	This cottage is shown on the tithe map (c. 1843) as a stable, with a small garden. It was built in a corner of one of the 'Porrocks' (Paddocks), which otherwise remained as grazing land until the 1920s, when a row of bungalows was built. There was a dwelling adjoining 25 Westgate (Ivy House) in the 1891 Census, occupied by Emma Dawe, a widow with four children and two lodgers. It is not known if the stable had been converted into a house in the 1880s or if there was a rebuilding. The residents from the 1920s to the 1940s were Johnson Miles and family. He was a prominent local politician, mayor of Cowbridge in 1935 and a Glamorgan county alderman.	Brian James

A native of Carmarthen, he was 71 years of age and came to Cowbridge in 1919. At the age of 15, he became a coal miner, eventually becoming a checkweigher in the Pontyclun district.
