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## CRYNODEB

Daeth Prydain yn rhan o'r fasnach caethweision ar ddechrau'r 1600oedd, gan gipio Affricanwyr, eu llwytho ar long fel cargo wedi'u rhwymo, a mynd â nhw (os oeddynt yn dal i fod yn fyw) yn America neu India'r Gorllewin. Daethpwyd â rhai o'r Affricanwyr a gipiwyd yma i'r wlad hon. Cadwodd rhai Cymry, oedd yn berchen ar blanhigfeydd tybaco neu siwgr yn India'r Gorllewin, gannoedd o gaethweision, gan adeiladu eu cestyll yng Nghymru ar gefn caethwasiaeth, fel teulu cyfoethog y Pennantiaid yng nghastell Penrhyn, ger Bangor. Roedd teulu enwog o Abertawe, teulu'r De La Beche, yn berchen ar blanhigfeydd a chaethweision yn Jamaica. Roedd Thomas Eaton hefyd yn berchennog caethweision nodedig. Mae strydoedd yn Abertawe wedi'u henwi ar eu hôl.



Hynt a helynt dyn ifanc yw hwn, a aned i fyd caethwasiaeth ar blanhigfa'n bell i ffwrdd yn America, ac a gafodd ei hun yn Abertawe. Nid oedd ffordd yn y byd iddo wybod mai gan Abertawe 'roedd un o'r Cymdeithasau Atal Caethwasiaeth ymroddedig mwyaf yng Nghymru.



Ganed Willis y caethwas, nid dyna oedd ei enw ef ond enw ei berchennog, yn 1813. Nid ydym yn gwybod unrhyw beth am ei fywyd cynnar heblaw am ei fod yn gaethwas yn un o blanhigfeydd cotwm y de, yn Kentucky neu Carolina, mae'n debyg. Roedd Americanwyr Affricanaidd yn gaethweision yn y de; ond yn y gogledd, roeddynt yn rhydd. I'r caethweision hynny a oedd yn ddigon dewr i geisio dianc, golyga rhyddid y byddai'n rhaid croesi Afon Ohio, a oedd yn gyflym ac yn llydan ac yn rhannu Kentucky'r dalaith dal caethweision (y de), oddi wrth Ohio a thaleithiau rhyddid y gogledd ar y lan gyferbyn. Prif dref Ohio ar lannau'r afon yn oes Willis oedd Cincinnati, gyda'i agerlongau padlo a gludodd nwyddau i lawr i New Orleans. Heddiw, mae agerlongau padlo Cincinnati'n cynnal teithiau i dwristiaid.



## CYN RHYDDYD

Hefyd, Cincinnati oedd y dref y mudodd Anna Margareta Donaldson a Jessie (Heineken) Donaldson, ymgyrchwyr atal caethwasiaeth, iddi ym 1822 a 1854. Roedd y ddwy ddynes (modryb a nith) yn rhedeg tai diogel i gaethweision oedd yn dianc ar lannau'r Afon Ohio yn eu cartrefi "Frandon" (ar ôl Francis Donaldson, gŵr Anna Margareta), "Penmaen" (Tŷ mab Anna, a enwyd ar ôl fferm y teulu yn Nhrefynwy), a "Clermont", tŷ newydd Jessie Donaldson. Mae "Frandon" a "Penmaen" yn sefyll hyd heddiw. Nid oes unrhyw un wedi dod o hyd i "Clermont" (eto).



Rhedodd Willis i ffwrdd o'i blanhigfa ym 1832 pan oedd yn 19 neu 20 oed ac yn lle mynd tuag at yr Afon Ohio a cheisio ei chroesi tua'r gogledd, dewisodd deithio ar hyd yr afon tua'r de i New Orleans, taith a gymerodd lawer o fisoedd ar droed. Ym mhorthladd prysur New Orleans, teithiodd Willis yn gudd ar gludwr mwyn copr, â'i gyrchfan oedd Abertawe, i ddadlwytho'i gargo ar gyfer y gwaith copr yn Landore.

Heddiw, mae Cincinnati'n falch i gael y 'National Underground Railroad Freedom Center (a agorwyd yn 2004) ar lannau ei hafon, sy'n adrodd hanesion bywyd ar blanhigfeydd, a'r caethweision a helpodd adeiladu America. Nawr, mae straeon Willis, Jessie ac Anna Margareta yn rhan o'r archifau yn yr NURFC.

en he as ed en of is- ng as to in- ke rs, to e- tis ia- ry, Ye	<p style="text-align: center;"><b>EMANCIPATION OF A SLAVE AT SWANSEA.</b>—A short time since, the <i>St. Peter</i> (H. Mickle, master), a large American ship, arrived at this port from Cobija, in Chili; with copper ore; and on Thursday the 24th ult., a very fine young negro, about 20 years of age, of the name of <i>Willis</i>, applied to T. Edw. Thomas, Esq., Portreeve, stating that he was a slave acting as cook on board the <i>St. Peter</i>; that he had accidentally heard, that if he could but put his foot upon British ground, he would then be free, and requested advice upon this point. Mr. T. instantly sent to the ship to ascertain whether Willis really had been a slave on board such vessel, but as the Captain was not to be met with at the instant, the worthy Magistrate lost no time in assuring the poor fellow, that by the laws of this happy country, he was emancipated—that he was no longer a slave!!! This gratifying information naturally gave the most heartfelt delight to all present, but more especially to Willis, who for the first moment of his life, felt that he was a free man!!! The following morning, as he would not return on board, he had a written discharge from the ship, and as he was not entitled to any wages, the Captain generously gave him two sovereigns. Willis belonged to the ship owners, and it will be gratifying to the friends of humanity to learn, that during the nine years he had served in the bonds of slavery, he had no complaint to make against his former or his present master, but that, on the contrary, he had experienced every indulgence and kindness compatible with his situation. JUBILEE SONGS.

It will be observed that in most of these songs the first strain is of the nature of a  
chorus or refrain, which is to be sung after each verse. The return to this chorus  
should be made without breaking the time.

In some of the verses the syllables do not correspond exactly to the notes in the  
music. The adaptation is so easy that it was thought best to leave it to the skill of  
the singer rather than to confuse the eye by too many notes. The music is in each  
case carefully adapted to the first verse. Whatever changes may be necessary in  
singing the remaining verses will be found to involve no difficulty.
