EDITORIAL

The first edition of Hanes was published in July 1984 under the editorship of David Leslie Davies; this issue is the 27th since that first Newsletter. A glance through past copies will show the diversity and value of the articles, which have appeared since its inception. These have informed, and remain a valuable source of reference to many aspects of local history. The diversity of the material range from the details of a Yeoman's Will of 1546 to the use of the famous London Red Bus on the streets of Aberdare in 1942. It should be remembered however that it is the Society's Newsletter and that the Editor would welcome comments, queries, letters and short articles (of say 500 words.) from members.

Footnote The Tram Wagon

This year marks the 200th anniversary of rail locomotion. In November 1804 a Cornish Engineer, Richard Trevithick, successfully hauled a train of wagons containing 10 tons of iron and 70 men from Merthyr Tydfil to <u>Abercynon</u>. The journey of 9 ¾ miles took 4 hours 5 minutes. The steam engine "Penydarren" travelled at 5m.p.h. <u>The trials of this engine are said to have taken place at Hirwaun (Gardd Aberdar: 1853.)</u>

"I'LL HAVE....."

WORKING CLASS CELEBRATIONS

Continuing this Special Edition's theme of Anniversary and Celebration the following accounts of "happenings" At Aberdare and Hirwaun indicates that a few former inhabitants of the locality required no excuse whatsoever to celebrate, or at lease indulge in debauchery!

April 1833. Early on Tuesday morning April 2nd, two men, William Williams and David Morgan, both in the employ of the Aberdare Iron Company, went out to fight from the beer house kept by Thomas Richard Williams, at Heol-y-Felin, Aberdare, both "perfectly drunk"

They had scarcely grappled together when Williams fell down dead. He was the son of Evan Williams, a respectable farmer, of Llwydcoed.

Morgan was immediately taken into custody. But as the Coroner was in Ireland at the time, the body of the deceased by direction of a jury of the most respectable inhabitants has been inspected by Mr. Forrest and Mr. Evans, two local surgeons.

Both these gentlemen pronounced that Williams certainly died of apoplexy, and Morgan has therefore been released on bail.

It was stated at the inquest that his mother had been at the beer house at *five o 'clock in the morning*, urging her son to come away from that sink of perdition.

More supervision of these beer houses is certainly required. Any "rated inhabitant" on paying his two guineas, can now demand to be licensed.

Hirwaun Common- A correspondent says, "This place is becoming a resort of the drunkard and gambler on the Sabbath day. The hours allowed the licensed victuallers for drawing beer on the Lord's day are now less in number, and of the good results many can bear testimony, but as long as beer is still sold at all hours in the mud, and other cottages around Hirwaun, it will be impossible for the inhabitants to have the full advantage of the late Act. It is a sad spectacle to see some drunk, and others playing "pitch and toss", on the Common surrounding this village nearly on every Sunday throughout the year. The attention of the County Police is earnestly called to put down the growing evil, and to do all in their power to suppress what are termed as "Cwrw bachs", that is the selling of beer on Saturday nights in the cottages without licenses."

(The Cardiff and Merthyr Guardian 19th May 1855.)

If all these celebrations proved too expensive, the people of Aberdare were always able to contact SAMUEL FREEDMAN & SON who advertised that:

"They wished to inform the Public that they had moved to a more commodious shop where they would continue to LEND MONEY upon all kinds of watches, wearing apparel and miscellaneous articles in the same honest and reasonable terms that they had always adopted." This advert carried the following discreet footnote.

NOTE: There is a back entrance through Merchant Street opposite the T.V.R. Station.





In August of this year, young Captain R Fothergill, only son and heir to Mr. R Fothergill, M.P., of Abernant House, attained his majority...Rustic sports were held in the Ynys meadows and in the evening grand displays of fireworks were given, while at Abernant House a grand ball was held. On the 20th of October, the various Sunday schools in the district presented the heir with an address and a bible in honour of the event. On that occasion a procession numbering 10,000 persons proceeded to Abernant Park to make the presentation. (The High Constables of Aberdare, 1894.)

BOOK REVIEWS.

CYNON COAL HAILED AS "BLACK DIAMONDS"

"Moving swiftly on", as the saying goes, the Society's next publication "Chapels of the Cynon Valley", written by our chairman, Alan V. Jones, is well on the way to completion. The first half of the text and Alan's fine collection of photographs were handed over to Gomer Press some time ago (see photo). The final chapters have now been proof-read and are ready to follow, at which point the only remaining task will be to write captions for all the illustrations and to complete the index etc.

The book will be of similar style to "Cynon Coal", but will be considerably thicker, probably in excess of 400 pages, with four or five sections of colour photographs. The launch of the book will be at the Cynon Valley Museum at 7pm. on the 12th. November next.

"RING OUT WILD BELLS..."

The theme of this special edition of Hanes is celebration. The ringing of Church bells has long been associated with joyous occasions and our own splendid town bells have, since 1858, played their part in celebrating important national and local events. The inauguration of those very bells was itself a matter of celebration and the story of this event taken from The Aberdare Parish Magazine of March 1980 is set out below;

It was clearly a matter of great joy in Aberdare when, on July 31st 1858, the bells were "inaugurated" for a contemporary report claims this to have been "perhaps the greatest event that has taken place in the town."

It would, however appear that a bell was hung when the church was first built, for a report of the funeral of George Rowland Morgan of Gadlys House, refers to the "tolling of the great bell of St. Elvan's." That was in 1856.

In 1857, Mr.Sherbourne- a local jeweller, who was then the church organist - was responsible for suggesting and organising a subscription list for the purchase of a ring of bells and a public clock.

It had been reported that the Dedication of the Church had been a formal and solemn occasion, but the "opening" of the bells was a festal occasion enjoyed by all the people for the bells were Parish bells and not exclusive to members of the church.

It was a beautiful July morning. All business had been suspended, and every kind of vehicle had been chartered to bring the curious from Treforest and Mountain Ash to see the village brilliantly decorated with flags, banners, festoons, flowers and bunting.

A procession formed at 11 a.m. headed by Crawshay Bailey's Band, followed by the police; a Company of the Royal Welsh Fusiliers; The Royal Artillery, the Churchwardens and clergy in full canonicals, the Bells Committee and the children of the parish "perambulated the principal streets for nearly an hour." The various bodies then proceeded to the Temperance Hall for refreshments, and the 891 children were encouraged by the Vicar (The Rev.John Griffith) to "spare no exertion in the disposal of the tea and cakes. The Aberdare Band joined Aberaman Ironworks' Band and selections were played during the proceedings.

Games followed on a field called Graig-y-Mynach (loaned by Thomas Wayne) and Jonkey racing, jumping in sacks, football etc.were the order of the day. Competitors climbed a pole in an attempt to reach a leg of mutton "but up to six o'clock it remained in its pride alone."

The bells were rung for the first time, and throughout the day, by ringers from Painswick in Gloucestershire. They were celebrated for their virtuosity.

The cost of the bells was £435.7.2p. They consist of a ring of eight and were cast at Whitechapel Bell Foundry. The bells vary in weight from 5 cwts. to 17 cwts.

The bells are inscribed with the names of the Vicar and Churchwardens and the inscription "Rhodd y plwyfolion er clod I Dduw (A gift to this Parish in Praise of God). As "Pen Dar" once wrote "The bells will always speak in Welsh!"
