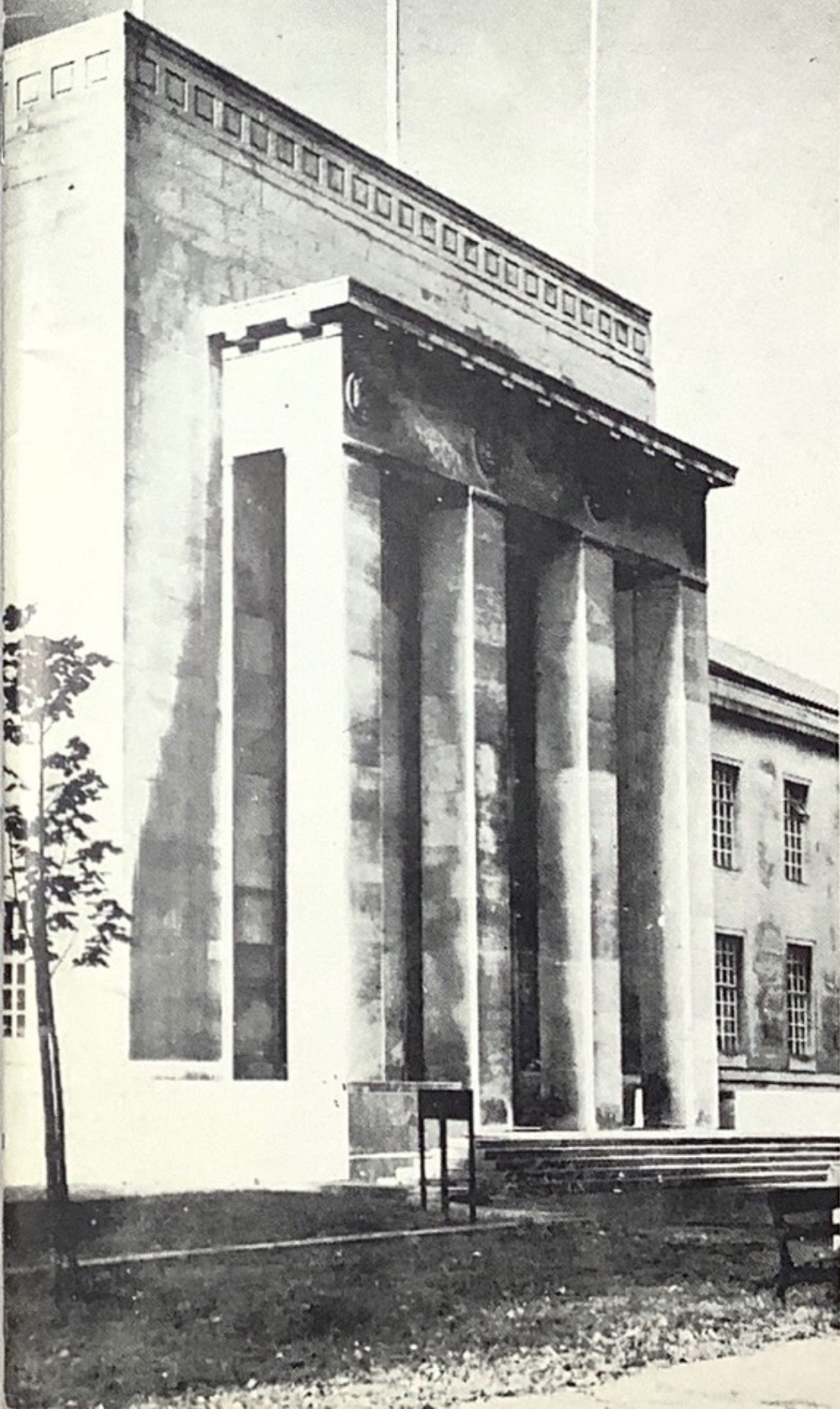

President's Foreword

Rhagair y Llwyd

This year the Centre celebrates its seventh birthday, and the UN its thirty-fifth. We are extremely privileged to have a Message from the United Kingdom Ambassador to the UN in which he acknowledges the contribution to international understanding that the Centre has already made.

It has served as a co-ordinating and administrative centre for international campaigns in Wales; made over 1,000 visits to schools and given 50,000 children an insight into international affairs through projects, competitions, conferences, talks and curriculum development; organised, during the past three years, voluntary workcamps in local communities in Wales for 389 young people from 42 countries; raised over £80,000 during International Year of the Child 1979 to support the work of the UN Children's Fund (UNICEF); placed 60 British volunteers overseas this year; formed practical links with international organisations such as the United Nations, the EEC and the Commonwealth and hosted 3 major UN Conferences for the United Kingdom; administered the UK Freedom From Hunger Campaign; provided a Standing Conference for over 30 local authorities and a cross-section of national institutions; holds annual Anniversary Meetings addressed by leading speakers: a proud record, indeed, for such a young organisation.

But, as the President of the Welsh National Council of the UN Association writes later, tremendous challenges still face us all at a time exacerbated by a world recession.

That is why we must ensure that the Centre is properly equipped to respond and why our Appeal cannot be allowed to fail.

May I once again express my personal thanks for the continued backing of members of the Standing Conference, including local authorities, whose support has been outstanding; also to all my fellow officers, members of the Centre's Committees, the secretarial staff and all those other supporters who have made such valued contributions to our work.


Eleni mae'r Ganolfan yn dathlu ei seithfed penblwydd a'r Cenhedloedd Unedig yn bymtheg ar hugain mlwydd oed. Anrhydedd arbennig i ni a fu derbyn Neges oddi wrth Lysgennad y Deyrnas Gyfunol i'r Cenhedloedd Unedig lle y cydnabyddai y cyfraniad i ddealltwriaeth ryngwladol a wnaed gan y Ganolfan.

Mae wedi gwasanaethu fel canolfan gyd-gysylltu a gweinyddu ymgyrchoedd rhyngwladol yng Nghymru. Gwnaed 1,000 o ymweliadau ag ysgolion gan roi cipolwg ar faterion rhyngwladol i 50,000 o blant drwy gyfrwng cynlluniau, cystadlaethau, cynadleddau, sgysiau a datblygu meysydd llafur. Yn ystod y tair blynedd diwethaf trefnodd wersylloedd gwaith gwirfoddol mewn gwahanol ardaloedd yng Nghymru ar gyfer 389 o bobl ifainc o 42 o wledydd. Codwyd dros £80,000 yn ystod Blwyddyn Ryngwladol y Plant 1979 i hyrwyddo gwaith y Gronfa Blant a berthyn i'r Cenhedloedd Unedig (UNICEF). Eleni mae wedi cael 60 o wirfoddolwyr o Brydain i weithio mewn gwledydd tramor ynghyd â chreu cysylltiadau ymarferol gyda chyrrff rhyngwladol megis y Cenhedloedd Unedig, Y Gymuned Economaidd Ewropeaidd a'r Gymanwlad a bu'n gyfrifol am wahodd tair prif gynhadledd y Cenhedloedd Unedig ar gyfer y Deyrnas Gyfunol. Y Ganolfan hefyd sy'n gweinyddu Ymgyrch Rhag Newyn y Deyrnas Gyfunol. Darperir ganddi Gynhadledd Sefydlog dros fwy na 30 o awdurdodau lleol ynghyd â chroestoriad o sefydliadau cenedlaethol. Bydd yn cynnal Cyfarfodydd blynyddol a anerchir gan siaradwyr o fri. Mae hyn oll yn record anrhydeddus yn arbennig felly i sefydliad mor ifanc.

Ond fel y nodir yn ddiweddarach gan Lywydd Cyngor Cenedlaethol Cymru o Gymdeithas y Cenhedloedd Unedig fe'n hwynebir gan her anferthol ar ôl i'r dirwasgiad ariannol waethygu'r sefyllfa.

Message from the United Kingdom Ambassador to the United Nations

This year marks the 35th anniversary of the United Nations. When the United Nations was established at San Francisco in 1945, the Organisation had 51 members. Now it has 152, with Zimbabwe about to become the 153rd. Then, the membership consisted largely of Western and Eastern European countries, the New World and the Old Commonwealth. Now that the process of decolonisation is almost complete, the balance has swung towards the newly independent nations. Roughly one-third of today's members are African countries, many of them former British colonies. In 1945, the emphasis at the UN was almost wholly on political and security questions. Now attention turns increasingly to economic and development issues – the North/South Dialogue.

But, if the world and the UN as an organisation have changed almost beyond recognition since 1945, some factors remain constant. Many of the problems with which the UN has been wrestling for many years remain intractable. But this is no reason to despair. The need to maintain peace and security in an inter-dependent world is just as great now as in 1945. So too is the need to pursue the UN's goals in the economic, social, cultural and humanitarian fields, and to give all countries a universal forum in which they can voice their concerns and find a hearing for their grievances.

The United Nations is far from perfect: it reflects an imperfect world. It is up to the United Kingdom as a founder member, and as a permanent member of the Security Council, to improve and strengthen it where we can. To this end, it is important to have an informed public opinion at home; and we need voluntary organisations not just to spur government on but to make their own direct contribution to UN activities. The Welsh Centre for International Affairs can be justifiably proud of its role in increasing international awareness within the Principality and encouraging public debate. We in the United Kingdom Mission are extremely grateful for your support.

The Sixth Anniversary

The guest speaker at the Sixth Anniversary Meeting, which took place at the Temple of Peace on October 26, was the Rt. Hon. George Thomas, MP, Speaker of the House of Commons, President of the Wales Standing Conference for the International Year of the Child and also a member of the Standing Conference of the Welsh Centre.

Mr. Speaker drew from his wide experience to cover the whole spectrum of the Rights of the Child on both a domestic and international basis. He emphasised the need for the UN to intervene in countries where there had been a violation of basic human rights. He also drew attention to the fact that although the UN had more than 150 Member States there were only 25 democracies in the world.

The meeting, which attracted an audience of over 400, was held in conjunction with the Wales Standing Conference for IYC. It was chaired by the President of the Welsh Centre. Civic welcomes were given by the Lord Mayor of Cardiff, Councillor Mrs. Bella Brown, and by the Chairman of the South Glamorgan County Council, County Councillor Gwyn Thomas.

Activities**1979****i) The World Bank — Cardiff, September 19.**

Mr. Mark Cherniavsky, Head, External Relations, European Office, World Bank, Paris, visited the Welsh Centre. He discussed with the Director future collaboration between the Centre and the World Bank. Mr. Cherniavsky was interviewed by press and radio about the work of the World Bank and its Annual Report. He also attended the reception for the International Conference for Students in Industry at Cardiff Castle.

ii) International Residential Conference for Students in Industry — Aberystwyth, September 20-23. (Jointly organised by CEWC-Cymru and the Development Corporation for Wales.)

50 British companies were represented, 22 Continental EEC, 1 from Sweden, 1 from Japan and a group of students from the USA. The theme was "The European Community in the Eighties". Speakers included Sir Hywel Evans, Welsh Office, Mr. Aneurin Rhys-Hughes, EEC, Mr. R. Godier, Ford Motor Co., and Mr. Tom Ellis, MP.

iii) UNESCO Exhibitions — Bangor, Aberystwyth, Cardiff, September-November.

Following a showing of UNESCO's recent publications at the National Book League in London, UNESCO invited the Welsh Centre to arrange for them to be exhibited in Wales. The venues were: Bangor Normal College, September 25 – October 5; University College, Bangor, October 15 – 20; University College,

Aberystwyth, October 19 – November 10; Polytechnic of Wales, Pontypridd, November 12 – 17.

v) United Nations Day — October 24.

A bilingual leaflet was produced by the Central Office of Information, with the Welsh Centre being the point of contact for people in Wales. To mark IYC it was entitled "The World's Children – their Future and Ours".

The theme was "Energy – a World Problem". The guest speakers were Mr. John Moore, MP, Under Secretary of State for Energy and Dr. Brian Hughes, Manager, Corporate Planning Division, BP Oil Ltd. The Chairman of Clwyd County Council, Councillor W. Rhys Webb, gave a Civic Welcome. Session Chairmen were the Chief Executive of Clwyd, Mr. Mervyn Phillips, and the Director of the Welsh Centre. The Conference was attended by over 90 delegates representing local authorities, industry, voluntary bodies and public services.

Financial Appeal

At the 1979 Annual Meeting, grave concern was expressed for the financial security of the Welsh Centre. It was pointed out that with the proportion of assured annual income being so small in relation to annual expenditure, an undue proportion of staff time had to be spent in fund-raising at the expense of furthering the objectives of the Centre themselves. The lack of security has led to a fairly rapid staff turnover which has caused considerable working difficulties in an organisation as small as the Centre.

As a result, a Sub-Committee to raise funds was set up under the Chairmanship of Mr. Christopher Pollard with Mr. Gerry McMorran as Hon. Project Director. The aim is to achieve a capital base of £250,000 to produce an income at a level which would help secure more soundly the work of the Centre during the 80's. To date some £40,000 has been raised, including grossed-up covenants.

It is not the most propitious time to launch an Appeal and all associated with the Centre and its Committees are strongly urged to do their utmost to seek support for the fund.

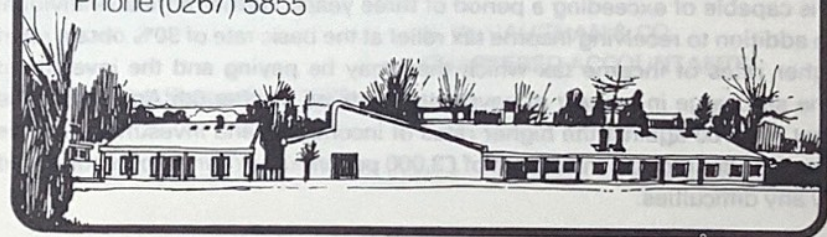

International Year of the Child 1979

This Report covers the concluding months of IYC, the start having been described in the Annual Report for 1979. In addition to the Anniversary address of the Speaker, on October 26 (see page 9) a team representing the schools of Wales took part in the United Kingdom Young People's Parliament in London on October 25-26 (see page 24), the Vice-Chairman of the United Kingdom IYC, Dr. Mia Pringle, gave a public lecture in Cardiff on October 5, while the Chairman for Wales, Professor Ronald Davie visited Lesotho on a British Council project in November.

The all-Wales UNICEF Project for Lesotho was an outstanding success. On April 25, 1980, a cheque for £81,284 was presented at the Temple of Peace, by Mr. Michael Roberts, MP, Under-Secretary of State for Wales, to the United Kingdom Assistant Director of UNICEF in the presence of the Lesotho High Commissioner. Lord Davies of Llandinam opened the proceedings which were attended by representatives of local authorities throughout Wales, as well as other participating organisations.

The amount far surpassed the target of £50,000 and further moneys are still being received. Each local authority was presented with a special commemorative plate, kindly presented by Mrs. J. T. Morgan.

The money was raised in Wales through the co-operation of 33 of the Principality's Borough and District Councils, OXFAM, Christian Aid, the Freedom from Hunger Campaign Committee for Wales, the Council for Education in World Citizenship-Cymru, and the United Nations Association, Welsh National Council. It is for four projects in Lesotho, health services, rural water supplies, education programmes and women's programme.

A small group representing health, education, social services and voluntary sector interests is pursuing the idea of producing a publication bringing together information about the children of Wales in a form which would have interest and value not only for policy makers, administrators and professional workers, but also for the general public. A small grant from the UK IYC Committee will make possible a preliminary report in 1980. It is hoped that this will demonstrate the value and feasibility of such a project and will stimulate further interest and support within Wales.

The United Kingdom Freedom From Hunger Campaign

The Committee, administered from the Welsh Centre, is supporting four main projects: two in India, one with the Bihar State Dairy Corporation to set up a dairy at Muzaffarpur (£307,000) and the other a cattle improvement scheme with the Pradeshiik Dairy Co-operative Federation Uttar Pradesh (£118,000); one in Malawi to develop a Nutrition Training Unit at Bunda College (£86,000);

water-drilling with Family Farms, Zambia (£51,000). During IYC small grants were given to support two other projects in India, one in Zimbabwe/Rhodesia and one for the Wales UNICEF project in Lesotho.

The Secretary visited India in November with the two Hon. Consultants, Mr. E. Mann and Mr. D. Stewart who returned to India in April as part of their bi-annual inspection programme.

Advisory Committee for Development Education and Information

With the demise of the Government's Advisory Committee for Development Education (ACDE), the Development Committee of the Welsh Centre was broadened to include Mr. John Beale, Director of Education, West Glamorgan County Council, Mrs. Alison Heard, Assistant Secretary, CEWC-Cymru, Mr. Elfed Jones, Oxfam, Mr. Ian Jones, Development Officer, Welsh Centre, Dame Margaret Miles, formerly Chairman ACDE, Miss Ann Davies, Secretary, Wales Young Farmers' Clubs, Mr. W. Eirwyn Thomas, HM Inspectorate, Welsh Office, Rev. Wyn Vittle, Christian Aid, Mr. Gareth Wheatley, North E. Wales Institute of Higher Education, Mr. Peter A. Dean, Welsh National Council, UN Association, Mr. R. Hanwell, Zimmer Orthopaedic Ltd., Bridgend, Mrs. Anne Jessop, Women's Institutes and Mr. Les Paul, Wales TUC.

The Chairman is Dr. Glyn O. Phillips, Principal, North E. Wales Institute of Higher Education and Chairman, CEWC-Cymru and the Secretary, the Director of the Welsh Centre.

The first meeting was held on June 9. Matters covered included Curriculum Development, Primary Schools, Young Farmers, Resource Centres, Eisteddfodau, the Brandt Report, Local Authorities and a Special Conference, November 14.

Publications — Special Paper Seven

In 1980 the Welsh Centre published "Disarmament, Security and Development (with special reference to the Brandt Report)", by its Research Consultant and its Director, Goronwy J. Jones and W. R. Davies.

In his Foreword, the President of the Welsh National Council UNA, and former Minister for Disarmament, Lord Goronwy-Roberts, wrote: "This Special Paper had attempted to cover what many feel to be the two most important issues facing the world community as it approaches 2000AD: the threat of annihilation resulting from the staggering increase in armaments, especially the increasing proliferation of nuclear weapons, reflected in a military bill approaching \$450 billion per annum; and the fact that two-thirds of the world's population are still living in hunger, poverty, disease and ignorance while large-

scale unemployment and the energy crisis threaten to undermine the wellbeing of advanced industrial countries.

At the core of any system of stable international relations, emphasises the Brandt Report, are morality and enlightened self-interest. Freeing the world from hunger, poverty, disease and ignorance is not only right and humane; the potential needs and demands of the developing world could also provide the stimulus to a substantial growth in the economies of the advanced industrial countries.

I hope that there will be a discussion of these issues throughout Wales. I would suggest that the Welsh Centre, in conjunction with its member organisations, considers convening two national conferences; the one in 1981 to examine how seriously the recommendations of the Brandt Report have been taken at national and international levels; the other in 1982 before the Second Special Session of the UN General Assembly on Disarmament to ascertain what progress has been made since 1978".

Development Resource Centre

A wide range of materials, including literature, films and slides, is available on request from the Welsh Centre.

Publications and Press Cuttings

The Welsh Centre regularly receives over 30 publications and reports on all aspects of international affairs from the United Nations, regional organisations and from other sources.

A press-cuttings service is maintained under the following headings: Europe; the Americas; the Communist Bloc; Asia; Middle East; Africa; Disarmament; Development and Trade; Environment; United Nations; Domestic.

Reports of Organisations Represented on the Co-ordinating Committee

The Organisations represented on the Co-ordinating Committee have made important contributions to the activities of the Welsh Centre, but it has not been felt necessary to refer to them specifically in each case. Summaries of their Reports are set out below. Copies of the Reports are available on request.

(a) UNITED NATIONS ASSOCIATION, WELSH NATIONAL COUNCIL

Annual General Meeting. The 34th AGM was held in Cardiff on April 12. Lord Goronwy-Roberts was elected President in succession to Mr. Edgar Buck, and Mr. Ray Palmer, Hon. Treasurer, to succeed Mr. Alun Griffiths. Elected to the Executive Committee for 1980-83 were Mrs. Eve Edwards, Mr. J. H. Davidson, Mr. Alun Griffiths, Mr. Michael Gwyther, Mr. Ifor James, Mr. Allan Jones, Mr. M. J. Jones, Mr. M. Roper and Mr. Ian Thomas. At a subsequent meeting of the Executive Committee, Mr. Goronwy J. Jones was elected Chairman to succeed Mr. Keith James.

Policy Developments. Issues discussed during the year included the British Independent Nuclear Deterrent, Theatre Weapons in Europe, the Law of the Sea, Workers in the Third World, UN Humanitarian Activities, International Development Action and Rhodesian Refugee Children.

Obituary. Members were saddened by the death of Mrs. Irene Everest, OBE (Creigiau).

Membership. At the end of 1979 there was a membership of 857, a decrease of 104 on 1978.

Women's Advisory Council. The Council held its usual quarterly meetings. Speakers included: October 7, Miss Carol Cobert, European Movement, "European Assembly - its Effect on Europe"; February 9, Mr. Winston Griffiths, MEP, "The European Parliament"; May 3, Dr. Ann Robinson, Member with special responsibility for Wales, "The Equal Opportunities Commission"; July 5, Mr. S. W. F. Edmunds, Planning Officer, Mid Glamorgan, "Pollution and the Environment".

At the Annual General Meeting on May 3, the following Officers were elected: Chairman, Mrs. Eve Edmunds; Vice-Chairmen, Mrs. M. Bold, Mrs. G. Evans, Acting Secretary, Mrs. M. Brace. Mrs. Vera Smith was subsequently elected Secretary.

United Kingdom General Council. Edinburgh, March 28-30. Mr. Peter Dean, Assistant Secretary, represented the Welsh National Council. He proposed a resolution urging Her Majesty's Government to raise at the UN Security Council the principle of facilitating direct international emergency aid in crisis situations. The motion was carried unanimously. A resolution on the Protection of International Civil Servants was submitted by the Whitchurch Branch. Because of

lack of time this was referred to the UK Executive Committee.

(b) COUNCIL FOR EDUCATION IN WORLD CITIZENSHIP-CYMRU

Annual General Meeting. At the AGM held on 10th May, 1980, the following Officers were re-elected: President, Dr. A. B. Oldfield-Davies, Vice-Presidents, Sir Alfred Nicholas, Miss M. M. Copland, Chairman, Dr. Glyn O. Phillips, Vice-Chairmen, Miss V. Brown, Mr. R. C. Parry, Mr. John Watkins, Treasurer, Mr. R. C. Parry.

Annual Residential Sixth Form Conference. The centre-piece of the year was the annual residential sixth form Conference held at Atlantic College, St. Donats, 28 March to 2 April.

The theme of the Conference was 'Peace and Poverty: The Challenge for Mankind'. The object was to assess the two major issues facing the United Nations today, Disarmament and Development. Many of the activities concerned with the former were introduced by Mr. Colin Reid, Director of the Peace Studies Project at Atlantic College and the students were fully involved with a simulation exercise 'Simulex Gamala', devised and instructed by Brigadier Michael Harbottle. This followed a mock UN Security Council debate. Professor Ieuan John gave the inaugural lecture on the history of the United Nations.

The development issues also maximised student participation and as a conclusion to the Conference, the students produced Principles for Recommendation to the UN, on both the New International Economic Order and Peace-keeping. This was presented to Mr. Michael Popovic (UN Information Centre), who was most interested to follow up these ideas and those of the course with the UN Education Department. Mr. George Foggon gave a stimulating lecture on the NIEO.

Much of the students' work and participation was recorded on video tape by Mr. David Owen and Mr. Mark Dunton of the North East Wales Institute of Higher Education. This will be most useful for future work with teachers and should prove an excellent new dimension to the activities which CEWC-Cymru offers.

58 sixth formers attended and 24 students from the Atlantic College.

International Year of the Child. Schools contributed £13,414 for the all Wales UNICEF Lesotho Project and entered the special Essay and Art Competitions sponsored by Drake Educational Associates. Response from the Primary Schools was particularly good. The prizes were distributed at the IYC Reception on April 25, for English and Welsh County winners at both Primary and Secondary levels. In addition, the Assistant Secretary accompanied the 10 Welsh delegates to the Young People's Parliament, October 24-26, 1979. The Parliament was opened by the Prime Minister, and Chaired by Mr. Clement Freud, MP. Several of the Welsh delegates were chosen to have tea with the Speaker, Mr. George Thomas, MP, and the West Glamorgan delegate, Richard Hopkin, was selected to be the Chairman for the Final Speeches. The Assistant Secretary helped the Cardiff

Voluntary Community Service to organise the IYC Children's Party on December 10, 1979, at the Temple of Peace, when over 200 local children attended.

Curriculum Development. The final syllabus for the CEWC-Cymru Mode 2 'O' level Paper on Development Education was submitted to the WJEC in May and was favourably received, although the acceptance does depend on national schemes for re-organising the overall 'O' level schemes for schools. Confirmation will be given by January 1981. In the meantime, the Assistant Secretary is supporting the venture by visiting Schools, who would participate in the course and by holding Teachers' Workshops. In addition, a seminar on Development Education will be held on November 14, 1980, for educationalists in Wales, to survey the Welsh scene and to introduce teaching techniques.

Other Highlights. Among other highlights of the year was the participation of sixth formers in the Dyfed Agricultural Conference on 6 November, 1980, in Carmarthen, and the Women's Conference at Bridgend on June 13. Sixth formers from Cardiff also attended the address given by Mr. Peter Blaker, MP, Foreign and Commonwealth Office, on February 5, and similarly sixth formers from South and Mid Glamorgan participated in a seminar at the Temple of Peace with Sir Anthony Parsons, UK Ambassador to the UN on May 13. The Assistant Secretary was a panel member at Clwyd Sixth Form Conference on Development, held at Mold, and gave a lecture at Bath on December 1 for the South Glamorgan Institute of Higher Education to illustrate the international dimension of the IYC. A similar talk was broadcast by the BBC Wales on November 29. In addition, the Assistant Secretary has worked with the Area Committees to revive the Donald Miller Public Speaking Competition in South Glamorgan, and the one-day sixth form Conferences for Gwent and West Glamorgan. They are to be held in October and November, 1980. The Assistant Secretary also attended the 18th Annual Residential Conference for Students in Industry at Aberystwyth, September

(c) FREEDOM FROM HUNGER CAMPAIGN (WALES)

Biennial Fair. The major event of 1979 was the biennial Fair at the City Hall, Cardiff on October 4, which was attended by the Lord Mayor. The Opener was Miss Margaret Pritchard (HTV) and the special guest, Miss Barbara Windsor. The Chairman was Mrs. J. T. Morgan (Swansea). Over £4,678 was raised to support the Wales IYC Project for Lesotho, with a further £2,000 from the United Kingdom FFHC Committee. Once again ladies from over 30 organisations combined excellently to raise this splendid amount.
