A husband, a father, a friend and, above all a good doctor.

Rupendra Kumar Majumdar whom we fondly called Rupenda made a home in the society he lived in as he did, in all our hearts. His personality oozed magnanimity and he remained true to his code of morality as was befitting of a gentleman of his era.

Born in India in the summer of 1933 Rupenda, the youngest in his family was doted to

bits. Having had the luxury of an affluent family he went through the rigours of formal education and in the late 50s qualified as a medic from National Medical College in Kolkata. As life sped on an insatiable urge to explore new worlds led him to the shores of England in the early 60s. After the preliminary years of adjustments, his nomadic life took refuge in beautiful Wales.

In 1966 Rupenda tied the knot of a long lasting matrimonial liaison with the most beautiful Jharnadi. He was later blessed with two bright boys who today hold their own in personality and loyalty.

Rupenda's home was not just going to be fettered to his immediate family, as his contagious and cheeky smile endeared him to all, stretching his social boundaries and tearing down walls of doubt. He marched up the social ladder holding hands of approval and finally in the early to mid 70s he became the pioneer lead in the inception of Wales Puja Committee. His contributions to WPC have been phenomenal. He had a major contribution in making WPC a charity. Over decades of Puja one could always see him in the front seat and with an infectious smile. Indeed, he was our most senior Trustee.

There are multiple facets to a man's personality and Rupenda was no exception. He loved company and you could hear him a pitch over the others in his own lovable way.

He loved his food and never said no to a tipple. He treated life well and in return, life treated him well. His house remained the hub of many social activities and a place for countless 'Addas' (informal chit-chat & banters).

Who was to know, that one day, his bellowing laughter would cease and you'd never get to see his indomitable smile again. After a protracted period of ill health the giant gave in. But, he lives on, 'Proud' in death as he was in life.

Rupenda you live within us and will remain there till our last days. We love you dearly and pay our homage to your magical life.


My heart felt congratulations to all that were involved in the epic project. Well done all.

My Impressions of the Heritage Project and Clay Image Making

Last summer I got the opportunity to help coordinate some visits by local schools such as Radyr Comprehensive to see the heritage project in action. Having recently left school, I acted as a bridge between the artists and WPC volunteers and the students.

Religious Education in school always left me with a wondering. Despite my own knowledge of Hinduism being somewhat limited, even I could tell that a lot of teaching in RE was rather polarised and old fashioned. Therefore, it was so refreshing for me to see schools directly engaging with the modern Hindu community within Cardiff. If it wasn't for my Bengali background I would have never learned about Durga Puja as larger festivals such as Diwali would remain the centre of focus. I am so happy that the heritage project has shed so much positive exposure on our vibrant and cherished festival. Although during my time at school we had taken school trips to temples, it was usually a case of being led through various rooms and talked at. I'm sure the chance to speak to the artists and make their own clay sculptures must have been very engaging for the students in contrast. Talking to the students confirmed this, with the female students really inspired by the strong and powerful woman depicted in the form of Ma Durga. The clay image making was an amazing experience for these students who weren't aware before the project that such a traditional art form existed. Even for someone like me who has celebrated Durga Puja every year and participated actively whenever possible, this was a huge and inspiring learning experience. Seeing how much time and effort the artists put into making the idols and how everyone was so keen to contribute to the process really reinforced how important and beloved the festival is to people.

As a citizen of Cardiff I also experienced joy in seeing the Butetown History Arts Centre being revived one final time. The centre was facing closure due to lack of funding and when we arrived it was in a sorry state. However, after sprucing it up, draping the walls in Welsh and Indian flag bunting and with the smell of incense wafting through it was easy to appreciate what a great space it was.

Having grown up in Britain all my life, not speaking fluent Bengali and having few Bengali friends my age, I have often found it hard to connect with my background. Through dancing at Durga Puja and WPC events I had managed to feel more grounded but when I stopped doing this as A levels and university took over I was left once more feeling a bit out

of place. The heritage project has allowed me to immerse myself in the Bengali community and really helped me reconnect with Hinduism and my roots. I am so glad and grateful to the Wales Puja Committee for having let me have this experience.

Thank you WPC for this.
