Breach Farm, Llanblethian

A classic example of a direct entry house of the mid-17th and 18th century. The gabled dormer windows were a typical Glamorgan feature.

About 1.8km W of Llanblethian, and 300m S of road.

History

C17, and circa 1800. See reconstruction drawing, and photo in RCAHM Inventory.

Exterior

A two-unit, one-and-a half storeyed house with symmetrical front. Stone (rendered), slate roof, end chimneys in brick. Central doorway covered by large porch with catslide roof. Two gabled dormers with 2-light mullion and transom windows under hoodmoulds. On ground floor, similar 3-light window to 1, 2-light window to R. To L, added block with one narrow window to each floor. To R, long attached agricultural range, stone, corrugated roof. To rear, at right angles, kitchen block with large brick chimney to N gable; 2 windows, one-and-a-half storeys, upper windows in small dormers, door under lean-to porch. Outshut rears ro main and service blocks.

Interior

Internally there have been some alterations but the main beams survive. The stone stairway was made wider when a rear kitchen was added.

Listed

A well-preserved example of an early gable chimneyed house, rare in Glamorgan.

Settlement on the lands of Breach farm occurred as early as the Bronze Age. The road from Cross Inn to Nash cut through a number of tumuli or burial mounds; excavation of one of these round barrows in 1937 showed that the turf and clay mound enclosed a circular stone wall. This in turn surrounded a central cremation pit containing bronze implements and flint arrowheads. The finds are now in the National Museum at Cardiff.

The farmhouse, a grade II listed building, is of mid seventeenth century date, with gabled dormer windows. Its nicely carved doorway is covered with a porch, to the left of which a three-light window, with

stone mullions and hoodmoulds, gives light onto the hall or main ground-floor room of the house. Internally, stone stairs, beams and a clay bake-oven add to the charm of the house.

The first reference that we find to Breach is in the will of Robert Savours 'of Breach', which was proved in 1711; the house stayed in the possession of the Savours family until well into the nineteenth century. Throughout most of the eighteenth century, the occupants were the Williams family, originally of Llysworney. John Williams (1700-1785), son of Henry Williams of Llanishen, gentleman, lived there in 1721; he had married Mary Jenkins of Stembridge. As well as his lease of Breach, he also leased land in Llysworney, St Mary Church and Newton Nottage, and as the Carne fortunes declined, he acquired more and more land in Llysworney. He was friendly with Howell Harris, one of the fathers of Welsh Methodism, and also helped to arrange for one of the circulating schools of Gruffydd Jones to be held in Llanblethian (1738-39) and Llysworney (1757-58). Of their children, Elizabeth married Robert Taynton of Cowbridge, a naval lieutenant, while Thomas, who attended Jesus College, Oxford, became headmaster of Cowbridge Grammar School on the resignation of Daniel Durel, and held that post until his death in 1783.

It would seem that after the death of John Williams, the subsequent occupants were William Hopkin in the rest of the eighteenth century, and then Edward Lewis between 1804 and 1821. A deed of 1809 describes the house as 'a messuage, one barn, one stable, one orchard, three gardens... called The Breach'.

By 1840, it was being farmed as part of Hugh Entwisle's Marlborough estate, with no named occupant of the house. In the 1851 census, however, the resident farmer (of 77 acres) was Daniel Thomas of St Bride's. 1861 saw Richard Howell of Cadoxton, Neath, there with his wife, two sons and two servants. Richard and his wife died in 1864 and 1865 respectively, but the farm was taken over by the sons, with Rees Howell named as head of household in 1871. William Jenkins and David Evans were tenants for a short time, before Morgan Griffiths, from Maesteg, who came in about 1880. Henry Jones, born in Llysworney, and his wife Elizabeth from Llanblethian, had taken over by 1884; in the 1891 census they are shown as having one domestic servant and two farm servants. The Joneses were still farming Breach in 1906, though by 1913 George Rees had taken over. Then for a short time it was leased by Owen Williams as part of his large Crossways estate.

The last tenuous link with the Savours family as owners was severed with the death of Anne Howe of St Mary Church in 1886 (a Joseph How had married a Mary Savours at the turn of the eighteenth/nineteenth century), when it passed to the Morgans of Woolcombe in Somerset. In 1930 it was purchased by Glamorgan County Council as one of their smallholdings, and only reverted to private ownership towards the end of the twentieth century.

1721 John Williams married Mary Jenkins 'Mr Williams and Miss Jenkins. His father was a lawyer and lived in the large house outside Penllyn gates. Their son ran away with Miss Jenkins of Stembridge. they were married at Llandaff and Llanblethian and went to Llandaff fair -

he took his wife home to his father's house: but the father said "If you choose to take a wife without consulting me, you must find a home for her without consulting me". Breach Farm being vacant they took that and lived there for 60 years - and 10 children who married, some up and some down.

Although Mr Jenkins turned his daughter out for marrying John Williams he went to live with them afterwards at Breach and died there'

John Williams was 21, his wife 20. Their children's deaths, buried at Llysworney, are listed as — Mary, died 1726 aged 4, Eleanor, died aged 2 1726, Thomas, died aged a few months, Mary, died 1777 aged 44, Ann, died aged55 in 1795 and Jennetta, died 1816 aged 73. Buried at Cowbridge was Thomas, who died 1783 aged 53 (Revd Thomas Williams) and Elizabeth, died 1814 aged 76. Buried at Cardiff was another Eleanor who died 1813 aged 87, and buried in Quebec, Canada was Jenkin, died 1819 aged 84.

Eleanor, who died in 1813, was married to Thomas Lewis of Llandaff in 1761. He died in 1776 aged 48. From John Edmondes of Ewenny family notes

** Notes on Anne Williams

In 2013 Breach was visited by a Mr and Mrs Dickinson from Swindon. He had come across an 18th century book in his area written by Anne Williams and was intrigued to find out more about her.

He described the book: 'The book itself is not a journal a commercially printed almanac and ladies pocket book, one of a series published by Cardanus Rider in the second half of the eighteenth century. ...consists of two parts bound together ('Rider's Merlin 1776' and 'The British Ladies Complete Pocket Memorandum Book for 1776'). Between the two is a foldout engraving of the coronation of Louis XVI of France in 1775. The book seems to be a high-quality item with a cover of red tooled leather and a silver clasp on the back, which would probably have been used originally to hold the covers together with cords.....there are two thin card pockets inside each cover (? for visiting cards). On the outside page of the front pocket is the name plate - 'Miss Ann Williams of Breach, Glamorganshire'. The book holds a lot of fascinating information and insights into genteel life at the time Complete calendar for the year with gardening tips, lists of historical events, roads and fairs, a description of the latest fashions, country dances and new songs....just three pages have hand-written lists of accounts. Some of these are in pencil and not easy to read, but the clearest is in black ink and reads 'Chipping Norton bill no. 220 for £21/ Wapshott, Palmer, Matthews and Palmer/ Messrs. Down, Thornton and Free bankers London/ 5 August 1791/ draft 10 days after date'.'

Brian James subsequently researched this record — Wapshott, Palmer, Matthews and Palmer were the local bankers in Chipping Norton, and Down, Thornton and Free were London bankers at 1 Bartholomew Lane where their bills (cheques) were payable (source: Universal British directory, vol 2).

He recorded also the memorial to Ann Lewis (nee Williams) in Llysworney church – 'This last tribute is credited to the memory of Ann Lewis, wife of the Revd David Lewis MA, Vicar of St Donats and Pentyrch in this County and daughter of the above John and Mary Williams, who died 14 November 1796 aged 55 years.

Also of the said (David Lewis) who died 12 July 1806 aged 68 years.'
