	Census returns of 1871 show Solomon Warren was born in Marnhull, Dorset about 1831. The Marnhull census	
	for 1851 shows him and his father James as agricultural	
	labourers at Great Devon farm there. His brother	
	Samuel was already in Cowbridge at that date, aged 20	
	and lodging in Town Hall buildings, and Solomon and	
	James followed him there. James took lodgings with	
	Samuel and his eventual family in High St., dying aged	
	69 in 1867. Samuel Warren's first wife was Hannah	
	Jackson, daughter of Cowbridge painter and decorator	
	Thomas Jackson.	
	The 1861 census shows Soloman and Jane Warren, 27	
	and 20 years respectively, and he described as a	
	housepainter and journeyman (an employed worker)	
	living at the far end of Westgate.	
	From Cowbridge parish records and Board School	
	records, their children appear to have been: Anne Jane

	Cowbridge parish records show a Margaret	
	Louisa Warren, daughter of Soloman Warren, painter,	
	marrying Henry Griffiths, butcher of Cowbridge on	
	September 1st 1897.	
	Evan Warren appeared in the 1912 Western Mail Street	
	directory as a 'decorator' in Cardiff Road, two years	
	after the last reference to Soloman Warren and son,	
	painters at the Bridge, in Kelly's directory. 1921 Cardiff	
	and District Trades directory shows an Evan and Lucy	
	Warren living at 14 Cardiff Road, but this number does	
	not exist today – possibly 4 Eastgate, by the Railway

	Her granddaughter is Mrs Frederick of Geraints Way,	
	Cowbridge (see memories and diaries file), who recalls	
	the Crowleys as an Irish family, close friends of the	
	large Fitzgerald family in the town. There were often	
	'hooleys', she said, in the Bridge Inn. She also	
	remembers paint being kept in part of the building,	
	possibly left from Soloman Warren's business.
