

The will of Richard Bassett, yeoman, of Llanblethian dated 24th., January 1737.

To his servant maid, Mary Cole, the feather bed in the little room below with appurtenances, a little brass pot and kettle next to the best, a crock and a little possnet with a bow to hang it by, two pewter dishes and six spoons, two joint stools standing under the great table, a box lying in the chamber with R and B on the side and all that is in it, all his late wife's wearing apparel, a trestle lying in the chamber and £2 per annum paid quarterly and a further £5 to be paid to her and her heirs within six months of his death.

To his nephew Richard Lewis £1 1s. on condition that he consented to Bassett being buried in the grave of his first wife Ann Crook. The executors are given consent to buy a grave stone.

To his nephew Richard Bassett 11 acres of customaryhold land and after his death to his son Richard Bassett and his heirs.

To the poor of Llanblethian £1 to be distributed at Christmas.

To the poor of Cowbridge £1 in similar manner.

All the rest of his goods to his nephew Richard Bassett as executor.

In the Name of god amen I Richard Bassett of the parish of Llanblethian and diocese of Llandaff a man being in good health of body and of sound and perfect memory thanks be to god for it doe make and ordaine this my last will and testament in manner and forme following first of all I commend my soul into the hands of almighty god who gave it: and I commit my body to earth to indecent manner out of discretion of my executors hereafter named: and as for all such temporall estate as it hath pleased almighty god to bestow upon me I give and dispose ther eof as followeth:

First I will that my debts and fine i all charged shall be paid and discharged: Item I doe give and bequeath to Mary Cole my servant Moid one feather bed that is in the little room below with all things belonging to it and also one little brass pot and little nest to ge best and one broch and a little posonit with a bow to it to hang it and two pewter dishes and six spoons and also two joint stools standing under ~~the great table~~ and likewise I give to afore said Mary Cole one box lying in y<sup>e</sup> chamber with R and B on y<sup>e</sup> side and all that is within it and also woolen and likewise one trystel lying in y<sup>e</sup> chamber: and also I doe give to fore sd Mary Cole y<sup>e</sup> sum of two pounds per annum during her naturall life to be paid quarterly by my executor hereafter named and likewise the sum of five pounds to be paid to y<sup>e</sup> foresd Mary <sup>within</sup> six months after my decease to her and her heirs for ever Item I do give and bequeath to my Nephew Richard Lewis y<sup>e</sup> sum of one pound one shilling upon condition that my body by his consent shall be buried ~~in~~ in y<sup>e</sup> grave of my first wife June Cook and that my executor is to have consent to lay a grave stone over me stonell

I doe give to my Nephew Richard Bassett eleven acres of customary hold land during his naturall life and after his <sup>to</sup> y<sup>e</sup> use and behoof of Richard Bassett his son: and his customary heirs for ever lastly I doe give to y<sup>e</sup> poor of y<sup>e</sup> parish Llanblethian y<sup>e</sup> sum of one pound to be distributed y<sup>e</sup> chymage after my decease and also to y<sup>e</sup> poor of y<sup>e</sup> town of Cowbridge y<sup>e</sup> same: all y<sup>e</sup> rest and residue of my personal goods and chattels whatsoever I do give and bequeath to my Nephew Richard Bassett full and sole executor of this my last will and testament and ~~so forth~~ In witness whereof I have sett my hand and seal this twenty fourth day of January in the year of our lord 1736
