I am directly descended from Edward CADOGAN (born 02/11/17 Lt

Col in the East India Company and was believed to have bee either Cowbridge or Carmarthen.

Edward was one of the children of William CADOGAN (apothec born ca 1740 and was married to Elizabeth PRINCE.

William was one of the children of John CADOGAN (born 1713 apothecary in Cowbridge and married to Ann HERBERT.

John CADOGAN was the child of Roger CADOGAN (Doctor) and J USK. John had an older brother named William who was als and

was known as the father of childrens medicine. John also Ann

CADOGAN - she may be the one mentioned in the book "Cowbri Buildings

Dear Ashlev.

My computer has been U/S for some time but it has at least given me a bit more time to dig up your ancestors!

In Cowbridge, Mrs Ann Cadogan was taxed on a house in the Limes in 1773; she was probably the AC who was buried on 23/2/1781, aged 71. William Cadogan paid window tax on probably the same house in 1773/4. The will of Ann Cadogan of 1792 complicates things as she was described as a spinster - she left her house in The Limes to Mary Morgan of Cowbridge, widow, her niece, and then to her son John Morgan. Mary Morgan died in 1820 and left 43 High Street to her nephew George Cadogan Morgan of Bridgnorth, Shropshire. A Mrs Cadogan also paid the burgage rents to the Lord of the manor (so she was probably the owner) for 45 High St Cowbridge in 1806.

You probably have baptism records for Edward and Elizabeth, chn of Wm and Elizabeth, 03/12/1787 and 19/13/1790 respectively; and burials of Anne, 11/07/1753 and John, surgeon/apothecary, 28/03/1755. There is also a deed when Anne Cadogan of Coychurch, spinster, leased land in Cowbridge from Anne Carne (back to the Limes, here, think). I haven't checked any Coychurch deeds.

There is a 1788 document written by Robert Nicholl, of one of Glamorgan's gentry families. It is a partial family tree, starting with 'Mr Thomas, Tregrose (Tregroes, Pencoed - very near Coychurch)'who lived in the time of Oliver Cromwell'.

Wm Cadogan's children: 'several sons and daughters'.

I can't vouch for the accuracy of this, but Robert Nicholl certainly included the cadogans among the ranks of the great and good.

Thank you for your Email.

Unfortunately there are very few records relating to the pupils of the Grammar School. Apart from the Golden Book which has the names of some of the scholars whose work was considered good enough to be inserted in the book, there are only some scrappy notes made by a headmaster in, I believe, the 1860s - far too late for you. I have recently discovered in Oxford the list for 1848, again of little use.

George Cadogan Morgan is mentioned in Iolo Davies's book on CGS (matric, Jesus C, Oxford, 1771; gained reputation as scientific writer; 'Lectures in Chemistry' pub 1794. died after inhaling poisonous fumes from a chem expt in 1798.)

However there is also another Geo Cadogan Morgan who owned a property in Cowbridge from 1820 on and was the grandson of Mary Morgan of Cowbridge; Mary's 2 chn were John and James but I do not know which one was GC's father. In 1788, John was 'one of the Gloucester exhibitioners in Pembroke Coll, Oxford', and James 'now settled as clerk to Mr Wallace the eminent solicitor in Chancery'. Dear Mr Alden.

Your name has been given to me by the Information Centre in Bridgend as a contact for the Cowbridge Record Society. I am engaged in some research into my Welsh ancestors, one of which was William Morgan 1750-1833. He was born in Bridgend and subsequently moved to London where he became the first actuary of the Equitable Assurance Society.

His younger brother, George Cadogan Morgan, I know was a pupil at Cowbridge Grammar School where I believe he became head boy. However, I have been unable to trace where William was educated though it seemed likely that he attended the same school.

I wondered whether your Society has records of the school rolls for that time and if so whether you could confirm or discount this suggestion.
