The new vicar of Cowbridge, the Revd Gwilym Williams, sees his new post as an 'exciting challenge'. Coming from the parish of St Margaret's at Mountain Ash - an area heavily dependent on the mining industry, and consequently suffering with high unemployment - to this area with its very different problems, the Vicar feels that he needs to adapt his preaching. To do this successfully, he considers it necessary to first discover the special needs of the community, and to identify with them.

Rev Gwilym Williams was born in Porthmadog in North Wales. He studied Welsh at university college, Lampeter, and later - in preparation for his career in the Church - read Theology at Cardiff. He had intended working in the Church since the age of fourteen, and was so determined, that when his local vicar advised him to study Greek, and he found he was unable to do so at school, he took lessons in the subject each morning before going to school.

Rev Williams is married with two sons, one studying Maths and Computer Science at University College, Cardiff; the other, aged 12 informed us with a knoing smile that he goes to the Bishop of Llandaff school. He quickly added that this is purely because he transferred directly from one church school to another!

In his spare time, kev Williams enjoys reading, campanology and watching sport - especially rugby which he used to play. He enjoys 'good music' - both classical and modern - and hopes to make music a more important part of church services in the future. At the moment, most of his free time is taken up learning about the history of Cowbridge and Ilamblethian.

He was pleasantly surprised to find that a strong community feeling, such as he had experienced in Mountain Ash, exists in cowbridge. He has already become aware of our pride in the traditions of the town, and the strong community involvement, and feels that the church could play a larger role here, firstly by making church buildings available

particularly for young people. Asked if this would be a definite step towards encouraging people back into the church after the recent decline, Rev Williams retorted that if one were to examine the facts correctly, "Church life is not declining. Church life is growing." He added that he would love to debate this with anyone should they disagree.

Some changes are planned for his parish, and he also looks forward to a close association with Rev Barrie Petterson of Ramoth Church. One of the envisaged changes is the introduction of services in Welsh, his first language, and he also hopes for better communication with the young. Rev Williams! ultimate aim, however, is to make Holy Cross a family church.

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Fishings 3

The interest in fishing in the
Cowbridge area is quite considerable,
mainly due to the range of fishing
opportunities the river Thaw has
to offer. There is game fishing for
trout from March to September, and
sea fishing at Aberthaw, famous for
its mullet and bass.

Of course there have to be restrictions to prevent overfishing. These come in the form of licences and size limits - any trout under 8" long have to be thrown back. Fly fishermen are at an advantage here, because as the fish take the fly, the hook gets caught in the lip - and so if the fish are undersize, the hook can be removed easily and the trout returned to the water. Worms, and their hooks, are usually swallowed, and so the fish, whatever the size, has to be killed to retrieve the hook. So fly fishing is not only more skilful, it serves the interests of conservation much better!

There are about eleven fishing waters in South Glamorgan, but the most popular for the Cowbridge youngsters seems to be the three fields at Llanblethian. The Cowbridge and District Angling Association has the fishing rights from several riparian owners, and they stock the river every year, an expensive process. Thus there is keen interest in fishing from all age groups in the area; but one word of warning to non-swimmers - downstream of Gigman Bridge there are many deep pools, so please be careful!


