MARTHA DAVIES HONORED

ON AUGUST 5, former WNAA trustee Martha Davies will receive an honor conferred on few Americans. At the 2016 National Eisteddfod of Wales in Abergavenny, Monmouthshire, she will be inducted into the Gorsedd of Bards in a colorful, traditional ceremony on the Eisteddfod Maes, or field.

The Gorsedd Beirdd Ynys Prydain, literally the "throne" of bards of the Isle of Britain, is a society of poets, musicians and representatives of Welsh culture.

In the announcement of the 2016 honorees on the Gorsedd website we read:

"Martha Davies, Lincoln, Nebraska, may be from the USA, but her Welshness is a strong personal trait, and she has been active in the North American Welsh community for many years. She came to live in Wales for four years and learned Welsh at Aberystwyth before returning to the USA where she worked as an archivist, librarian and translator of several Welsh books and documents. With her husband, Berwyn Jones, she runs the Great Plains Welsh Project Centre (sic) in Nebraska, receiving all kinds of documents, books and artifacts from Welsh homes and chapels across the country. She is also responsible for digitising the two North American Welsh newspapers, Y Drych and Ninnau."

https://www.eisteddfod.wales/gorsedd-honours-2016 Asked for a statement by the editors of HWYL, Martha said:

"This honor is just in time to commemorate my fortieth year since moving to Aberystwyth where, besides learning Welsh, I did up an Edwardian home. Thanks to all my Welsh teachers and other learners in so many places - Wales, Iowa, Minnesota, Canada - where I learned, over time, to think in Welsh. These days, however, I sing Welsh more than I speak it. But my true passion remains translating 19th century accounts of Welsh-American settlers who wrote their deepest feelings in their language-of-the-heart, Welsh. Their stories were largely forgotten because fewer people spoke Welsh in America, but we're bringing them back into the light in my column in the Welsh-American Genealogical Society newsletter and in four books and other translations. I am grateful for Berwyn who brought me back to his home state, Nebraska, where we and our colleagues created, and continue to build, the Great Plains Welsh Heritage Project in Wymore with research materials that rival the largest collections. For Nebraska's Sesquicentennial on March 1, 2017 we'll debut videos and an exhibit celebrating the Welsh of Nebraska and the plains."

Martha will take the bardic name Martha Bethania, for two reasons: Bethania, or Bethany, was the Welsh Presbyterian Church in Carroll, Nebraska, until it was demolished a few years ago and Bethania, or Bethany, was the home of Lazarus and his sisters, Mary and Martha. Bethania is the Biblical Greek and Latin name for Bethany.

Martha served on the board of trustees of WNAA from 2008 to 2011 where she chaired the NAFOW Seminars Committee. She and Berwyn can always be found in the NAFOW Marketplace promoting the GPWHP and just about anything else related to Wales or Welsh culture.

The Welsh North American Association is proud of Martha and her extraordinary achievement and extends to her its hearty *llongyfarchiadau!*

The Gorsedd was founded in London in 1792 by Edward Williams who was known by his bardic name as Iolo Morganwg. He saw the Gorsedd as a bardic assembly dedicated to promoting the Welsh literary tradition. In 1795 he held the first Gorsedd in Wales outside the village

of Cowbridge, a few miles north and west of Cardiff.

In 1819, the Gorsedd was associated for the first time with the eisteddfod movement, when Iolo inducted several persons into the Gorsedd by tying different colored ribbons on their arms. These same colors today, white, blue and green, appear in the robes worn to signify the various Gorsedd orders. Martha will receive a Green Robe for contribution to the arts

The National Eisteddfod was established in 1861 and since that time a close and valuable link has existed between the Eisteddfod and the Gorsedd. Today, during National Eisteddfod Week, five Gorsedd ceremonies are held, two in the open air and three in the main pavilion when winning poets are crowned and chaired.

IT IS WITH GREAT APPRECIATION that the Welsh North American Association and the Legacy Society acknowledge the bequest of \$100,000 from the estate of Marjorie L Owen. As a lifetime WNAA member, Ms. Owen made her wishes known to honor her Welsh roots and to support the WNAA Endowment for the future by becoming a participant in the Legacy Society. This generous gift was so typical of Marjorie's philanthropic ideals, which are reflective of a life filled with love, energy and involvement.

Born June 18, 1920, daughter of Julia and Arthur Owen in Hubbard, Ohio; Marjorie Louise was the eldest of three children. She enjoyed a happy childhood on the family farm in Hubbard, hearing many wonderful stories about Wales from her father, which likely inspired her future visits to Wales.

Marjorie excelled academically, earning a BA in Mathematics and Psychology from Wooster College and an MA in Psychology from Western Reserve University (now Case Western Reserve University). Beginning her 40 year career at GE she continued to advance to the position of Industrial Psychologist and frequently traveled to GE branches world-wide holding conferences and classes to provide state-of-the-art efficiency training. Though it was unusual then for a single woman to have such expansive corporate responsibilities, Marjorie excelled at leadership and directness but was loved for her thoughtful generosity.

Although never married, Marjorie was always very close and involved with her family. She thoroughly enjoyed studying the family genealogy and located a cousin in Ystrad Mynach, Wales, Megan Mary Maude Evans, whom she delighted in visiting often.

In her later years, Marjorie enjoyed living at the Welsh Home in Rocky River, Ohio, where she provided the Home with two vans both adorned with the beloved daffodils. She continued to be active, involved and philanthropic in several Welsh Clubs including the Women's Welsh Clubs in Ohio. Among her favorite belongings were Welsh hymnals, dictionaries, travel books, love spoons, etc.....all proudly displayed.

Marjorie Louis Owen, 1920 – 2016; whom we honor for her life of legacy building, not only financially but also through her enduring, enthusiastic support of WNAA, and most especially through her love of her Welsh roots.

NAFOW 2016's PREACHER

THE PREACHER for the NAFOW Worship Service on Sunday, September 4, 2016. will be Eirian Wyn Lewis, who was born and raised in Llanybydder, a market town in Carmarthenshire, West Wales. His parents had a thriving grocery business in the centre of the town serving the larger rural community. He attended Aberduar Baptist Church from a very early age and took an active role in all its events and was baptized at seventeen when he started preaching and felt the call to ministry.

Eirian was educated at the local primary school before secondary education at Lampeter, the nearby university



town. He studied theology at the North Wales Baptist College and the University of Wales, Bangor, in 1975, and after his graduation he was ordained to the ministry in North Pembrokeshire in 1979. He has remained in the same pastorate and has four churches under his care. He graduated with a degree in Welsh in 2010 from the University of Wales, Lampeter.

He has been President of the Pembrokeshire Baptist

Association twice and is, at present, the Secretary and Moderator of the Association. He has also served as President of the Carmarthenshire and Cardiganshire Baptist Association and was President of the South Wales Free Church Council in 2004. He was President of the Welsh Baptist Union in 2014 -15.

He has travelled extensively visiting the Welsh colony, *Y Wladfa*, in Argentina nine times and has ministered there amongst the descendants of the original settlers on two different occasions. Actively involved with the Welsh Argentine Society for thirty years, he has been chairperson of the Welsh - Argentine Society on two occasions and has been the President since 2005.

Eirian has visited the USA and Canada six times and attended NAFOW on three occasions: Wilkes-Barre, 1983; Scranton, 2012 and Minneapolis, 2014, and has preached in the Welsh Presbyterian Church in Los Angeles, the Welsh Congregational Church in New York and at the 138th Annual Gymanfa Ganu of the Central Southeast Ohio Association of Welsh Congregational Churches in 2010.

He has also been president, chairperson and secretary of many societies in North Pembrokeshire and has taken an active role in the newly formed Waldo Society, having recently been appointed chairperson, promoting Waldo's contribution to the literature and culture of Wales. Waldo is regarded as one of Wales's most influential poets and a bard of international significance.

He was honoured by *Gorsedd y Beirdd* at the National Eisteddfod of Wales held at Y Faenol, Caernarfon in 2005 and by *Gorsedd y Wladfa* in 2011. His bardic name in Wales is *Eirian Cleddau* and in Argentina, *Pastor Gales*, and he is eagerly looking forward to this year's visit to America and Canada and, especially, to Calgary!!!!!!!!



LOCATED IN INGLEWOOD, Calgary's oldest neighbourhood, the Tea Trader retail shop opened its doors in April of 1994.


Ted Jones, the owner of the business, imports tea from around the world and has established long relationships with many suppliers from various growing regions and tea estates.

NOVELIST: BARRIE DOYLE


Novels: The Excalibur Parchment & The Lucifer Scroll


TO THE NORTH-EAST OF CALGARY, 1 hour and 40 minutes away, lies the town of Drumheller in the Alberta 'Badlands'. Drumheller is home to the Royal Tyrell Museum [tyrellmuseum.com] one of the best



dinosaur museums in North America.

This area, worth exploring for its beauty, arid landscapes and deep coulees, was a coal-mining area years past with many Welsh lending their expertise to the area. Not far from Drumheller is the Atlas Coal Mine National Historic Site, a former coal mine. Located in East Coulee, it is considered to be Canada's most complete historic coal mine and is home to the country's last standing wooden coal tipple.

TO THE WEST OF CALGARY, of course, lie the Rockies. Beautiful Banff with its majestic Banff Springs Hotel is only about 1½ hrs from Calgary and Lake Louise, with its Victoria Glacier overlooking a turquoise lake, is about 2 hrs away. On your way you would visit Canmore,



once a coal-mining town and now a sports destination with wonderful trails and vistas.

PATAGONIA: THE CALGARY CONNECTION

Earlier this year, Calgary Welsh Society member, Michèle Henderson, was the guest speaker at the Calgary Welsh Society's St David's Day Dinner. Michele's Great-Great

Grandmother Catherine Davies, with her family, was one of the first 153 Welsh colonists to arrive in Patagonia on the first boat, the Mimosa, on July 28, 1865.

Sadly, Catherine Davies died and was buried shortly after her arrival in Patagonia. In 1995, a grave with the remains of a European woman was found by



a construction company. After a DNA match with a descendent in Conwy, Wales, it was confirmed that the remains were that of Catherine.

Michele flew to Patagonia for the reinterment of Catherine's remains. Her most interesting story was a huge hit with society members.

A film *Patagonian Bones*, produced by Ricardo Preve, was released in July, 2015, to tie in with 150th anniversary of the arrival of the Welsh settlers.
