In celebration of the bicentennial of Goronwy Owen (1723-1769) the Botetourt Bibliographical Society will issue this summer its second annual publication:

## GORONWY OWEN'S VIRGINIAN ADVENTURE

"Black Goronwy of Angelsea" wrote poetry of such a quality as early to earn him the favor of the Morris brothers — Richard, William, and Lewis — founders of the Cymmrodorion Society in Augustan London; nevertheless, financial straits compelled him to accept a position as Master of the Grammar school and Professor of Humanity at the College of William and Mary in Virginia. He held the position from 1758-1760, then resigned and obtained a parish in Brunswick County, Virginia, where he received word of the London publication of his poems (*Diddanwch Teuluaidd*, 1763) and composed a lament for Lewis Morris.

On St. David's Day, 1969, John Gwilym Jones, noted Welsh playwright and critic, and Reader in Welsh at the University College of North Wales at Bangor, delivered a lecture at William and Mary on the poetry and literary criticism of Goronwy Owen. In addition, Mr. Jones has translated those three of Owen's letters describing his voyage to and life in colonial Virginia. The Botetourt will publish both the lecture and the translations, with an Appendix, "An Inventory and Appraisement of the Estate of the Reverend Mr. Gronon Owen," including full bibliographical details of his library.

Copies may be reserved at the pre-publication price of \$2.00 if orders, accompanied by payment, are received by May 27, 1969. After May 27 the price, except to members, will be \$3.00. Standing orders for future publications are welcomed. It is the announced intention of the Botetourt to make available over a period of several years full inventories of selected colonial Virginia libraries; the inventories will be accompanied by relevant historical and literary commentary.
