1950s Then called Rosedew, the house was occupied by W H James, in the next house (going west) was her 'Auntie Polly'; in the house after that lived her uncle, Frank James;

and in the following house was Oswald James.

Robert Thomas the builder built the terraced row to the west of Rosedew, and the bungalows opposite. His daughter Dulcie, born in Llanblethian, died in 1942. Gillian Egan was named 'Dulcie' after her.

Gillian Egan, nee James (daughter of WH James, above –she and her family lived in Hillside, Mount Ida)

Ca 1955 The house was bought by 'Doug' Stokes (William Douglas Haydn Stokes), who made extensive alterations. He had been brought up in Pontyclun and had attended Cowbridge Grammar School as a day pupil, travelling by train. During WW2, he became a prisoner of war by the Germans, but managed to escape. Afterwards, on moving to this area, he worked as a clerk in the Midland bank before moving to live in Surrey. Opposite Greystones at that time was just a field.

His son, Nigel Stokes, gave this information in 2017 when, after his father's death, he was sorting out his Cowbridge history books to give to the History Society. As a boy, Nigel had attended Mrs Morgan's private school (Llwyncelyn, High St), where he recalled her young daughter Jane.
