Croeso! For the first time in its 100-year history, Nebraska and Lincoln are excited to host the North American Festival of Wales. It is truly a privilege to highlight our state and share the Great Plains Welsh Heritage Project and the Arvonia Historic Preservation Society with North America's Welsh community.

We take immense pride in the story of Welsh immigration to the Great Plains. Thanks to the Homestead Act of 1862, many of our ancestors were able to achieve their dreams of farming Departures: Transporting you from the host hotel, Lincoln their own land, much more than they ever could have cultivated in their native Wales.

Our Welsh ancestors brought with them a spirit of perseverance and worked together with neighbors from other ethnic groups to build successful communities. Here, we also recognize and honor the Native nations who were the first to live on the Great Plains.

We hope you can visit the Great Plains Welsh Heritage Centre, the Archive for Welsh America, our historic one-room school, and Bethel Cemetery—our ancestors' final resting place—all located in Wymore, Nebraska. On your trip to Arvonia, you will travel through the beautiful Flint Hills of






Opening Ceremony and Flag Raising


We encourage you to participate in this time-honored tradition; enter a competition and show off your talents at the 2023 North American Festival of Wales Eisteddfod!

Here are this year's categories:

Visual Arts - Your anonymous entry is displayed at NAFOW and adjudicated by a secret ballot public vote (one vote per person). Entries might include fabric art, painting, sculpture, collage and so forth. This year's theme is "Roots/Gwreiddiau.' Entry deadline is August 21, 2023. Sponsored by the Welsh Gymanfa Ganu Association of Wisconsin

Poetry Composition (Welsh Language Poem and English Language Poem) This year's theme, for both competitions, is likewise "Roots/Gwreiddiau."
Anonymous submissions must be received via email by July 30, 2023. Returning as adjudicators this year are Menna Elfyn and Eurig Salisbury (Welsh) and Robert Dayton and Pat Edwards (English). Stage Competitions (Recitation) —Saturday, September 2 at NAFOW 2023 (in-person). Advance registration is highly encouraged, but walk-ins are accepted as time permits. Recitation from memory is encouraged but not required. Give it a shot!

- Welsh Language Recitation (WNAA Eisteddfod Committee Award) Welsh learners are welcome—just let us know! This year's set piece is "Y Pethau Bychain" by Eurig Salisbury.
- English Language Recitation (St. David's Society of Minnesota Award). This year's set piece is "When all my five and country senses see" by Dylan Thomas.

Stage Competitions (Singing)—Saturday, September 2 at NAFOW 2023. Entry deadline is August 21, 2023.

- Solo Hymn Singing (Rachel Christopher Memorial Award). Each competitor performs a hymn in Welsh. Sponsored by Huw Christopher.

Our signature competition, open to residents of the Americas, with the opportunity for a generous cash scholarship to compete at the 2024 National Eisteddfod of Wales. He is best known for The Dick Cavett Show that ran on several networks from 1968 to 1996, usually in a format of interviewing famous guests. Dick was



Men Who Sing Directed by Dylan Williams, 77 mins. This humorous and melancholic portrait of a male voice choir begins when the filmmaker's father,

widower Ed, 90, sells the family home and arranges his own funeral. His only remaining solace is Tuesday night practice, but with an average age of 74 and suffering a haemorrhaging of the bass section, his beloved choir is facing a crisis of its own. They must act or face extinction. So the hunt begins to find 'brown haired men' in their 40s and 50s who can take the choir forward. As their search intensifies we come closer to them. Whilst Ed finds new meaning, Merf deals with his own bad news by focusing on the choir's revival and Gwyn laughs at his prostate cancer diagnosis and walks on the wing of a plane to raise money. Finally, they raise themselves and travel to Northern Ireland to perform for the first time in 20 years.

The Welsh Valley that Won the Lottery

47 mins. In May 2022 more than 400 people in the south Wales valley of Rhymney shared a lottery



win of 3.7 million pounds. At a time of dire economic crisis, the windfall was utterly transformative.

From Betty who won £3,984 to retired steel-worker Ted, who won £370,000; the money has been a godsend, and the impact on this tight-knit community is huge. For some the money is life changing, for others it is lifesaving. For mother of seven Mary, who has taken to growing her own fruit and veg to feed her family, the win means a trip to Devon for the first family holiday in 14 years. Former DJ John Price fulfills a lifelong dream as he tears up the valley in his new quad bike.

In a place where people have always struggled to make ends meet, what happens when they share a prize a multi-million pound prize? Narrated by Cerys Matthews.


What the WNAA Board Does For You

Board members took a bus ride to Wymore to visit the Great Plains Welsh Heritage Project. Everyone had plenty of time to tour the building and tornado-safe storage room for Welsh archives. Megan Williams was grateful there were no tornadoes on this visit. Museum volunteers were on hand to provide a warm welcome and explain the workings of the museum and how collections are curated.

At the museum, the group enjoyed a Welsh lunch of pasties, Welsh teacakes and a hot cup of tea on a blustery day. Members assembled outside in front of the mural, for a group photo—it was cold!

After the museum, it was on to the Pleasant View one-room schoolhouse; the inside has been lovingly restored to reflect the era when one-room schoolhouses provided rural education on the Great Plains. A fundraising campaign is under way to replace the siding on the outside, and there are even plans to add an outhouse!

The board then returned to the warm bus for a short ride to Bethel Cemetery. The NAFOW Wymore tour includes a stop at this historic cemetery where reenactors will bring historic Welsh settlers to life



(there's a pun there, sort of). Once again, only the bravest of the brave assembled on the steps of the former Bethel Church for a photo. It was still cold and now windy!

The final stop on the board's tour was Homestead National Historical Park in Beatrice. This museum commemorates the passage of the 1862 Homestead Act. The introductory film allowed us time to warm up and learn more about homesteading and the kind of life these brave settlers led. Then, the group viewed many interesting displays depicting pioneer life.

It was a full day, and provided a taste of what's in store for NAFOW 2023 in Lincoln, Nebraska!



NAFOW-Nebraska Welsh Heritage Tour



Our Thursday tour takes visitors south of Lincoln. We will visit the Homestead National Monument in Beatrice, a museum which commemorates the passage of the 1862 Homestead Act.

One hour south of Lincoln is Wymore, home of the Great Plains Welsh Heritage Centre. Known today as the "Welsh Capital of the Great Plains," Wymore was home to a significant Welsh community. We will have lunch at the Welsh Heritage Centre, which contains a museum of Welsh immigrant life and the Archive for Welsh America. The tornado-proof archive is the only repository in North America for the Welsh-language newspaper, Y Drych, which dates back to 1851.

Following the museum visit we will tour the restored oneroom Pleasant View Schoolhouse, once attended by many Welsh-American children; and Bethel Cemetery, final resting

place of many of the original Welsh settlers and site of the former Calvinistic Methodist Church, the community's largest Welsh church.




NAFOW-Kansas Welsh Heritage Tour

Time permitting, we will stop at the Osage County Museum. We will have lunch on our way back to Lincoln NE and arrive at the Marriott Cornhusker hotel late in the afternoon.







1990 and currently has 85 members. It meets at the Gomer Congregational Church which is across the street from the Gomer Welsh Community Museum at 7365 Gomer Road in Gomer, Ohio. The museum is open the second Sunday of the month from 2-4:00 p.m. in March through December, or by appointment.

The society celebrates Welsh culture in northwest Ohio which began when Welsh immigrants established the small village of Gomer in the 1830s in northern Allen County along the banks of the Ottawa River and Pike Run. Pike Run Cemetery, known as Tawelfan (a peaceful place) is nearby.

The society held a Welsh tea at the beginning of May. The theme was "History of Quilts" and a light meal, scones and tea were served to 50 in attendance. St. David's Day is celebrated with an annual dinner and sing, and the annual gymanfa ganu takes place on the first Sunday of October at the Gomer United Church of Christ.
