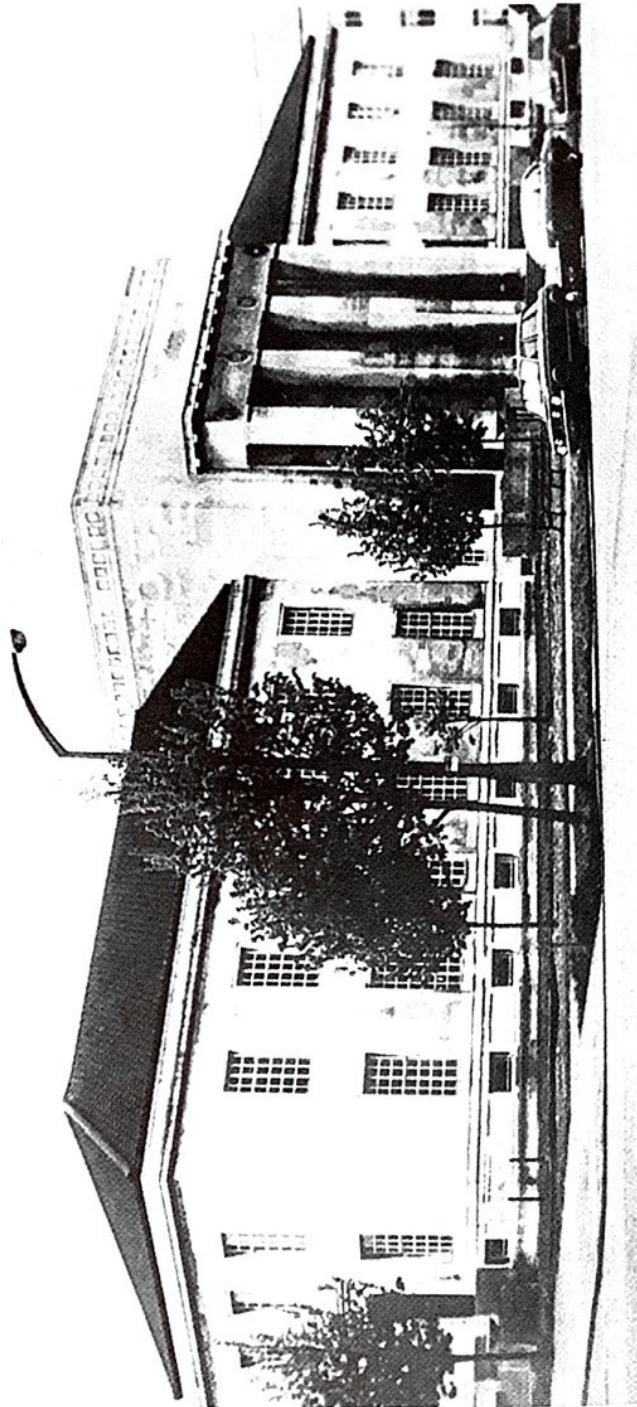

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PRESIDENT'S FOREWORD

1988 has been a wonderful year. The 50th Anniversary celebrations of the Temple of Peace have seen both an exciting programme, which is described in the Annual Report and also a successful appeal to match the contribution of our anonymous benefactor. The first Lord Davies would have been pleased with our efforts, though we still have some way to go to reach our final target before the end of the Anniversary Year.

1988 has seen signs of hope on the international front. True, there have been terrible tragedies in Bangladesh and in the Sudan. But in an era of super-power detente we have seen a growing will to make the United Nations work; in Afghanistan, in Southern Africa and in the Gulf there has been progress, albeit slow, towards the resolution of seemingly intractable problems; Presidents Reagan and Gorbachev both want the UN to succeed and secure the cause of peace for humankind; the UN Peace-Keeping forces have been awarded the Nobel Peace Prize. How different the prospects were in 1938 when Lord Davies founded the Temple of Peace with the clouds of war looming over Europe!

Three developments at the Temple of Peace and Health, with the kind collaboration of our colleagues at the South Glamorgan Health Authority and the support of the Welsh Office, have given special pleasure: the opening of the main entrance of the building through the vestibule on King Edward VII Avenue; the cleaning of the exterior; and the creation of the Welsh National Garden of Peace at the rear. These will add considerably to the majesty of this great building.

The success of the Anniversary Year must not breed complacency. Indeed, the officers and trustees have been considering a Report outlining priorities for the years ahead and what changes may be necessary to bring them about.

In such a short Foreword it is impossible to mention individually all those throughout the whole of Wales to whom the Centre is profoundly indebted for helping to make 1988 so memorable.

But a few I must mention. First and foremost the present members of the Lord Davies of Llandinam family. Without their loyal support throughout the years, the breadth and depth of the activities of the Centre could not have been achieved. Secondly, the Hon. Sir Malcolm Pill. In January 1988 he was elevated to the High Court Bench as a Judge in the Queens Bench Division and we extend to him our warmest congratulations. Sir Malcolm has over a period of more than twenty years occupied many senior offices including the chairmanship of the Co-ordinating Committee, the Trust and the UN Association. It was the unanimous wish of the Trustees that the Hon. Jonathan Davies succeed Sir Malcolm as Chairman of the UNA (Welsh Centre) Trust, a post he is

combining with the Chairmanship of the Co-ordinating Committee. I am sure that under his guidance further substantial progress will be made.

At the end of this year I shall have completed four years as President, I greatly value the support given to me by so many, and in particular Mr Bill Davies and his staff. I am also delighted to inform you that Dr Gareth Owen, the Principal of Aberystwyth University College, and the erstwhile Vice-Chancellor of the University of Wales has graciously accepted the invitation of the Co-ordinating Committee to become the President of the Centre for the next three years.

The Centre is in good hands; may it and all it stands for flourish.

RHAGAIR Y LLYWYDD

Bu 1988 yn flwyddyn lewyrchus yn hanes y Deml Heddwch. Bu dathlu'r hanner canmlwyddiant yn symbyliad i raglen gyffrous o weithgarwch, a ddisgrifir yn yr Adroddiad Blyneddol, a hefyd i apêl lwyddiannus am gymorth ariannol i gasglu'r swm yr addawodd noddwr dienw ei ddyblu. Byddai'r Arglwydd Davies cyntaf wedi ymhyfrydu yn ein hymdrechion, ond fe erys ychydig o ffordd eto i ni fynd cyn cyrraedd ein nod terfynol erbyn diwedd ein Blwyddyn Hanner Canmlwyddiant.

Bu 1988 hefyd yn flwyddyn o obaith ar draws y byd. Mae'n wir y gwelwyd trychinebau echrydus ym Mangladesh a'r Sudan, ond hefyd bu cysylltiad y pŵerau mawr â'i gilydd yn llai gelyniaethus, a gwelwyd tuedd gynyddol i ddefnyddio'r Cenhedloedd Unedig; yn Afghanistan, yn Ne Affrica ac yn y Gwlff cymerwyd camau bychain ond araf tuag at ddatrys problemau a ymddangosai'n amhosibl i'w datrys; mae'r Arlywyddion Reagan a Gorbachev ill dau am weld y Cenhedloedd Unedig yn llwyddo ac yn sicrhau heddwch yn y byd; dyfarnwyd Gwobr Heddwch Nobel i luoedd Cadw-Heddwch y Cenhedloedd Unedig. Mor wahanol oedd yr argoelion yn 1938 pan sylfaenodd yr Arglwydd Davies y Deml Heddwch a chymylau rhyfel yn crynhoi ar draws ffurfafen Ewrop.

Trwy gydweithrediad caredig Awdurdod Iechyd De Morgannwg a chefnogaeth y Swyddfa Gymreig bu tri digwyddiant yn y Deml Heddwch a roes inni bleser arbenning: agor prif fynedfa'r adeilad trwy'r cyntedd ar Rodfa'r Brenin Edward VII, glanhau tu allan yr adeilad; a chreu Gardd Heddwch Genedlaethol Gymreig yng nghefn yr adeilad. Bydd y rhain yn cyfrannu'n sylweddol at urddas yr adeilad hardd hwn.

Rhaid gofalu nad ydyw llwyddiant y flwyddyn arbennig hon yn magu ynom ymfodddhad ac yn peri inni laesu dwylo. Yn wir, bu'r swyddogion a'r ymddiriedolwyr yn ystyried Adroddiad yn amlinellu'r blaenoriaethau am y blyneddol i ddod a'r newidiadau sy'n angenrheidiol i'w cyflawni.

Mewn Rhagair byr mae'n amhosibl enwi pawb led-led Cymru y mae'r Ganolfan yn ddyledus iddynt am eu cymorth yn wneud y flwyddyn yn un mor gofiadwy.

Ond rhaid imi enwi ychydig ohonynt. Yn gyntaf ac yn bennaf, aelodau presennol teulu'r Arglwydd Davies o Landinam. Heb eu cefnogaeth ffyddlon hwy ar hyd y blynyddoedd ni fyddai'r Ganolfan wedi gallu llwyddo i gyflawni'r gwaith eang a threiddgar a wnaed ganddi. Yn ail, yr Anrhydeddus Syr Malcolm Pill. Ym mis Ionawr 1988 dyrchafwyd ef i Fainc yr Uchel Lys yn Farnwr yn Rhaniad Mainc y Frenhines, ac estynnwn iddo ein llongyfarchiadau gwresocaf. Yn ystod cyfnod o dros ugain o flynyddoed bu Syr Malcolm yn llanw nifer o swyddi pwysig, gan gynnwys cadeiryddiaeth y Pwyllgor Cyd-drefnu, yr Ymddiriedolaeth, a Chymdeithas y Cenhedloedd Unedig. Dymuniad unfrydol yr Ymddiriedolwyr oedd bod yr Anrhydeddus Jonathan Davies yn olynu Syr Malcolm fel Cadeirydd Ymddiriedolaeth UNA (Canolfan Gymreig), swydd y bydd ef yn ei chyfuno â Chadeiryddiaeth y Pwyllgor Cyd-drefnu. THE FIFTIETH ANNIVERSARY OF THE TEMPLE OF PEACE, 1988

On November 23, 1988, it will be fifty years since Mrs Minnie James, a war-bereaved mother of Dowlais, who lost three sons in the Great War, turned the key to open the Temple of Peace.

For the Fiftieth Anniversary Year, an exciting programme has been adopted, led by the President, Sir Alun Talfan Davies, which has two main aims. The ways in which these are implemented make up the substance of this Report.

(1) To make the Temple of Peace and its works as widely known as possible throughout Wales and the World involving:

Key conferences, including those with the Foreign and Commonwealth Office in conjunction with the Department of International Politics, University College, Aberystwyth, and with the European Commission of Human Rights.

Visits of leading personalities with first hand experience of international affairs to all parts of Wales throughout the year.

A varied Schools' programme of model UN and Commonwealth Assemblies, visits of guests with first hand experience of international activities, competitions, including the Sallie Davies Memorial Competition (supported by Wales TUC) and organised by the schools' arm of the Welsh Centre, the Council for Education in World Citizenship-Cymru.

The UNA International Youth Service programme with projects in every county in Wales and places for volunteers in many countries abroad, serving community needs.

Special Anniversary Meeting November 23, 1988, the fiftieth anniversary of the actual opening of the building.

(2) To raise £250,000 to ensure that the work of the Welsh Centre for International Affairs is based upon sound foundations for its development in the next 50 years.

An anonymous donor has promised £125,000 if this can be matched. This promise was subsequently raised to £145,000 if it could be matched by the Welsh Centre's own efforts. At August 31 (with promises and grossed-up covenants) the £100,000 mark had been passed.

A target of £10,000 for each county has been set, excluding South Glamorgan.

JOHN WILDMAN

The Appeal was considerably helped by the generous gesture of Metalbox plc in seconding John Wildman, Divisional Director for South Wales, to act as Appeal Director.

Before the end of his secondment towards the close of the year, Mr Wildman was asked to prepare a Special Discussion Report re the Welsh Centre's structure and functioning to help with the preparation of the Centre's work and priorities for the next decade.

REFURBISHMENT OF THE TEMPLE OF PEACE AND HEALTH

During the year discussions took place with the South Glam Health Authority and the Welsh Office. As a result plans are being made to clean the exterior of the building and to site the main entrance on King Edward VII Avenue, with the resultant changes to the vestibule area by November 23.

JOHN TUSA ADDRESSES 14th ANNIVERSARY MEETING

Delivering the 14th Anniversary Lecture of the Welsh Centre for International Affairs at the Temple of Peace on Friday, 30 October, before an audience of over 350 representatives of national life in Wales, Mr John Tusa, Managing Director of External Broadcasting at the BBC, said that ".... what concerns me and others is that there is as little sense of urgency now as there was in the 1930s, that communicating with the world outside is a matter of higher rather than lower priority, that Britain cannot permit its competitors to seize the commanding heights in this field without regretting the consequences later, that Britain is very good at this activity when we are given funds to do it, and that a strategy of investing in success, in not selling Britain short, should lead to a greater investment in Cultural Diplomacy rather than at best a stand back policy which says – for no apparent reason – that what we spend now is 'about right'. For all we know – in the absence of arguments or analysis to the contrary – what we spend now may well be 'about wrong'.

The fact that this year's Edinburgh Festival Opening Concert given by the Orchestra of the Bolshoi Theatre was preceded by a 10 minute message from Mr Gorbachev showed that in Moscow at least, the practitioners of cultural diplomacy were not sitting idly on their hands.

There were two starkly contrasting views of the issues to which international broadcasting should be put, the idealistic and the ideological.

The idealists – like Reith of the BBC, spoke peace, "dedicated to the best interest of mankind"; the ideologues – Lenin and Hitler, spoke propaganda, serving political purposes.

What was in the end at stake in the debate about International Communications was, as Archibald MacLeish said, the fact that freedom of speech was freedom also to hear to assure people a chance to hear the truth, the unpleasant truth as well as the reassuring truth, the dangerous truth as well as the comforting truth. That, added Mr Tusa, was the only sound basis on which nation can truly speak peace unto nation.

Civic welcomes were given by the Deputy Lord Mayor, Councillor Mrs Beti Jones and the Vice-Chairman of the County Council, Councillor Mrs Barbara Phillips. Sir Alun Talfan Davies, President of the Welsh Centre, took the Chair.

NEW ZEALAND FOREIGN MINISTER

New Zealand Foreign Minister, Mr Russell Marshall, addressed a packed Temple of Peace Council Chamber on 19 February, his only official engagement outside London during his short visit to the UK in February. Accompanied by the New Zealand Deputy High Commissioner, Mr Roger Farrell, Mr Marshall spoke about the long-standing ties between Wales and New Zealand, and the problems facing both countries' farmers.

UN AMBASSADOR MAKES SECOND VISIT TO WALES

Making his second visit to Wales in just over a year, Sir Crispin Tickell, UK Ambassador to the UN, accompanied by Mr Peter Williams, Head of UN Department, Foreign and Commonwealth Office, spoke at Carmarthen on June 24 at a lunch jointly hosted by the Chairman of Dyfed County Council, County Councillor D.J. Thomas, and the Chairman of Carmarthen District Council, Councillor T.W. Davies, and attended by a widely representative gathering from Dyfed; and at the West Glamorgan County Hall in Swansea, followed by dinner hosted by the Chairman of West Glamorgan, County Councillor D.T. Vernon Davies. Both functions were to mark the 50th Anniversary of the Temple of Peace.

In his speech Sir Crispin said that the UN was undergoing a resurgence. Within the last couple of years there had been new shifts.

Three factors stood out: a wider acceptance of need for global solutions to global problems (witness the Bruntland Commission report on Environment and Development, and the Montreal Protocol on the Ozone Layer); a greater readiness to co-operate on a wide range of issues (for example, debt); and, more specifically related to the central mechanisms of the United Nations, the apparent readiness of one of the super powers, the Soviet Union, to make more use of the Organisation in its foreign policy and to see it as a window on the world.

The United Nations could only work if its Member Governments wanted it to do so. Paper solutions were not real solutions. It was sometimes easier, especially for powerful countries, to work alone or in regional groups: but even the most powerful recognised their limitations. Let the United Nations go back to being what it was first designed to be: a framework for law, order and peace, and the means for creating a true world community. We live in a small world: it is the only one that we have got.

Sir Crispin has accepted a Vice-Presidency of the Welsh Centre.

UN AGENCY CHIEF VISITS CENTRE

Professor G.O.P. Obasi, Secretary General of the Geneva-based World Meteorological Organisation, visited Cardiff on March 11. Accompanied by Sir Arthur Davies, Emeritus Secretary General, Professor Obasi toured UWIST and spoke to students in the Department of Maritime Studies, visited the Cardiff Weather Centre, and met members of the UNA Executive Committee.

A special lunch hosted by Sir Arthur Davies, provided Professor Obasi with an opportunity to address representatives from local government, business, the media and the University.

LORD CALLAGHAN HOSTS LORDS' RECEPTION

One of the highlights of the Anniversary Year was the House of Lords' reception for business and commercial supporters of the Welsh Centre hosted by Lord Callaghan on June 15, and attended by other leading Welsh peers. Over 100 guests enjoyed an excellent day. As a result over £13,000 was donated to the Temple of Peace Appeal.

SECOND WORLD FOOD CONFERENCE, BRUSSELS, APRIL 6-8

Peace is not simply the absence of war. Positive peace involves freedom from hunger and malnutrition which sadly affects some two thirds of the human race.

Mr Bill Davies, Director of the Welsh Centre, attended principally in his capacity as Secretary of the United Kingdom Freedom From Hunger Campaign, the Brussels Conference convened by Lord Plumb, President of the European Parliament. Some 200 delegates represented governments, international organisations, the farming sector, academics and the independent sector. The purpose of the Conference was to confront the imbalance between the surpluses of industrial countries and the lack of adequate food in the Third World which appals and perplexes public opinion.

In his summing up, Lord Plumb said: "the Conference welcomes the evidence that many Governments in the industrialised world are beginning to tackle the necessary reform of the agricultural system. But clearly more needs to be done, both to correct market imbalances and to shift the emphasis of policies. The changes required vary from country to country depending on their agricultural situation and prospects. But it is clear that they will have to involve a substantial reduction in the support given to agricultural production. Such a reduction will increase overall welfare and allow greater scope for the changes to be carried out in ways which would increase the influence of market forces and lead to a more efficient use of the world's agricultural resources."

"The current GATT Uruguay Round provides a unique opportunity to further many of the (Conference's) objectives. Most of the Contracting Parties have shown a willingness to bring into the negotiations all support measures whether internal or at the frontier with an influence on agriculture production and trade."

Progress is being kept under review.

WELSH NATIONAL GARDEN OF PEACE

The International Day of Voluntary Work, May 27, marked the official public launch of the Welsh Garden of Peace project by the Lord Mayor of Cardiff, Councillor Bill Herbert, at a meeting attended by sixty people at the Temple of Peace. The meeting was also addressed by the Hon Jonathan Davies, Chairman, Welsh Centre, Mr Bill Davies, Director, Mr Keith Moger, Chief Administrator South Glamorgan Health Authority, and representatives of UNA and UNA IYS. The Peace Garden is the UNA International Youth Service's special contribution to the Fiftieth Anniversary of the Temple of Peace. It initially consists of the UN symbol formed of paving and flower beds, together with garden seats and flag poles.

The project will continue and develop over many years. A start was made on August 22 involving 18 volunteers representing two of Cardiff's twin cities: Nantes and Stuttgart, and Algeria, Belgium, England, France, West Germany, Hong Kong, Italy, Netherlands, Spain, USSR, Wales. Sir Alun Talfan Davies dug the first sod. At the close of the initial stage, September 3, the date which marked the outbreak of World War II in 1939, the volunteers raised the UN Flag side by side with those of Wales and the United Kingdom, after greetings in their own language.

Over two hundred attended, the speakers including the Lord Mayor of Cardiff, Councillor Bill Herbert, the Chairman of UNAIYS, John Burford and work-camp organiser, Cedric Medland. Hon Edward Davies unveiled the official plaque, a tribute to the indispensable and abiding interest of the founding family of Llandinam in the Temple of Peace.

Members of the Inter-faiths association also participated. The Lord Mayor hosted a buffet luncheon to thank all those who made the project possible.

MRS J.T. MORGAN REMEMBERED

An audience of 200 filled the Chapel to hear an eloquent tribute by Viscount Tonypany. As a result of contributions made, a stained glass window will be placed in Tŷ Olwen. Mr Bill Davies presented the designs to Mr Vernon Rees Davies, President, Tŷ Olwen Trust. County Councillor John Allison presided.

The Chairman of the Welsh Ladies FFHC Committee, Miss Nan Davies, unveiled a plaque on September 22 at the entrance to the Council Chamber of the Temple of Peace. It was inscribed: "In memory of Olwen Irene Morgan, 'Mrs J.T.', who dedicated her life to the welfare of others. From the Ladies of her Freedom From Hunger Campaign Committee – June 1987".

Arising out of legacies by Mrs Morgan, two endowment funds have been established: 'The Mrs J.T. Morgan Travelling Scholarship' (£10,000), administered by the UNA (Welsh Centre) Trust, will enable the professional staff of the Welsh Centre to visit developing countries to further the Centre's work in this field; for the 'Mrs J.T. Morgan, Wales Freedom From Hunger – UK Scholarship' (£5,000) (see page 43).

INSIDE THE SUBCONTINENT

Russell Holden, the Executive Officer of the Welsh Centre, made a three week tour of India in 1987, visiting four of India's largest cities as well as Rajasthan. He writes:

"Since independence, India has attained the status of being classified by the OECD as the tenth most industrialised country in the world, yet this achievement has come at a high price. Millions have left the countryside in search of the rewards of industry located in the urban areas. An already sub-standard and limited infrastructure has pressures placed upon it which it can hardly cope with, shelter being the foremost problem.

Despite the sheer scale of the crisis, I saw enough evidence of positive action in the provision of housing to feel that despite the limited resources available to national government and voluntary organisations, best use was being made of what was available. In the case of Bombay and more especially that of Hyderabad, this concerted move to ease the housing crisis was being coupled with a major initiative to promote self-help amongst the homeless by providing a means of involvement in schemes, with the appropriate back-up and guidance.

In having a positive interest and stake in the development of their locality, however limited it may be, it was obvious through conversations that the chain of dependence was being broken by a restoration of dignity and rights permitting peoples previously unconsulted to play a positive role in their own development. Urban Community Development has over a twenty year period strengthened community organisation and provided a catalyst for social and environmental improvement.

Similar ideas are being advanced in the health sector, particularly on behalf of children, with state governments working in harness again with voluntary organisations and international aid agencies like

UNICEF. The so-called Integrated Child Development Services (ICDS) provide nutrition sanitation, education and health services, and the infrastructure to deliver them.

The development of the voluntary sector, albeit at a low level in western terms, has also spawned community self-help projects such as Seva Mandir in rural and drought-afflicted Rajasthan, where the emphasis is on rural development at a very simple yet important level, which involves tribespeople and unscheduled castes in basic health care and education, initiatives that directly benefit daily life.

In the foreseeable future sufficient resources will simply not be available to deal with the most pressing needs, housing, rural development, provision of water, improved sanitation and health care, yet one can only be positive about the future. India by its very nature tends to triumph in adversity and despite economic, political, social and climatic strains the country is remarkably unified. The serious threat is from outside, Pakistan and China."

ACTIVITIES FOR YOUNG PEOPLE

These are mainly concentrated on the work of the Council for Education in World Citizenship-Cymru (CEWC-Cymru) in the schools and colleges and UNA (Wales) International Youth Service (UNAIYS), which brings volunteers from many countries to Wales and sends British volunteers overseas.

COUNCIL FOR EDUCATION IN WORLD CITIZENSHIP-CYMRU

CEWC-Cymru's varied all-Wales programme in 1987-88 included national and regional conferences, school visits, model United Nations debates and fundraising activities for UNICEF associated with the Sallie Davies Memorial Competition. CEWC-Cymru was closely associated with the Welsh Centre's general activities, students participating in meetings and international guests visiting schools. The Assistant Secretary visited sixty-four schools in different parts of Wales during the year.

Officers

Dr Alun Oldfield-Davies (Cardiff), Professor Glyn O Phillips (Mold), Mr John Watkins (Merthyr) and Mr John David (Radyr) were re-elected, President, Chairman, Vice Chairman and Treasurer, respectively, at the Annual General Meeting on May 7. Mr David succeeded Professor Phillips as CEWC-Cymru representative on the UNA (Welsh Centre) Trust.

WJEC recognises key CEWC-CYMRU initiative

Gwent

Its theme was "Global Interdependence – Presenting Positive Images through Education". It was attended by teachers, advisers and youth workers. The Chairman was County Councillor JL Williams. Mid and South Glamorgan

The general theme was "Priorities for Peace – the Challenge for the Next Decade". Lecturers included Professor John Garnett, The Future of Deterrence, Mr John Levy, The Arab-Israeli Conflict, Mr Frank Evans (OXFAM), Long Term Aid, Dr Alan Williams, UNICEF, and Mr Paul Williams, Dolen Cymru, which organises Wales' twinning with Lesotho. Miss Janet Barlow, Traidcraft, and Rev Tom Evans, Christian Aid, organised simulation exercises. Translation equipment for bi-lingual use was provided by Gwynedd County Council with Mr Bryn Jones and Miss Sioned Eleri interpreting.

UNA (WALES) INTERNATIONAL YOUTH SERVICE

Continuing to build on the expansion of its work, in 1987 International Youth Service organised 26 international voluntary projects in Wales and has expanded its overseas work and contacts.

As a result of IYS international links with similar organisations, 240 volunteers from 20 different countries came to work on community projects in every county of the Principality.

Of the 26 Welsh projects, 10 were playschemes, the majority organised in the economically deprived valleys of Mid Glamorgan. 7 others were conservation schemes which varied from coastal conservation on Ynys Môn to canal reclamation near Neath and scrub clearance on Flat Holm. In Powys, the excavation of a twelfth century castle was continued, while another group of volunteers helped with the staging of the International Eisteddfod at Llangollen. A further two schemes were held in hospitals, another two involved taking disadvantaged children on holiday, in conjunction with the Social Services, and a third group worked with handicapped children in a holiday centre.

As its contribution to the celebrations of the Fiftieth Anniversary of the Temple of Peace, IYS built the first stage of the National Garden of Peace, in the grounds of the Temple. (See page 23). A fortnight later, on September 3, over 200 members of the public enjoyed the first garden party. There will be similar projects in future summer programmes.

IYS also sent out some 130 volunteers to 9 European countries, the United States, Canada, India, Turkey, and 5 African countries. The placement of volunteers in the Third World has been considerably expanded this year, with two organised groups being sent to India in August and October, a smaller group going to Ghana, and individuals travelling to Tunisia, Swaziland, Rwanda and Nigeria.

Contacts with new foreign and national organisations have continued to be fostered. The most significant new link being with the USSR. Two IYS volunteers attended an international peace conference near Moscow and the first Soviet volunteer came to work on the Garden of Peace. IYS also hosted the Chairman of Voroshilograd Soviet in July and agreed to undertake a bilateral exchange with the city in 1989.

Following on from the success of the study themes of the past two years, IYS undertook an international study of the problem of alcohol and drug abuse. All the visiting volunteers were issued with information and questionnaires. On August 8, a Conference was held in the Temple with 60 international volunteers and 8 local experts. The Conference was opened by Councillor F Smith, the deputy Lord Mayor of Cardiff and closed by Mr Alun Michael, MP for Cardiff South and Penarth. A report on the subject, collected from the data from the volunteers and the Conference, is available upon request.

UNICEF

During 1987, £13,485 was raised in Wales for the United Kingdom Committee of the UN Children's Fund.

Volunteer expansion continued with the development of local support groups in Cardiff, Bridgend and Swansea, and the incorporation into UNICEF's Welsh activities of an active branch in Colwyn Bay. The visit of Mr Christopher Bunting, UNICEF's National Development Officer, to Gwynedd and Clwyd also helped to increase support in Bangor and Wrexham. In the schools the launch of the Sallie Davies Competition provided Sixth Formers with the opportunity to visit Lesotho in Southern Africa (See page 36).

During the course of the year a series of Rich Man/Poor Man Lunches was staged by the Welsh Labour Party, County Councils in Clwyd and Gwent and the Borough Councils in Delyn and Wrexham Maelor, raising £1,200. In each instance two thirds of the individuals participating in the event received a bowl of rice and a glass of water whilst the remainder enjoyed a three-course lunch. The continuing support of UNA Branches was appreciated with notable contributions from Rogerstone, Montgomery and Swansea, which staged a special flag day in aid of the victims of the 1986 Mexican earthquake. At the end of 1987 the Executive Officer visited pre-school and health care projects in the Indian cities of New Delhi, Hyderabad and Madras to gain a first hand view of UNICEF's work in the field (See page 25).

THE UNITED KINGDOM FREEDOM FROM HUNGER CAMPAIGN

1988 saw the election as Chairman, of Emeritus Professor Graham Rees (Aberystwyth) in succession to Sir Malcolm Pill who resigned upon being appointed a Justice of the High Court. Sir Malcolm had been Chairman since UKFFHC came to Wales in 1978 and the Committee expressed its deep gratitude for his guidance over the years. Dr Ann Allen (Cardiff) joined the Committee.

New projects supported in 1988 included "Money for Madagascar", £6,000 to support agricultural development in four villages; Harambee '85 Kenya, £1,500 to provide a well; Small Holders Dairying, Zimbabwe, £30,000 for refrigerated bulk tanks and miscellaneous dairy equipment; Kenyan Women's Small Holder Units (in association with FAO Regional Dairy Development and Training Team, Naiwasha), £10,000; Outboard Engine Training for Indian Fishermen, Kerala (in association with Intermediate Technology Development Group), £8,900. The Committee established the Mrs J.T. Morgan, Wales,

Freedom From Hunger Campaign – UK Scholarship, as a result of Mrs Morgan's £5,000 legacy. It is hoped to associate the first award with Lesotho.

WELSH CENTRE COMMITTEE ON LEGAL AFFAIRS

As its contribution to the 50th Anniversary of the Temple of Peace, and also in the year of the 40th Anniversary of the UN Universal Declaration of Human Rights, the Committee under the Chairmanship of Judge David Williams, QC, is holding a Conference at the Temple of Peace on December 2 in conjunction with the Council of Europe's Directorate of Human Rights (Strasbourg) on "The Bill of Rights – Should the Human Rights Convention be incorporated into English Law?". The speakers are: Lord Scarman, Mr Enoch Powell, Professor J.A. Andrews (University College, Aberystwyth) and Mr Andrew Drzemczewski (Strasbourg).

ADVISORY COMMITTEE FOR DEVELOPMENT EDUCATION AND INFORMATION

A Conference was held at the Temple of Peace on March 18 as part of the Council of Europe's North/South Interdependence Campaign on "What is needed to extend an Understanding of North/South Interdependence beyond the Core of the Traditionally Interested and Involved?" Chaired by Professor Glyn O Phillips, Chairman ACDEI, the speakers were: Tom Evans, Christian Aid, "The level of understanding of the North/South issue of volunteer workers for Aid Agencies", Helen Jones, Action Aid, "The National Opinion Poll re attitudes among the general public re Development Education with special reference to Wales", and Gareth Wheatley, North East Wales Institute, "Ways of Associating members of the General Public with organisations traditionally involved in development issues". Arising from the meeting, Mr Wheatley has written a feasibility study, "National Survey of Attitudes towards Development Issues".

INFORMATION/RESOURCE CENTRE

The Centre provides literature on a range of subjects: international affairs, the Third World and development in general, Commonwealth and EEC affairs, and the United Nations agencies. This literature is available for educational and research purposes, and may be loaned for a limited period (some items are available free of charge).

PUBLICATIONS AND PRESS CUTTINGS

The Welsh Centre regularly receives over 60 publications and reports on all aspects of international affairs from the United Nations, and Commonwealth, the EEC and other sources. A press cuttings service is maintained under the following headings: Europe, the Americas, the Communist Bloc, Asia, Middle East, Africa, Disarmament and Trade, United Nations, and Domestic.

REPORTS OF ORGANISATIONS REPRESENTED ON THE CO-ORDINATING COMMITTEE

The organisations represented on the Co-ordinating Committee have made important contributions to the activities of the Welsh Centre, but it has not been felt necessary to refer to them specifically in each case. Summaries of their reports are available on request.

(a) United Nations Association, Welsh National Council

Officers: Professor Harry Hearder, Emeritus Professor of Modern History, University College, Cardiff, was elected President at the Annual Meeting at the Temple of Peace on March 26 in succession to Mr Ivor Richard, QC; Rev D Roy John (Cardiff) was elected Hon Treasurer in succession to Mr Allan Jones (Bridgend) who became Deputy Treasurer. At the Executive Committee meeting on June 18, Mr Geoff Slade, (Cwmbran), was re-elected Chairman. Mr Dale Owen (Penarth) and Mr John Hensman (Pendoylan) were re-elected trustees to the UNA (Welsh Centre) Trust, while Mr Alun Griffiths (Cardiff) and Hon. Jonathan Davies (Abingdon) became Life Trustees. Professor Hearder and Mr Alun George (Neath), were elected as UNA's representatives on the Welsh Centre Co-ordinating Committee.

The following members were re-elected to the Executive Committee for 1988-91; Mrs Irene Chamberlain (Cardiff), Mr Robert Davies (Cardiff), Mr William Davies (Cwmbran), Mr D Gardner (Cwmbran), Mr Alun George (Neath), Mrs S Jones (Chairman, Women's Advisory Council), Mr G Morgan (Cardiff) and Miss Rhiannydd Thomas (Whitchurch).

Membership: At the close of 1987 membership stood at 523, a drop of 48 from 1986. Some branches did not submit figures before the end of the calendar year and this tended to depress the total.

Policy Developments: Issues discussed during the year included South Africa, Afghanistan, The Middle East, Ethiopia, Disarmament and Arms Control and the Special Relationship between the United Kingdom and the United States.

Women's Advisory Council: Four meetings were held during the year. October 3, February 6, May 7 and July 2. Speakers included: Mrs Maria Trigg "The work of the Red Cross", Ms Sheila Smith and Ms Christine McKillop, "UN Association International Youth Service", and Mr Russell Holden "The Welsh Centre for International Affairs and the 50th Anniversary of the Temple of Peace". The Chairman of the Council is Mrs Sylvia Jones (Tonypandy) and the Secretary, Mrs K Bather, (Blackwood).

Twenty-five years after its founding in 1962, FFHC Wales wound up. During that time some £600,000 was raised for projects in all parts of the developing world.
