St Curig's Church, Porthkerry



St Curig's Church in Porthkerry is situated in the heart of the hamlet with a footpath leading to Porthkerry Park. A church has been on the present site since the 13th century, part of the church building dating back to that time, with the tower being added later, in the 16th century.

The tower houses 6 bells, unusual for a church the size of St Curig's and two of them date back to the 16th century. A cross, believed to be pre-Reformation stands in the churchyard, though sadly damaged. Porthkerry's coastal location led to the churchyard being used in the past as a burial ground for casualties of the treacherous waters of the Bristol Channel. There are gravestones for three unknown sailors in the

churchyard. St Curig's church was visited by John Wesley on three occasions when he preached in this area. He was a friend of the then inhabitants of Fonmon Castle and stayed both there and at the Dowager House of the estate (now the Fontygary Inn).



St Cattwg, Llanmaes

Dedicated to St Cadoc (St Cattwg), the present building dates from the 13th century but there is an earlier, Celtic foundation.

It is a Grade 2* listed and retains a rare wooden screen, the surviving part of the original wooden rood screen; a massive Norman font; a medieval wall painting and registers (dating from 1583) showing a number of people who are reputed to have lived to be more than a hundred years old!






This simple 12th C church, originally dedicated to St. Samson, has some outstanding Norman features.

Ewenny Priory is the most complete and impressive Norman church in South Wales and one of the finest examples of a fortified church building in Europe. It was completed by 1126; in 1141 it became a Priory of the Benedictine Abbey of St Peter, Gloucester.

The nave of the Priory, with its rounded arches and thick pillars, is in use as the parish church.

The Pulpitum Screen, dividing the two parts of the church, is the work of Alexander Beleschenko, and was installed in July 2006. The eastern or monastic end contains the tombs of the de Londres family, a medieval altar and a reproduction of the watercolour of the Priory painted by J.P.W. Turner in 1795. Much of the Priory's outer defensive walls and towers remain. Not only did they protect the Priory, but played a part in the Norman subjection of South Wales.

St Bridget of Kildare, one of the three major saints of Ireland, is said to have visited here in the 6th century, en route to Glastonbury, and founded a Christian community.

The Norman origins of St Bridget's Church are seen in the round-headed chancel and porch arches. The church was rebuilt in the 14th century and heavily restored in 1851.

Of particular interest are the monuments in the chancel to the Butler and Wyndham families. A 13th century incised slab shows Sir John le Botiler in full armour; a 16th century tomb-chest of John and Jane Butler has the couple lying recumbent, he in armour, with their children as 'weepers' shown on the side.






Being one of the oldest Christian sites in the UK, a continuity of Christian worship has been witnessed here for over 1500 years.

Holy Cross can be found at the heart of the medieval streets of Cowbridge and although the fabric of the building has been added to over the years, it is its large buttressed tower that surprises most visitors. Why was it built?

Its white rendering appears stark against the traditional grey of the rest of the stonework and as the tower is crowned by an eight-sided parapet, it looks fortified - but is it misleading?

Holy Cross was not a grand defensive structure and in fact, began life as a 'church of ease', acting as a

minor place of worship to the larger parish of Llanblethian.

Edward Lhwyd, appointed Keeper of the Ashmolean Museum at Oxford in 1690, journeyed through Wales and noted that it was believed that at around 1480, the Tower of Cowbridge was struck by lightning which incinerated the spire.

The spire was believed to have been made of a framing of wood covered with lead. If there was once such a spire, the Tower would have had a very different appearance.


