls' Guild. Children were entertained on the green to a tea. The Church people wish to thank all who worked so hard to make the Bishop's visit the success it was.

30 July 1921 <u>St. Mary's</u> The pulpit at St. Mary's Church was occupied on Sunday last by the Rev. W. J. Brown of Blackburn, who preached a very edifying sermon.

6 August 1921 <u>Personal: Rev. J. C. Payne, the new curate of Deri</u> The large circle of friends of the Rev. J. C. Payne are very pleased to find him amongst them once more taking up duties in the newly-formed parish of Fochriw and Deri. He commenced his duties this week. His labours amongst us in the past need no recommendation as they are well-known. Six years ago, he gave up his duties as an underground engine driver at the Fochriw Colliery, to take up a position as licensed lay reader with Canon Lewis at Ystrad, working at the same time to become a priest of the Church in Wales. He was ordained by the Lord Bishop of Llandaff on Trinity Sunday last at Llandaff Cathedral. During the time he was in charge of St. Mark's, his ministry has been marked with wonderful success. His Church was crowded Sunday after Sunday, and other branches of Church work were equally successful. He preached his farewell sermon at St. Marks on Sunday evening last, and such a scene of devotion will never be forgotten. Before accepting the curacy of Deri, he was offered several very important positions. We wish him and his family a very happy and prosperous time in their important work.

6 August 1921 <u>Induction</u> On Saturday evening, at St. Mary's Church, the Rev. Canon Jones, Gellygaer, inducted the Rev. Samuel Evans, as the first the vicar of the parish of Fochriw and Deri. His appointment had been made by the Board of Patronage, and proved very popular. Previously, Rev. Evans had held curacies at Penarth, Cogan, and Studley (Warwickshire), and had also served in the Great War, where he was badly gassed, but from which he is now almost recovered. During his short time at Fochriw, with the aid of his good wife, and willing band of Church people, several improvements have been carried out at St. Mary's. The service was very impressive, and was conducted by Canon Jones, who delivered a very stirring address. He exhorted the people to pray for the new vicar, whose responsibilities were great and his task difficult. After the congregation had left the Church, and the door had been locked, a solemn service was conducted outside. Then the new vicar unlocked the door and tolled the bell. The service concluded with the singing of "Praise God from Whom all Blessings Flow." Mr. Richards presided at the organ, Mr. Angell conducted singing, and Mr. W. J. Payne read the lessons.

10 September 1921 <u>Noddfa</u> The annual Sunday school tea in connection with the chapel was held on Monday last. Ideal weather favoured the event. The wants of the little ones were looked after by the older members of the chapel. After tea games were played.

10 September 1921 <u>Nazareth Chapel</u> The annual Sunday school treat in connection with the above Chapel was held on Monday last. The weather was beautiful. They all did justice to the good things which had been prepared for them by the adults. During the evening, a presentation meeting was held, when Miss Annie M. Jones, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Jones, Central Stores, who is leaving to pursue her studies in the scholastic perfection at the Home and Colonial Training College, London, was presented with a beautiful work basket by the members of the chapel, where she has been faithful member. Master Cyril Evans, son of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Evans, Guest-street, was also presented with a set of brushes in a case on his leaving for the R.A.F. School at Stratford, Lincolnshire. The presentations were made by Mrs. Budd.

17 September 1921 <u>Tea Party</u> The annual tea party in connection with St. Mary's Church Sunday school took place on Monday afternoon in a very favourable weather. The scholars assembled at the Church Hall in large numbers, when the vicar offered prayer and gave a short address. The children sat down to an excellent tea, after which there were sports at Pentwyn. Thanks are due to all who contributed to the success of the day.

24 September 1921 <u>Noddfa Chapel</u> Special services were held on Sunday and Monday last, when the Rev. D. T. Samuel, preached very edifying sermons to the large congregations present. Mr. Thomas Evans conducted singing, with Miss Hilda Phillips at the organ.

1 October 1921 <u>Harvest Festival Services at Fochriw</u> Harvest Festival Services took place as follows: St. David's, Pantywaun - Thursday, Holy Communion, 11a.m.; Evensong at 6.30p.m., preacher, Rev J. C. Payne. On Sunday, the preacher was Mr. W. J. Payne. St. Mary the Virgin: Sunday - Holy Communion at 8a.m.; cantata, 11a.m.; solemn evensong, sermon and procession at 6p.m. The Vicar was the preacher throughout. Monday - Holy Communion at 8a.m.; evensong at 6p.m., the Rev. T. Thomas, vicar of Bargoed, preaching. Wednesday - Holy Communion at 8a.m.; evensong at 7p.m., the Rev. Henry James, vicar of New Tredegar,

preaching. St. Andrew's Pentwyn: Tuesday - Holy Communion at 11a.m.; evensong and sermon at 6p.m., the Rev. J. C. Payne, curate, preaching. The offertories at all the services were for the parochial quota.

1 October 1921 <u>Carmel Chapel</u> Last Sunday, the chapel held its opening services of the new pipe organ recently installed. A festival of song was decided upon, the conductor being Mr. Evan Thomas, Pantywern. The morning service was presided over by Mr. Daniel Davies, the afternoon by Mr. E. M. Davies, and the evening misses by Mr. W. Moses Williams, all three being deacons of the Church. A striking feature of the evening service was the part taken by Mrs. Davies of Swansea, sister of our late Dr. Eleazer Davies, who opened the services by reading a portion of scripture and leading in prayer. The singing was most beautiful and the new organ was played by Mr. Tom Walters, the church organist.

8 October 1921 <u>Spiritualists</u> A religious service was held at the Co-operative Rooms on Tuesday evening under the auspices of the Dowlais Spiritualist Church and was well attended. An address on clairvoyance was given by Mr. Spencer of Glasgow.

22 October 1921 <u>St. Mary's</u> On Sunday last, the pulpit at St. Mary's was occupied by the Rev. Luther Evans, vicar of Blackwood, who preached very edifying sermons. The lessons were read by Mr. W. J. Payne, Mr. Richards was at the organ, and the singing was conducted by Mr. B. Angell.

5 November 1921 <u>Nazareth Chapel</u> The yearly meetings in connection with the chapel where held on Sunday and Monday. The services were well-attended, and much appreciated. The Rev. B. Jones, Ammanford, preached very edifying sermons. The singing was conducted by Mr. William Morris, and Mr. Willie Angell Davies was at the organ.

The four teams which comprised the Fochriw Club at all going strongly in their respective divisions. The young boys were unfortunate to go under to Hengoed Albion on Saturday last 3 goals to 2.

10 December 1921 <u>Carmel Chapel</u> The half-yearly meetings in connection with the chapel where held on Sunday and Monday last, when the Rev. W. T. Gruffydd, Bethania, Dowlais, preached powerful sermons to the large congregations present. Mr. Thomas Walters was at the organ, and Mr. David Davies conducted a singing.

10 December 1921 <u>Social</u> A very pleasant children's social was held at St. Mary's Hall on Friday evening for the distribution of attendance prizes in connection with the stamp album for attendance at Sunday morning service at St. Mary's. Several children had a full attendance, and the majority had an excellent record. The prizes were distributed by the Rev. Samuel Evans, who spoke very encouraging words to the children. There were games throughout the evening, old and young joining in. Refreshments were provided by the Mothers' Union. During the evening the following contributed to the musical programme: Messrs. Albert Lewis, William Candrick, Cyril Lewis, Percy Jenkins, Tom Jones, Walter Jones. Mr. Octavius Richards was the accompanist.

17 December 1921 <u>Organ Recital</u> A grand organ recital was given at Carmel Chapel on Thursday evening by Mr. W. J. R. Davis, A.R.C.O., Tredegar, on the new organ which has recently been erected. The recital was very well attended and much enjoyed. The artistes were Miss Blodwen Williams, contralto, Dowlais, and Mr. W. J. Jones, tenor, Rhymney. The Rev. D. J. Jones was in the chair.

24 December 1921 Fancy Fair At St. Mary's Hall on Monday last, a very pretty fancy fair and Christmas Tree was held. The hall had been transformed into a veritable fairy land, which delighted all that visited the fair. The fair had been organised to get funds to enclose the Church and grounds with iron railings, the old ones having got into a very dilapidated state. The event had been worked for by the Church people for some time, especially the members of the Girls' Guild and Mothers' Guild under the supervision of Mrs. Samuel Evans. The fruits of their labours were very marked on the day. Before the opening ceremony, the hall was filled with people. Prayers were said by the Rev. J. C. Payne, after which the vicar made a very fine opening address. Mrs. Tudor Davies opened the fair. The stalls were as follows: sweet stall, fancy stall, toy stall, poultry and vegetables stall, refreshment stall, half-pound stall, rug stall, bran tub, hoop-la, weighing machine, fortune teller, Christmas tree, and various sideshows. **31 December 1921** <u>St. Mary's</u> Christmas Day was observed at St. Mary's Church with the celebration of Holy Communion at 6, 7, 8, and 11am, the celebrant and preacher being the Reverend Samuel Evans. At 6p.m., a short service was held, after which carols were sung. The singing was conducted by the choirmaster, Mr. Berkley Angell, Mr. Octavius Richards presiding at the organ.

31 December 1921 <u>Gymanfa</u> A singing festival was held at Noddfa Chapel on Christmas Day, when the members of Nazareth and Noddfa joined together and sang a very fine programme of music, under the conductorship of Mr. William Morris. The chairman at the afternoon service was Mr. David Thomas, and in the evening Mr. Thomas Evans. The singing was of a good standard. The accompanists were Miss Hilda Phillips, Mr. Willie Davies, and Master Wyndham Lawrence.

31 December 1921 <u>St Mary's Church</u> On Christmas morning, prior to the early communion celebration, a very impressive Dedication Service was held by the Vicar, when two brass vases were dedicated to the glory of God. One was in memory of the late Mr. Josiah Richards, a member of St. Mary's Church who laboured very faithfully. The vase was given by his son. The other vase was in memory of a gallant soldier who laid down his life for King and country on the battlefield of France during the Great War, namely Private Evan Evans, Cardiff City Battalion. It was given by his cousin.

31 December 1921 <u>Singing Festival</u> The annual Christmas singing festival in connection with Carmel Chapel took place on Christmas Day. The Church was filled. An excellent programme of music had been learned for the occasion, and singing was of the very high standard. The conductor was Mr. J. M. Webber, Merthyr. Williams and books for the 3 children. There were speeches on behalf of all the various places of worship in Fochriw: from Rev. Samuel Evans, vicar; Rev. J. D. Jones, Carmel; Sergeant H. Williams, Noddfa. There were also many clergy from all denominations from the surrounding areas.

4 March 1922 <u>Concert</u> A first-class concert was given at Noddfa Chapel on Thursday last by the Cymric Glee Party, assisted by the following artistes: Soprano, Miss Dorothy Davies, Newbridge; contralto, Madame Parry-Evans, Oakdale; tenor, Mr. John Lloyd James, Pontlottyn; bass, Mr. John Lewis, Newbridge. The Party and artistes were in excellent form and the verdict of all was that they had had a fine musical treat. The accompanist was Miss Kate Roberts, Pontlottyn, who performed her part well, whilst Mr. J. P. Isaac, headmaster, proved a fine chairman. Votes of thanks brought a fine concert to a close.

18 March 1922 <u>"Zurika, the Gipsy Maid" at St. Mary's Hall</u> The famous operetta entitled "Zurika, the Gipsy Maid," was most successfully played by the children and members of Carmel Chapel, and held at the Church Hall. The performance was conducted by Mr. W.J. Angell, accompanied by the orchestra under Mr. D.J. Thomas. The pianists were Mr. James Thomas and Mr. Willie Angell. For four successive nights the performances were greatly appreciated by a crowded and most enthusiastic audience. Requests arrived from all quarters to have the performance repeated, and these were granted. The leading characters are natives of Fochriw, and members of Carmel Chapel. They are Miss Doris Davies, Miss A. Maude Jones, Mr. Harry Hughes, Mr. Howell Thomas, Mr. Henry Evans, Mr. Berkley Davies, Mr. Johnnie Lewis and Mr. Latimer Evans. The singing of the choir and the scenery, which was almost sufficient in itself, filled the audiences with wonder and admiration.

8 April 1922 <u>Nazareth</u> An interesting musical and humorous treat was given by Prof. W. Miles under the auspices of the Y.M.C.A. on Wednesday last. The Chairman was Mr. J. Bevan.
15 April 1922 <u>Palm Sunday</u> Large numbers visited Pentwyn Churchyard on Sunday. Services at St. Mary's were conducted by Rev. S. Evans: Holy Communion at 8a.m.; Anti-Communion 11a.m.; Evensong and Sermon at 6p.m. Mr. O. Richards was at the organ and the singing was conducted by Mr. Berkley Angel.

22 April 1922 <u>Easter Day Services</u> Despite the unfavourable elements, the services at St. Mary's were well attended. Holy Communion was celebrated at 6, 7, 8 & 11a.m.; children's service at 3p.m.; evensong and sermon at 8p.m., the celebrant and preacher throughout being the Vicar, Rev. S. Evans, B.A. The Church had been very nicely decorated by the ladies with a profusin of sppring flowers. The singing was particularly beautiful at the choral celebration. Throughout the day the conductor was Mr. Berkley Angell and Mr. O. Richards was the organist.

22 April 1922 The annual Easter Vestry in connection with St. Mary the Easter Vestry Virgin was held at the Church Hall on Tuesday evening. The Vicar presided, supported by the Rev. J.C. Payne and a large number of parishioners. The Vicar opened with prayer, after which he gave a very inspiring address and referred to the great amount of work done during the year, which he said had been a very trying one owing to industrial dispute. Yet, as a church, they had many things to be thankful for; one was the formation of the new parish, St. Mary's. The churchwarden, Mr. W.J. Payne, presented the statement of accounts for the past year, and said that in spite of all the difficulties, the accounts revealed a good deal of activity and selfsacrifice on the part of the church people. He was pleased to say that there was a balance on the right side in each account. The auditor, Mr. T. Baldwin, then gave his report. Mr. W.J. A hearty vote of thanks to the Vicar and Rev. J.C. Payne was carried with acclamation. Rev. J.C. Payne responded to the vote of thanks.

13 May 1922 <u>Nazareth</u> The half yearly meetings were held on Sunday and Monday, when Rev. W. Nantlais Williams of Ammanford, preached most edifying sermons to large congregations. Mr. Willie A. Davies presided at the organ and Mr. Wm. Morris conducted the singing.

20 May 1922 <u>Children's Social Evening</u> A very pleasant evening was spent at St. Mary's Hall on Friday evening last in connection with the Sunday School Prize Day. A large number of children and adults had gathered together, and a jolly time was spent with games etc. Refreshments were served by members of the Girls' Guild, under the supervision of Mrs. Evans. Before the musical part of the programme, Rev. S. Evans, B.A., vicar, gave an address to the children, as did Mr. Payne. The following contributed: Miss Prosser's class, Freda Evans, Olive M. Payne, Miss Nan Prosser, Eirwen Jones, and Addie Baldwin. The accompanist was Mr. Octavius Richards. The singing of "God Save the King" brought a most enjoyable evening to a close.

3 June 1922 <u>Jumble Sale</u> A very successful jumble sale was held in the Church Hall on Friday evening last in connection with St. Mary's Church. A large number of articles had been collected and were eagerly bought up, the stallholders having a busy time for a few hours. 24 June 1922 <u>Mothers' Union</u> The members of the St. Mary's Mothers' Union journeyed to Bargoed on Tuesday evening to hear an address by Mrs. Digby Rees. The Fochriw Branch is growing into a very strong, useful and energetic body of workers.

1 July 1922 <u>Tea</u> The annual Sunday School tea of St. Mary's Church took place on Thursday last and passed off very successfully. The usual band and procession through the village was dispensed with this year as a token of respect to P. C. Perrott who passed away the previous Tuesday, and the funeral of Mr. Ben Jones which took place the same day. There was tea, for children first, and then for adults. Afterwards, the children were then taken up to Pentwyn for sports under the care of the vicar, Rev. S. Evans, and Messrs. W. J. Payne (Superintendent), Horace Evans, T. B. Edwards, Percy Jenkins, Tom Jones, W. Morris, S. Way, and O. Richards. The latter part of the evening was devoted to dancing in the hall.

8 July 1922 <u>Nazareth Tea</u> The annual tea was held on Monday last in good weather. All the children of the Sunday School, with their teachers and adult members of the chapel, sat down to an excellent tea which had been prepared by an earnest body of workers. Before parting to their respective churches, appropriate songs were sung whist waiting near the Post Office. Messrs. Thomas Evans, Noddfa, and David Davies, Carmel, jointly conducted the singing. After tea, the usual sports were held.

15 July 1922 <u>Nazareth</u> The pulpit at Nazareth was occupied last Sunday by Rev. David Davies of Cardiff who gave very edifying sermons which were much appreciated.

29 July 1922 <u>Social</u> A social was held at St. Mary's Hall under the auspices of the Mothers' Union.

5 May 1923 <u>St. Mary's Hall</u> On Friday evening, an excellent fancy dress social was held at the Church Hall. It was very well-attended. The Hall had been decorated beautifully for the occasion. The winners of the fancy dress were: Ladies – Mrs. W. Hughes; Gentlemen – Mr. Harry Evans. Mrs. J. Bevan and Mrs. A. Jones were the judges, and their decisions were well received. The Fochriw Orchestra supplied the music, and Mr. T. B. Edwards was a very capable M.C.

Walters, Mrs. Tom Evans, Mrs. Seaborne Williams, Mr. E. Evans.

19 May 1923 <u>Presentation</u> A presentation to Miss Doris Davies, daughter of Mr. & Mrs. Lodwick Davies, under-manager of G.K.N. Fochriw Colliery, took place at Carmel on Thursday night. Miss Davies is leaving the village to take up the nursing profession. She is the possessor of a very rich musical voice, and her services were in constant demand for concerts, cantatas etc. She was given a handsome, gold, wristlet watch subscribed by the inhabitants of the place and presented by Mr. W. J. Angell, and a handsome Bible given by the chapel, which was presented by Mr. Moses Williams, superintendent of the Sunday School. The presentations were part of a fuller evening of solos, recitations, instrumental contributions, and speeches.

The Vicar delivered an appropriate opening address, after which the hymn 'All people that on earth do dwell,' was sung with much feeling. The organist then gave the following in fine style: 'Festal March' (Elvey); 'Allegretto Grayices' (Tours); 'Minuet from Samson' (Handel); 'Melody in F' (Rubinstein); 'Festive March' (Smart); 'Hallelujah Chorus' (Handel). Then, the soloists, singly, and finally together, gave excellent renderings of their repertoire. The evening ended with the singing of the hymn 'Jesu, lover of my soul.'

29 September 1923 <u>Spiritualism</u> The Bargoed and District Spiritualist Society, Mr. E. Cleverley, president, has created quite a successful activity in the village. Meetings held at the Co-operative Hall have attracted large numbers.

29 September 1923 <u>Noddfa</u> Special services were held at Noddfa on Wednesday, to celebrate the 20th anniversary of the laying of the foundation stone. The united choir gave a very fine rendering of 'By Babylon's Waves,' under the conductorship of Mr. W. A. Jones. The pastor, the Rev. Ieuan Evans, then preached a very powerful sermon. The choir sang the 'Hallelujah Chorus,' and the pastor thanked conductor and choir. Miss Hilda Phillips was at the organ, and Mr. Thomas Evans conducted the singing. Mr. T. Walters was the accompanist for the choir.

6 October 1923 <u>St. Mary's Church</u> Harvest services were held this week. The celebrant was the Vicar, and the special preacher the Rev. J. C. Phillips, vicar of Penydarren. Mr. W. J. Payne read the lessons, Mr. B. Angell conducted the singing, and Mr. O. Richards was at the organ.

Mr. John Jones said that the call was unanimous. Mr. R.F. Jones, Deri, also spoke. The Rev. T.E. Davies, Treorchy, and the Rev. Mr. Jones, Aberavon, on behalf of the Rhondda Monthly Meeting, bore excellent testimony to the qualities of Mr. Evans as a Christian. 10 November 1923 <u>Children's Social</u> On Wednesday evening, a children's social was held in the Church Hall in connection with St. Mary's church. Quite a large number of children and several adults were present. Prizes were given for the best fancy dressed boy and girl, the Vicar adjudicating. Tea was provided by the Mothers' Union. Mr. Willie Hughes was M.C. for games, and Mr. Octavius Richards was at the piano.

17 November 1923 <u>Church in Wales Temperance Society</u> A Band of Hope in connection with the juvenile section of the above was started with the children at St. Mary's Church on Wednesday evening, when quite a number of children were enrolled. For the present, it is intended to meet every Wednesday evening at 5.30, when the children will be instructed and different classes formed. The Vicar, Rev. S. Evans, Mr. J. Lloyd Jones, secretary, and Mr. W. N. Hughes were in charge.

1 December 1923 <u>Nazareth</u> A pleasant social evening was spent at Nazareth on Wednesday evening, to welcome the new pastor, Rev. Richard Evans and his family. There was a large number present. An excellent spread had been prepared by the good people of the chapel. After tea, a first class musical programme was given. The chairman was Mr. J. P. Isaac, headmaster, who gave an appropriate opening address, followed by Mr. John Jones, who spoke encouraging words to the new pastor. Mr. Wm. The Rev, W.J. Williams, Noddfa, Bargoed, thanked all, especially Noddfa Church, Fochriw, for their kindness to them, and he hoped to repay then some day. 3 May 1924 Fochriw Vestry Scenes: Vicar and Parochial Council Secretary Unusual scenes were witnessed at the vestry meeting at St. Mary's Church Hall, Fochiw, on Wednesday. The Vicar, The Rev. S. Evans, B.A., who presided, objected to Mr. J. Lloyd Jones, the parochial secretary, taking the minutes of the meeting, and an argument ensued during which, it is alleged, the vicar pushed the secretary off the platform. The secretary persisted in reading out that portion of the constitution of the Church in Wales which clearly defines the duties of the parochial secretary. However, the chairman still objected, declaring that "he did not care twopence for the constitution" and further saying "he was in control of the meeting." He also threatened to send for the police to eject the secretary. The business of the meeting then continued, the chairman taking the minutes. Mr. W.J. Payne was re-elected people's warden and the vicar re-elected Mr. Charles Payne as his warden. The appointment of sidesmen was deferred, and when the election of Parochial Church Councillors was in progress, and the name of Mr. J. Lloyd Jones proposed, the chairman said that he would take full responsibility in absolutely refusing to submit this proposition, and he did refuse. After the churchwarden had presented his accounts, the vicar closed the meeting by thanking all those who had assisted him during the year.

The Vicar presided at the opening ceremony which was performed by Col. Lindsay of Ystrad Mynach. The accompanist

was the Rev. R.C. Evans, B.A., curate. The chairman gave an encouraging address, after which Mr. W.J. Payne, people's warden, proposed a very hearty vote of thanks to the Colonel for so kindly coming amongst them to open their sale of work. Mr. Charles Payne, vicar's warden, seconded, and the vote was carried with acclamation. The several stalls included Mothers' Union stall, parochial stall, fancy stall, sweet stall, Deri stall, jumble stall, refreshment stall, hoop-la and bran tub. On a brass tablet will be engraved, "To the glory of God and in sweet memory of the sons of our mothers. This window was erected by the Fochriw Branch of the Mothers' Union." 20 November 1926 Fochriw Memorial: Unveiling of Stained Glass Window: Impressive Ceremony Services of an impressive character were held at St. Mary's Church on Thursday last (Armistice Day). The Church was filled to capacity with people who had assembled to do honour to those brave sons who had died leaving behind precious and fragrant memories. The window had been erected by members of the St. Mary's Branch of the Mothers' Union, of which Mrs. S. Evans is the enrolling member. The window is a magnificent work of art, erected in the west end near the font, and was the admiration of all. It is a striking figure of the Blessed Virgin and Infant Child, surrounded by the Angels, with a brass tablet underneath with the following inscription: "To the Glory of God and in sweet memory of the sons of our mothers. This window was erected by the Fochriw Branch of the Mothers' Union." The service commenced with the singing of the hymn, "Gracious Saviour, Who didst honour." The vicar, the Rev. Samuel Evans, then took the service, after which Mr. W. J. Payne, churchwarden, read a portion of Scripture from Ecclesiastes. Several families of the Baptist persuasion had moved to Fochriw in 1874, and at that time there was no place at Fochriw where the Baptists could worship. The nearest place of worship was Brithdir, Penybank, which was about two miles away. They decided to approach the brethren at Brithdir, Dowlais and Rhymney to have a place erected at Fochriw, and it was decided to build a small chapel at a cost of ± 222 . It was opened at the commencement of 1875, the founders being the late Mr. Thomas Bevan, manager of the Fochriw collieries, and father of the present Mr. J. Bevan, M.E.; Mr. Thomas Evans, of Penydarren; Mr. David Thomas, Dowlais; Mr. Thomas Walters and Mr. William Edwards, Rhymney; and Mr. Thomas Evans, Moriah, Dowlais. The secretary was Mr. Thomas Evans, Penydarren, and the treasurer Mr. Thomas Bevan. The little Church prospered, and it soon had a membership of 50. In 1896 they had to build a more, commodious place which cost £440, and again in 1903 they had to rebuild Chapel as it now stands, at a cost of $\pounds 1,800$. Although the founders have passed to the Beyond to receive their crown, the present Church is a fine memorial to their initiatives. The Church has collected for all purposes, from 1875 to 1929, the sum of £8,700.

He extended a hearty welcome to Mr. Griffiths. He reminded eveyone of the list of things that required urgent attention that he had given a year ago. Much had been accomplished, including the re-roofing of the Parish Church, and St. Peter's Hall would be renovated in a week or so. Before the end of the summer, he hoped Pentwyn Church would be re-constructed. The roof of St. David's, Pantywaun, still required urgent attention. The statement of accounts was read by Mr. W. J. Payne. The Vicar re-appointed Mr. Charles Payne his warden, Coun. J. Edwards, his warden at St. Peter's, and Mr. Arthur Davies warden at St. David's. Mr. W. J. Bradley, Mrs. Owen and Mrs. J. D. Kings.

9 May 1931 <u>New Deacons</u> The following have been elected deacons of Carmel Chapel: J. Idris Williams, Thomas Walters, Willie Angell Davies, Mrs. Aneurin Jones, Nurse Ballard Davies.

23 May 1931 <u>St. Mary's</u> Well-attended services were held at the Parish Church on Ascension Thursday, conducted by the Vicar. The Rev D. J. Griffiths, curate, made touching references to the death of their respected churchwarden, Mr. Henry Charles Payne, a man who was held in the highest esteem, and was a devoted churchman. He offered sincere sympathy to the family in their sorrow.

6 June 1931 <u>Nazareth Chapel</u> The half-yearly meetings in connection with the chapel where held on Sunday last and were largely attended. The special preacher was the Rev W. Talfan Davies, Gorseinon, who delivered very powerful sermons. The singing was conducted by Mr. William Morris, and the organists were Mr. Wyndham Lawrence and Mr. Willie Angell Davies.

13 June 1931 <u>Carmel Chapel</u> The yearly meetings were held on Sunday and Monday, and large congregations attended. The special preacher was as the Rev Brython M. 20 June 1931 <u>New Vicar of Fochriw and Deri</u> The Rev. J. L. White, curate of Gilfach in the parish of Gellygaer, has been offered, and has accepted the living of Fochriw and Deri, in succession to Rev. J. C. Payne.

4 July 1931 <u>Presentation</u> On Monday evening, an enjoyable time was spent at the Church Hall when Mrs. Payne was the recipient of a beautiful cake stand. It was given by the members of her Sunday school class. The presentation was made Mrs. Tyler, the oldest member of the class. An excellent tea was provided, followed by a musical programme and games.

4 July 1931 <u>Vicar's Farewell</u> Touching scenes were witnessed at the Parish Church on Sunday last, when the vicar held a dedication service in the morning and preached his farewell

sermon in the evening, when the Church was crowded. The Vicar is leaving to take up an appointment at Ystradowen. At the morning service, several gifts were dedicated for the use of the churches in the parish. Included in these were the following: a pair of the Churchwardens' staffs in memory of Mr. Henry Charles Payne, former vicar's warden, the gifts made by his children in memory of a loving father and devoted mother; a beautiful book for the reading desk, in memory of the late Mr. John Wood, who was choirmaster at St. Andrews for many years, from his loving wife and children; a brass vase for the Mothers' Union stained window in the west end, the gift of Mrs. J. P. Isaac, Pontlottyn; a set of Bibles and prayer books, the gift of Mrs. Winifred Pares, Rhymney, and friends, for Pantywaun Church, and a number of linen cloths for the altar, the gifts of friends. At the evening service, the Vicar stated that there was something in the old tips at Fochriw that was dear to him; it was his home and the scene of his boyhood, and would always remain dear to him. He appealed to all to take care of Pentwyn Churchyard, where so many dear ones lay sleeping, including his own parents who had died since his return to the parish. Rev. Payne has been at the parish for just two years and eight months, yet in that time much has been accomplished: St. Andrew's, Pentwyn, has been entirely re-built; St. David's, Pantywaun, has been re-roofed and re-built; the Parish Church re-roofed, and the Church Hall, Deri, renovated. 25 July 1931 <u>Presentation</u> At the Church Hall on Monday evening, a very happy time was spent, when a concert, presentation and supper was organised by the Mothers' Union to recognise the faithful services of Mrs. Payne, their enrolling member, who has now left for Ystradowen. Before sitting down to supper, a first class programme was given by members. Mrs. S. J. Jones took the chair, and spoke in glowing terms of Mrs. Payne's efforts for the Mothers' Union and parish.. Mrs. George Way made the presentation - a handsome grand-daughter's clock. Others who spoke were: Mrs. Isaac, Mrs. Walter Davies, Mrs. Morgan, Mrs. Baldwin, Mrs. W. J. Jones, Mrs. Powell, Mrs. Curtiss.

1 August 1931 <u>Presentation to Rev. J. C. Payne</u> On Tuesday evening, a very happy function took place at the Church Hall, when Rev. J. C. Payne was presented with a handsome grandfather Westminster chiming clock in recognition of his great services to the Church and public when vicar of Fochriw and Deri for two-and-a-half years. A fine musical programme was contributed to by the Fochriw Male Voice Party under their conductor Mr. Tom Walters, with Mr. Wyndham Lawrence as accompanist. The supporting artistes were Mrs. Mary Lewis and Mr. Meirion Shankland. The chairman for the evening was Mr. Walter Davies, stationmaster, who paid a glowing tribute to the late vicar. Councillor A. T. Minhinnick, Mr. Tom Baldwin, Mr. John Lloyd Jones, and the Rev. J. L. White also spoke. Mr. W. J. Payne proposed, and Mr. Geo. Way seconded, a vote of thanks to all who had taken part, and the evening closed with the singing of "Hen Wlad fy Nhadau," Mr. Meirion Shankland taking the solo.

8 August 1931 <u>Induction</u> On Saturday, the Rev. John Lawrence White was inducted to the benefice of Fochriw and Deri by the Archdeacon of Llandaff, Rev. J. D. James. Mr. W. J. Payne and Councillor John Edwards (churchwardens) went outside the church, where the mandate was read, and the Vicar entered and tolled the bell, after which he was conducted to the font, reading desk, lectern, pulpit and altar, after which he was conducted to his stall by the churchwardens. The Archdeacon gave a most inspiring address. Many visiting clergy were present. Afterwards, tea was provided by members of the Mothers' Union. Rev. White has held curacies at Llanwonno, Blaenau Ffestiniog, and Gellygaer. He commenced his ministry on Sunday, preaching eloquent sermons.

10 October 1931 <u>Nazareth Chapel</u> The yearly meetings in connection with Nazareth took place on Sunday, when large congregations were attracted. The special preacher was the Rev. T. M. Lloyd, Treorchy. The singing was conducted by Mr. William Morris and Mr. Wyndham Lawrence was the organist.

10 October 1931 <u>St. Mary's</u> The pulpit was occupied on Sunday by the Rev. Rees Davies, Rector of Bedwellty. The Vicar, Rev. J. L. White, occupied the pulpit at Bedlinog of Sunday.

17 October 1931 <u>Harvest Festival</u> Harvest Festival Services in connection with St. David's Church, Pantywaun, were held on Sunday and Monday last, and were well attended. The Church had been nicely decorated for the occasion. On Sunday, the vicar preached, and on Monday, the Rev. G. T. Vodden, Pontlottyn. The lessons were read by Mr. R. Mitchell, and the organists were Mr. D. J. Kings and Mr. A. Kings.

24 October 1931 <u>Harvest Festival</u> Thanksgiving services were held during the past week at the churches of Carmel, Noddfa, and Nazareth. The services were of a very inspiring nature.

7 November 1931 <u>Mothers' Union</u> At the Parish Church on Tuesday evening, the local branch received a visit from Miss Parsons, who gave an address on rescue work.

5 December 1931 <u>Confirmation</u> Several candidates from the parish of Fochriw and Derry were confirmed at Pontlottyn in on Monday evening.

5 December 1931 <u>Carmel Chapel</u> The half yearly meetings were held on Sunday and Monday evening, when the Rev T. B. Thomas, Ferndale, preached powerful sermons to large congregations. The conductor of singing and organist was Mr. Thomas Walters.

2 January 1932 <u>St. Mary's Church</u> Well-attended services were held at the Parish Church. Celebrations of Holy Communion were held at 6a.m. and 11a.m., the celebrant and preacher being the Vicar. Mr. Octavius Richards was the organist, and Mr. Berkley Angell conducted the singing.

2 January 1932 Address At Nazareth Chapel, the Rev. Crwys Williams, an organiser of the British and Foreign Bible Society, delivered an address in connection with the work of the Society. The Rev. J. L. White presided.

The president was Nurse Ballard Davies. The afternoon session was presided over by Mrs. Sam Lewis and was opened by Miss Mary Lewis Thomas. The evening meeting was opened by Miss Beryl Ballard with Mr. David Lewis as president. During the day, the following recited: Eliza Evans, Jenny Davies, Mary Morgan and Griff Thomas. An appropriate

quartet was rendered by a party consisting of Mrs. T. Walters, Miss Doris Lewis and Messrs. David H. Lewis and Cyril Cook.

9 January 1932 <u>Watch-Night Service</u> St. Mary's Church was well-filled on New Year's Eve, and a most impressive service was conducted by the Vicar. With the ringing in of the New Year, a communion service was held, a large number taking part.

9 January 1932 <u>Mothers' Union Supper</u> The annual supper was held at the Church Hall on Tuesday evening, when about eighty sat down to a sumptuous feast. The tables had been nicely decorated and laden with good things. After the cloths were removed, there was a fine programme of music and games. The Vicar presided. The following artistes contributed to the programme: Messrs. Tom Walters, W. J. Payne, Mrs. M. A. Tyler, Mrs. Tom Walters; duet, Mr. and Mrs. Tom Walters. The winner of the competition was Mr. Rod Jones. Mrs. Henry Thomas had charge of the games. The accompanists were Mr. Octavius Richards and Mr. Tom Walters.

30 January 1932 <u>St. Mary's Church</u> The pulpit on Sunday was occupied by the Rev. Maddocks, Abertysswg, who preached very appropriate sermons. The Vicar occupied the pulpit at Abertysswg.

6 February 1932 <u>Mothers' Union</u> A special service was held on Tuesday evening, when an address was given by Miss Parsons, organising secretary for rescue and preventative work in the Diocese of Llandaff.

13 February 1932 <u>Services Recognised</u> At the Church Hall on Shrove Tuesday, a tea and presentation took place. The Vicar presided. Mr. Octavius Richards, who has been church organist for 25 years, was the recipient of a beautiful mirror to mark the occasion of his recent marriage. Mr. Richards very feelingly responded. Others who paid tribute to Mr. Richards were Mrs. Henry Thomas, Mr. George Evans, Mr. W. D. Davies and Mr. Gordon Lawrence. The musical programme was contributed to by Messrs. G. Tyler, W. J. Payne, G. Lawrence and Windsor Rees.

27 February 1932 <u>St. Mary's Church</u> A special Lenten service was held on Wednesday evening, the Rev. D. J. Davies, Rhymney, preaching an appropriate sermon.

5 March 1932 <u>St. Mary's Church</u> The special preacher at the Lenten service on Wednesday evening was the Rev. Redvers Evans, Merthyr.

5 March 1932 <u>Gymanfa Ganu</u> At Noddfa Chapel on Sunday, the united choirs of Nazareth and Noddfa chapels, under the conductorship of Mr. William Morris, rendered a fine programme of hymns and anthems. The organists were Messrs. Joshua Thomas and Wyndham Lawrence. The afternoon meeting was presided over by Mr. John Jones, and Mr. Evan Jones presided in the evening.

12 March 1932 <u>St. Mary's Church</u> The special preacher at the Lenten service on Wednesday was the Rev. E. P. Jones, Tredegar. The service was taken by the Vicar, with Mr. Willie White at the organ.

The accompanists were Miss Beryl Ballard and Mrs. Rees. Mr. T. Walters presided.

2 April 1938 <u>St. Mary's Church</u> The Patronal Festival Services were held at St. Mary's on Sunday last, when the preacher was the Rev. J. C. Payne, the victor of Penydarren. The lessons

11 February 1939 Fire At Fochriw Church: Bargoed Brigade Finds Building In Smoke The Gellygaer Fire Brigade, under Second Officer E. Owen, were called to Fochriw just before eight o'clock on Sunday morning, and found St. Mary's Church enveloped in smoke. The firemen donned smoke helmets, and found a stage in a concert room in the basement smouldering. It is believed that hot coke from a heating apparatus fell on to the stage. The outbreak was soon quelled. The Church proper was not damaged, and services were held as usual on Sunday. The damage is estimated at £20.

Morris, Bedlinog, and the organist Mr. Ewart James, Dowlais. At the afternoon session, Mr. Cyril G. Morgan,, presided, and Mr. James Brown, Deri, catechised the children on "Rhodd Mam" (Pennod 5). Mr. Tom Harris, Calvaria, Dowlais, presided in the evening. Tea was provided by the members of Nazareth Church.

22 April 1939 <u>St. David's Church</u> The Easter vestry to place on Tuesday, the vicar presiding, supported by Mr. W. J. Payne, churchwarden, and Mr. A. E. Kings, secretary. The Vicar said that the Old Church, now demolished, had served Pantywaun as Church and school for over 70 years, and tribute was paid to the late Canon Harris, Rector of Gellygaer, who had worked to erect the buildings throughout the parish. Mr. A. E. Kings presented the accounts, which were adopted. Officers elected were: secretary, Mr. A. E. Kings; treasurer, Mr. W. H. Williams; Church council: Mesdames Kings, Davies, Ralph, Messrs. A. & D. J. Davies, J. Ralph, A. E. Kings and W. H. Williams; organist Mr. A. E. Kings; choirmaster, Mr. W. H. Williams.

22 April 1939 <u>St. Mary's Church</u> The Easter Vestry was held on Monday, presided over by the Vicar, supported by Mr. W. J. Payne (people's warden), Mr. T. Gambling (vicar's warden), and Mr. T. Baldwin (parochial secretary), and the Rev E. Adams Evans, Deri. The Vicar congratulated Mr. Payne on being elected a member of the Gellygaer Council. He was a man of character and a worker for the Church. The vicar announced that this would be his last vestry as Vicar of Fochriw, as he had decided to accept the living of Cwmparc. He had been vicar for nearly eight years, and would always value the great experience he had had at the parish. He wished to thank the Church-wardens and the people who been so loyal to him. During the past

year, they had started an envelope system that had been successful. They had recently bought a vicarage which would be a blessing to the new incumbent. 6 May 1939 <u>St. Mary's</u> At the services on Sunday, the vicar made touching references to the death of the Bishop of Llandaff, the Rt. Rev. Timothy Rees.

27 May 1939 <u>Mothers' Union</u> The St. Mary's branch met at the Church Hall on Tuesday evening. The annual outing will take place on Saturday to Swansea.

17 June 1939 <u>Carmel Chapel</u> The annual services were held on Sunday, when the preacher was the Rev. Rhys Bowen, Rhymney. The organist and conductor was Mr. Thomas Walters.

15 July 1939 <u>Nazareth</u> Evangelical campaign services are being held throughout the Rhymney Valley, and on Monday and Tuesday evening, Rhymney) gave inspiring addresses. Mr. David J. Davies was the organist.

22 July 1939 25th Anniversary of the Ordination of Rev. Esaiah Williams Special meetings were held at Noddfa Baptist chapel on Wednesday to celebrate the 25th anniversary of the ordination of the Rev Esaiah Williams (now of Cardigan), as minister of Noddfa. 13 April 1940 <u>Bishop's Visit</u> The Bishop of Llandaff, the Right Reverend John Morgan, was the preacher at Evensong at the patronal service of the Parish Church on Sunday. The Rev J. L. Mr. Thomas leaves to resume his studies of Carmarthen College with the good wishes of the whole community with which he has laboured so faithfully.

On Sunday morning, there was a children's service and Mr. T. Thomas given an address. The following took part: Stuart Davies, Len Walker, John Evans, Linda Thomas, Megan Thomas, Betty Evans, Amy Thomas, Eleanor Davies, Enid Cumpstone, D. J. Evans, Margaret Davies, James Davies. Roy Trotman, boy soprano, of Bargoed, also sang two solos. Mr. Thomas Walters was the organist and precentor.

5 October 1940 <u>Harvest Festival</u> Harvest services were held at St. Mary's Church on Sunday and Monday. The Church had been decorated, and the preachers on Sunday were the Rev. J. L. White, Vicar, and the Reverend J. R. D. Williams, vicar of Rhymney. On Monday, the preacher was the Rev J. D. Jones, Pontlottyn.

12 October 1940 <u>Noddfa Jubilee Service</u> A special service was held at Noddfa Baptist Chapel on Thursday to mark the clearing off of the debt of the Chapel. Mr. T. J. Jones presided. Mr. Joshua Evans, secretary of the Church for the past 12 years, who succeeded his father as secretary, a position he had held for 38 years, gave the review of the Baptist cause at Fochriw. The first chapel was built in 1876 and rebuilt in 1886. The present building was erected in 1904. Many stalwarts of the cause had passed away, including Mr. Thomas Evans, who was presented with a gold watch in 1926 for 50 years service in the chapel; Sergeant H. Williams, Mr. A. Walters, Mr. Henry Jones and Mr. John Jones. The present treasurer, Mr. Thomas

4 January 1941 <u>Church Services</u> Christmas Day services were held at St. Mary's on Christmas Day. The preacher was the vicar with Mr. W. Lawrence at the organ.

4 January 1941 <u>Carmel Gymanfa</u> The children's service was held in the morning, and there was splendid singing. The devotional part was taken by Eleanor Davies and Nan Jones. Solos were given by Megan Davies and D.J. Evans; recitation, Amy Thomas; accompanist, Master Huw B. Thomas. Mr. T. Walters presided. The afternoon service was introduced by Mr. Meirion Shankland and Mr. D. Lewis presided. The devotions at the evening service were taken by Mr. Evan Lewis and Mr. Glyn Harris, Rhymney. Sam Lewis presided and an address was given by Rev. Emlyn Jones, Tredegar. He was thanked by Messrs. Howell Thomas and Berkley Davies. Miss Katie Davies was the organist.

22 March 1941 <u>Lenten Service</u> On Wednesday evening, a special Lenten service was conducted at the Parish Church.

5 April 1941 <u>Carmel Church</u> A repetition of the Christmas gymanfa was given on Sunday. There was a good attendance, and the singing was of the usual high standard. At the children's service in the morning, the following took part: Devotional - Elinor Davies and Amy Thomas; solo - Megan Davies. Mr. Evan M. Lewis read a portion of the Scriptures at the evening service. The conductors were Messrs. T. Walters and Emlyn Evans, and the accompanists Master Huw B. Thomas and Mrs. A. Davies. The presidents for the day were Mrs. Sam Lewis, Messrs. T. Walters and D. Lewis.

19 April 1941 <u>Parish Church</u> Easter Services were conducted on Easter Day. The church was decorated with Easter lilies and spring flowers. The vicar conducted the services. The organists were Mr. Wyndham Lawrence and Mr. Norman Palmer. The children's service was taken by Mr. W.J. Payne.

26 April 1941 Easter Vestry The Easter Vestry of the Parish Church was held on Monday. The vicar reviewed the past year stating that many of the young men of the village had joined up during the year, and one, Mr. Hugh Mantle, had made the supreme sacrifice. He had been a member of the church. Also, one of the oldest and most faithful members had died in the person of Mrs. Angell, wife of their choirmaster. Another young member, Mr. Herber Watkins, had met with a fatal accident. Several church families had left the district for work elsewhere. He thanked all who had served the church during the past year, particularly the churchwarden, Mr. W.J. Payne, who not only looked after the financial side of the church, but also served as a licensed lay-reader. He thanked secretary, Sunday school teachers, organist, choirmaster, blower, sidesmen and parochial council. He regretted the departure of Mr. T. Baldwin, sexton. Mr. D. Tyler had taken his place. The following were elected to serve on the various bodies connected to the deanery: Ruri-decanol conference: Messrs. W.J. Payne, John Owen, Jack Lawrence, Sydney Williams, T.M. Evans; Board of Patronage: Messrs. Payne and Owen; supplementary representatives: Messrs. J. Lawrence, S. Williams, T.M. Evans, T. Llewelyn; diocesan conference: W.J. Payne.

24 May 1941 <u>Special Services</u> These were held at Nazareth Chapel on Sunday last, when the preacher was the Rev. J. Lloyd, Treorchy. The organists were Miss Katie Davies and Mr. D.J. Thomas and the conductor was Mr. W.A. Davies.

31 May 1941 <u>Missionary Work</u> On Sunday afternoon, 25 scholars of Carmel Congregational Church were presented with missionary books. There was a splendid gathering, and it is interesting to note that eleven of the recipients were young guests from Sheerness who have lived in the village for the past twelve months. Special prizes for the highest sums were given to Howard Morgan and Jas. Davies. The presentations were made by Mrs. D.O. Evans (Brecon College) who praised the children for their good work.

7 June 1941 <u>Carmel Chapel</u> The yearly meetings took place on Sunday, when the Rev. Ifonwy Hughes-Thomas, Hirwaun, preached stirring sermons to large congregations. The organist and conductor was Mr. T. Walters, A.L.C.M.

7 June 1941 <u>Parish Church</u> On Sunday, Whitsuntide services were held. The vicar officiated.

21 June 1941 <u>New Benefice</u> The friends of the Rev. George L. White, eldest son of the vicar of Fochriw, will be pleased to know that he has been instituted to the benefice of Brassington in the diocese of Derby.

28 June 1941 <u>Mothers Union</u> Members of the St.. Mary's branch attended the Deanery festival at St. Martin's Church, Caerphilly.

5 July 1941 <u>Nazareth</u> On Sunday, the preacher was Mrs. Thomas, Dowlais. The organist was Mr. D. J. Davies, and the conductor, Mr. W.A. Davies.

12 July 1941 <u>Carmel Secretary's Resignation</u> It is with regret that the officers and members of Carmel Congregational Chapel received the resignation, due to ill-health, of Mr. T. Ballard, who has been secretary for many years. He has been a faithful and thorough secretary. A vote of thanks was tendered him for his services. Mr. Willie Angell Davies is his successor.

12 July 1941 <u>Presentation: Mr. Thomas Walters</u> To mark the occasion of 40 years service as organist of Carmel Congregational Chapel, Mr. Thomas Walters, A.L.C.M., was the recipient of a Westminster chimes clock and a fireside chair before a very happy, appreciative audience of members. This year again it was a striking success, when, at the New Hall, a capacity audience enjoyed "Cyfrinach y Fasged Frwyn," by D. Gwernydd Morgan. The producer was Mr. David Lewis who is to be congratulated on the success of the production. The players took their parts exceedingly well. A children's performance was given on Wednesday when Mrs. Oliver presided. Coun. Sam Lewis presided on Thursday evening. Members of the cast were: Mr. Bob Rees, Miss Betty Jones, Mrs. M.A. Ballard, Master David A. Evan, Mrs. N. Evans, Mr. W.A. Davies, Rev. Eurof Jones, Mr. David Lewis and Miss S. Jones.

3 April 1943 <u>New Pastor</u> Nazareth C.M. Chapel was well filled on Thursday evening to extend a welcome to the new pastor, Rev. William Thomas, who has taken up the pastorate of Nazareth, Fochriw; Calfari, Dowlais; amd Ysgwyddwyn, Deri. Mr. Thomas is a native of Treharris and has come to this area from Solva, Pembrokeshire. Mr. Thomas has preached at Nazareth in his student days from Trevecca, Aberystwyth University and Bala and has really come amongst old friends. A hearty welcome was extended to him by Rev. E. Adams Evans, vicar of St Mary's; Rev. Eurof Jones, Carmel Cong. Church; Pastor David Thomas, Gospel Hall; and Mr. T.J. Jones, on behalf of Noddfa Baptist Church. Rev. Glyn Jones, who presided, recommended Mr. Thomas as a fellow student through the whole college course, and spoke highly of his sincerity and goodwill. An address was given by the Rev. Robert Thomas, Resolven, brother of the new minister. Rev. Wm. Thomas responded to the kind welcome, and on behalf of Nazareth, thanked all who wished the cause well. 17 April 1943 <u>Welcome Social</u> A social was held on Tuesday, to welcome the Rev. William Thomas the new minister of Nazareth C.M. Church. After refreshments, a short concert followed when solos, recitations, choruses and a quiz formed the programme. Mr. Thomas responded to the welcome. Miss Sallie Williams (Treorchy) also spoke.

24 April 1943 <u>Last Sunday</u> Palm Sunday was observed by hundreds of inhabitants visiting the old churchyard on the hill, St. Andrew's, Pentwyn.

24 April 1943 <u>Parish Church</u> Lenten services were continued on Thursday at the Parish Church when an address was given by the vicar. The organist was Huw B. Thomas.

24 April 1943 <u>Carmel Chapel</u> The pulpit was occupied on Sunday by the Rev. Wm. Thomas of Nazareth Chapel. The organist was Mr. T. Walters and Mr. M. Shankland was precentor.

1 May 1943 <u>Parish Church</u> A three hours' service was conducted on Good Friday by the Vicar. The services on Sunday were well attended. The celebrant and preacher was the Vicar, and the lessons were read by Mr. W.J. Payne, churchwarden. Master Huw B. Thomas was the organist.

8 May 1943 <u>Nazareth C.M.</u> The pulpit of Nazareth was occupied by Miss Sallie Williams, Treorchy, on Sunday last, who preached powerful sermons. The organist was Mr. D.J. Davies and Mr. W.A. Davies was the precentor.

8 May 1943 <u>Vestry Meeting</u> The annual Easter Vestry meeting of the Parish Church of St.Mary's took place on Wednesday evening, presided over by the Vicar, Rev. E. Adams Evans, B.A., who opened the meeting with prayer. He thanked all who had given him their support since his advent to the parish. Reference was made to some of the faithful members

who had died during the past year - Mr. Burkley Angell, the choirmaster for very many years, and a faithful churchman; Mr. W.D. Davies, a parochial councillor; and a choir-boy, Raymond Catterson. Good wishes were expressed with the boys from the parish serving with H.M. Forces. The churchwarden, Mr. W.J. Payne, said he wished to extend the best wishes of the church people to the Vicar, his wife, and family, and to this their first vestry meeting. He felt sure that the choice had been a good one, and that with the people's co-operation, a happy time was in store. 29 May 1943 <u>Nazareth Chapel</u> Half-yearly services were held on Sunday when the preacher was the Rev. W. Gray Edwards, Skewen. The singing was conducted by Mr. W.A. Davies, and the organist was Mr. D.J. Davies.

12 June 1943 <u>St. Mary's Church</u> At the Parish Church on Ascension Day, the vicar conducted the services. There was a celebration of Holy Communion in the morning and a children's service was held in the afternoon. On Tuesday there was a meeting of the Mothers' Union, Mrs. Evans presiding.

19 June 1943 <u>Parish Church</u> Services were held on Sunday, when the celebrant and preacher throughout the day was the Vicar. The organist was Mr. W.P. Lawrence.

26 June 1943 <u>Mothers' Union</u> The weekly meeting of the branch was held at the Parish Church on Tuesday when the members were addressed by the Rev. S. Beynon, Deri.

26 June 1943 <u>Bible Society</u> Under the auspices of the British and Foreign Bible Society a meeting was held at Nazareth Chapel on Monday when the Rev. W. Thomas presided. The meeting was opened by the Rev. E. Adams Evans who gave an address on the work of the Society. Mr. D.J. Davies was the organist. The local secretary of the society is Mr. T.J. James, with Coun. S. Lewis as treasurer.

3 July 1943 <u>Carmel Chapel</u> The yearly meetings of the chapel were held on Sunday last when the Rev. A.E. Grant (Rhymney) preached to large congregations. The organist was Mr. T. Walters and the singing was conducted by Mr. Emlyn Evans.

17 July 1943 <u>Confirmation</u> The Lord Bishop of Llandaff held a confirmation at St Peter's, Deri, on Saturday, when about 50 candidates were presented for confirmation by the Vicar and Rev. S. Beynon, curate. Twenty five candidates were from the Fochriw Parish Church.

The total of £25 was collected, which is the highest for many years. 28 August 1943 <u>Nazareth C.M.</u> On Sunday the preacher was Mr. Latimer Evans, Dowlais, late of Fochriw. The singing was conducted by Mr. W.A. Davies and the organist was Mr. D.J. Davies.

11 September 1943 <u>Parish Church</u> Services were held on Friday last - the National Day of Prayer. There was a Celebration of Holy Communion in the morning and also an evening service. The Vicar, Rev. E. Adams Evans, officiated.

11 September 1943 <u>Carmel Y.P.S.</u> Carmel Y.P.S. opened its winter session on Monday with an address by Mr. Hopkin Morris of the Welsh section of the B.B.C., Cardiff. There was a good congregation. The chairman was the Rev. Eurof Jones. Votes of thanks were given by the Vicar and Mr. Tom Ballard.

25 September 1943 <u>Harvest Services</u> Harvest festival services were held at St. David's Church, Pantywaun, on Sunday and Monday. The church had been decorated with fruit, flowers and vegetables. The preacher on Sunday was the Rev. S.J. Beynon, Deri, and on Monday, the Rev. D.R. Jones, Dowlais. The lesson was read by Mr. John Palmer. The Vicar was also present. The organist was Mr. A.E. Kings and the singing was conducted by Mr. W.H. Williams.

2 October 1943 <u>Harvest Services</u> Harvest festival services were held at the Parish Church on Sunday and Monday. The church had been decorated with flowers, fruit and vegetables, which were sent afterwards to the Merthyr General Hospital. 16 October 1943 <u>Carmel Harvest</u> Harvest festival services were held at Carmel Cong. Church on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday.

30 October 1943 <u>Nazareth Chapel</u> An interesting time was spent at Nazareth C.M. Chapel on Tuesday, when Mr. Mervyn Fry of Dowlais gave a gramophone recital of sacred music and an address. The Rev. Wm. Thomas presided. A vote of thanks was moved by Mr. W.P. Lawrence and seconded by Rev. Eurof Jones.

20 November 1943 Parish Church The services on Sunday were conducted by the Vicar, Rev. E. Adams Evans. In the evening, the Vicar, on behalf of himself and the church people, congratulated Captain T.J. Catterson, M.B.E., who was present with his wife, on the great honour that had been recently conferred upon him at Buckingham Palace by the King in presenting him with the M.B.E. for bravery at sea. The lessons were read by Churchwarden W.J. Payne. Mr. W.P. Lawrence was the organist.

27 November 1943 <u>Gospel Hall</u> Special services were held over the weekend. Addresses were given by Mr. & Mrs. Davies, missionaries from Japan. Mr. D. Saunders was the organist.

4 December 1943 <u>Nazareth Lecture</u> A lecture was given on Tuesday at the Nazareth Church by Mr. Mervyn Fry, Dowlais. Rev. W. Thomas presided.

18 December 1943 <u>Carmel</u> The annual services of Carmel Church were held on Sunday, when the Rev. Gwyn Lewis, Pontypridd, preached to large congregations. The organist was Mr. Tom Walters, A.L.C.M., and the precentor was Mr. E. Evans.

25 December 1943 <u>Noddfa Festival</u> A rehearsal for the Christmas Day singing festival took place at Noddfa Chapel on Sunday, under the conductorship of Mr. D.J. Thomas, with Mr. D.J. Davies, A.L.C.M., as organist.

1 January 1944 <u>Singing Festival</u> The united singing festival of Noddfa and Nazareth Chapels was held at Noddfa on Christams Day. The conductor was Mr. D.J. Thomas. 15 January 1944 <u>Carmel Nativity Play</u> A Nativity play was performed by scholars of Carmel Sunday School on Sunday evening. The performance reached a very high standard. The following were the characters in the play: Violet Abbey, Margaret Davies (Guest-street), Amy M. Thomas, Mary Raines, Roy Morse, Billy Ridley, Billy Thomas, Leonard Evans, James Davies, John Raines, Howard Morgan, Sylvia Evans, Morfydd Thomas, Margaret Davies (Dynevor-street), Pat Brown. Suitable carols were sung by the choir. Mr. T. Walters was the accompanist. The lighting effects were in charge of Messrs. D. Jenkins and R. Rees. The Rev. Eurof Jones introduced the service and also presided.

22 January 1944 <u>Nativity Play</u> The part of "Virgin Mary" in the manger scene was played by Miss Doreen Clark, whose name was omitted in last week's report of the Carmel Nativity play. The part was excellently portrayed.

29 January 1944 Cymanfa Ganu A united singing festival was held at Noddfa Chapel on Sunday. This festival, held on Christmas Day, is the united effort of Nazareth C.M. Chapel and Noddfa Baptist Chapel, and the repetition was a grand success. The gymanfa ganu is a special feature of the village and has been held by the two churches for an unbroken period of over 30 years. This year again, the conductor was a member of Noddfa who brought the singing to a very high standard. He is Mr. D. J. Thomas who has conducted the festival before. The presidents for the services were: Miss Edna Jones, morning; Mr. Trevor Lawrence, afternoon; Miss A. Jones, evening. Items were given by Misses Pat Sullivan, Millie Williams, Shirley Whithard and Master Hugh Jones. The organist was Mr. D.J. Davies. It is intended to hold a united children's festival by these two churches in the near future.

5 February 1944 <u>Carmel Chapel</u> A monthly children's service was held at Carmel on Sunday. The chairman was Margaret Davies. Eurof Jones, minister of the Chapel, accepted the gift and thanked the donors for their kindness. Thanks were also expressed by Mr. Daniel Davies and Coun. S. Lewis, J.P.

4 March 1944 <u>Carmel Y.P.S.</u> The Guild held a "Noson Lawen" on Monday to celebrate St. David's Day. The programme was varied, including recitations, solos, duets, penillion singing, a party singing Welsh airs, and instrumental solos. An enjoyable time was spent.

4 March 1944 <u>Carmel</u> On Sunday, Carmel held its monthly children's service. The chairman was D.A. Evans; reading of the Scriptures, John Evans; prayer, Desmond Kelly. Hymns were given by D.A. Evans, W. Abbey, Doreen Clark & Violet Abbey. The collectors were Margt. Davies and Morfudd Thomas. The girls' party gave a song. An address was given by Rev. E. Jones.

11 March 1944 <u>Siloah Campaign</u> At Siloh, Penybank, a twelve days' evangelistic campaign is now in progress. The campaigner is Mr. David B. Owen, the youthful preacher.

11 March 1944 <u>Church Parade</u> Members of the Forces attended service at the Parish Church on Sunday morning. The service was conducted by the Rev. E. Adams Evans, vicar and chaplain. The lessons were read by two of the officers. The organist was Mr. W.P. Lawrence, Mus. Bac.

18 March 1944 <u>Parish Church</u> The Lenten preacher on Sunday was the Rev. S.J. Beynon, B.A. The lessons were read by the churchwarden. Mr. J. Palmer took part in the service and the organist was Mr. Octavius Richards, Pengam.

1 April 1944 <u>Nazareth</u> On Monday, a special sermon was preached by the Rev. Alun Davies, Aberdare, in connection with the British and Foreign Bible Society. The Rev. Eurof Jones introduced Mr. Davies and Mr. T.J. Jones read a portion of Scriptures and led in prayer. The organist was Mr. Willie A. Davies.

1 April 1944 <u>Competitive Concert</u> A competitive concert was held on Friday by Carmel Band of Hope to end the session. The adjudicators were Mr. Walters and Mr. D. James. The chairman was the Rev. E. Jones, and the accompanist, Mrs. E. Rees. Mrs. S. Lewis and Misses M. & C. Jones assisted.

1 April 1944 <u>Children's Service</u> On Sunday morning, the monthly children's service was held. Daily services are taking place at the Parish Church during Holy Week conducted by the Vicar.

15 April 1944 <u>Parish Church</u> On Good Friday, the three hours' service was taken by the Vicar who also took the service on Easter Day. The lessons were read by Mr. W.J. Payne, and the organist was Mr. Wyndham Lawrence.

15 April 1944 <u>United Services</u> United services were held on Good Friday at Nazareth C.M. Church where members of the following churches joined in and united service: Carmel, Noddfa, Nazareth and Gospel Hall. The services were well attended. The following took part: Revs. Eurof Jones, W. Thomas, T.J. Jones and D. Thomas. The organists were Mrs. Kate Walters and Mr. W.A. Davies.

15 April 1944 <u>Cymanfa Ganu</u> The first united children's singing festival of Noddfa Baptist and Nazareth C.M. Churches was held at Noddfa on Easter Day. For over 25 years, these two churches have held an united cymanfa ganu for adults at Christmas time. This Easter, the first venture was made with the children's cymanfa ganu, and it is intended to make this an annual event. It was highly successful and surpassed the hopes of the cymanfa committee. The conductor was Mr. Trevor Lawrence supported by Mr. Joshua Thomas and Mr. W. Davies at the organ. The presidents were Mr. Richard Jones (afternoon) and Mrs. K. Walters (evening). They remembered those who had left to join the Forces, wishing them a safe return to their home and church, and those who had died during the past year. They also thought of those in hospital. 29 April 1944 <u>Parish Church</u> A National Day of Prayer was observed at the Parish Church on Sunday conducted by the Vicar. In the morning, members of H.M. Forces attended, the lessons being read by one of the officers. Mr. W.P. Lawrence was the organist.

29 April 1944 <u>Easter Vestry</u> The annual Easter Vestry in connection with St. David's Church, Pantywaun, took place on Thursday evening last. The Vicar, Rev. E. Evans. The Rev. Eurof Jones introduced the service and also presided. Mr. Emlyn Evans conducted the choir and Mr. Thomas Walters was the organist. Messrs. D. Jenkins and B. Rees were in charge of lighting effects.

11 August 1945 <u>S.S. Demonstrations</u> On Wednesday, the Sunday Schools of Carmel, Nazaret and Noddfa paraded the streets, headed by their ministers, teachers and officials, and the Fochriw Silver Band. They sang appropriate hymns.

15 September 1945 <u>Missionary Meeting</u> Meetings in connection with the London Missionary Society were held at Carmel on Wednesday, when the Rev. A. Jones, Brecon, was the speaker. Others who took part were Revs. Latimer Williams, Deri, and Eurof Jones, Fochriw. Mr. M. Shankland was the organist and choirmaster.

4 May 1946 <u>United Services</u> The Free Church Council held united services at Nazareth Chapel on Good Friday, when the ministers taking part were the Revs. E. Jones, T.J. Jones, and E. Ebenezer, Dowlais.

4 May 1946 <u>Parish Church</u> On Good Friday, a three-hour service was conducted by the Vicar, Rev. E. Adams Evans. On Easter Day, the services were well attended, and the celebrant and preacher was the Vicar. The lessons were read by Mr. W.J. Payne and the organist was Mr. W.P. Lawrence.

18 May 1946 Special Services Half yearly meetings were held at Nazareth on Sunday. Rev. W. Lloyd Jones, Skewen, was the preacher. The singing was conducted by Mr. W.A. Davies, with Mr. D.J. Davies at the organ.

8 June 1946 <u>Nazareth</u> The united service of the different churches was held at Nazareth on Monday evening and was well attended. Mr. Trevor Lawrence presided, and the following took part: Rev. Eurof Jones, Miss Edna Jones, Messrs. Thomas Walters and Burkley Davies. The singing was conducted by Mr. B. Davies and Mr. David J. Davies was the organist.

No Licensed Club For Fochriw: Free Churches Opposition to Registration 1 February 1947 Plea Considerable interest was taken in an application by the Fochriw Workingmen's Club and Institute at Pontlottyn Magistrates Court on Friday, when the club applied to be registered in respect of alcoholic drink. After a retirement, Mr. W.A. Hancock, chairman, with Mr. S. Lewis, Mrs. M. Evans, and Mrs. G. Beynon Davies, announced, "We have discussed this appeal very fairly and fully. We are unanimous in dismissing it. We refuse to register a club." Mr. E. Chivers (from the office of Mr. Granville West, M.P.), Newbridge, appeared for the club, and Mr. George Owen (on behalf of Mr. Joseph Jones, chief constable of Glamorgan, who was present in court) opposed the application. Mr. Chivers said that before the war, it was not necessary to make an application of this kind, but under the Defence Regulations of 1939, they had to apply to the chief constable for permission. The regulations were gradually disappearing, but at the moment they were bound by them. The population of Fochriw was roughly 1,000, and there was only one licensed house, the Rising Sun. There were two others in the village of Pentwyn, some distance away. In his submission, there was a substantial need for a licensed club. They might have different opinions about clubs generally, but clubs had become part of their national life, for every village in the land had a club. Mr. George Owen said that the grounds for the objection were that the club, as a registered club, was not required to meet a genuine and substantial need, in that the existing facilities for social amenities, recreation, refreshment, cultural and political activities at Fochriw were adequate. The existing facilities for refreshment were sufficient to meet the public without the provision of additional facilities by the club, and the means of social intercourse, mutual helpfulness, mental and moral improvement, and rational recreation, could be successfully achieved by the club without the necessity of registration under the Licensing (Consolidation) Act. 1910.

Wm. Martin Davies of Plantation-terrace, Fochriw, secretary of the club, said that the club had a membership of 79. In reply to Mr. Chivers, Davies said he was definitely of the opinion that the facilities now existing were inadequate to meet the social life of the village. The Chairman: The Rising Sun public house has been re-modelled, and a considerable amount of money has been spent to make it a good public house. Davies, continuing his evidence, said there was no need for a man to go to a club simply to drink. Cross-examined by Mr. George, Davies agreed that the premises was an ordinary dwelling house, but denied that it was unsuitable for selling

intoxicating liquor. Mr. Owen George said there were two public houses in Pentwyn, threequarters of a mile from Fochriw. With regard to social activities, they had a Welfare Hall, where music and dancing and public meetings were held. These were amenities that the club could not provide. They had a flourishing youth movement with headquarters at the school, and also, the Fochriw Silver Band. Mr. George (to Davies): I suggest to you that the only added facility you want is for drinking purposes. Davies: I deny that. We want to carry out various improvements to the club, so that we can use the club for social purposes. Mr. George: And you propose that the club should have drink on Sunday? Davies: I don't see anything wrong in drinking beer on Sunday and a weekend. Mr. W.G. Protheroe (magistrate's clerk): You know there is a shortage of beer. Are you in a position to get a supply? Davies: I think so.

Edward Puddle, Railway-terrace, a member of the club, said there was a real need for social amenities in he village. Sandy V. Powell, Dynevor-street, also gave evidence in support of the application. Mr. George Owen submitted that the application by the club was merely for drinking facilities on a Sunday.

Police Inspector G. Thomas, Bargoed, opposing the application, said that the premises was an ordinary dwelling house, and that there were inadequate sanitary arrangements. The village was adequately catered for in regard to social and cultural activities. The Rev. Eurof Jones, minister of Carmel Congregational Chapel, said that he opposed the application on behalf of the denomination and the Free Churches of Fochriw. He felt there were ample facilities in the village, and he did not think a licensed club to sell intoxicating liquor was needed. There was no genuine need. Mr. Chivers: You have strong convictions on the matter of licensing? Mr. Jones: Yes, especially on Sundays. Mr. Chivers: I take it that you have strong convictions against public houses in general? Mr. Jones: That is a matter for one's personal conscience. I don't agree that a public house is for social amenities, neither is a club. Trevor Lawrence, schoolmaster, of Glyn-terrace, chairman of the Free Church Council, said that the needs of the population were amply catered for. Mr. Chivers: Are you a teetotaler? Yes, I am, but I have no objection to a man having a drink. Thomas John Jones, Fochriw, a deacon at Noddfa, also gave evidence opposing the application.
